IBEW 58 hosts salute to veterans

The "Armed Services Salute," a patriotic Veterans Day celebration in Detroit's Corktown neighborhood, will be held Sunday, Nov. 5.

Starting with an 8 a.m. "VetsFast" breakfast at the IBEW Local 58 union hall at 1358 Abbott St., the event will proceed with an opening ceremony at 9:45 a.m. in the union hall's parking lot to honor veterans "of honor and distinction."

A "4Star, 4Mile Race" that stretches four miles through the streets of Corktown will begin at 11:08 a.m. It's a distinctive element of the day's events, as the race will run alongside the parade. Participants in the race dedicate their run to an active military member or service veteran.

At 11:15 a.m. the 18th Annual Detroit Veteran's Day Parade steps off, following a path west along Michigan Avenue to the under-renovation Ford-Michigan Central Station.

The Veterans Day events in Detroit moved from one location to another since it was revived from dormancy 18 years ago, then found a permanent home thanks to Parade Master Sponsor IBEW Local 58 and the Southeast Michigan Chapter of the National Electrical Contractors Association.

The event's organizers say the event is intended to honor "service from veterans, active military and community volunteers with a motto of "inspiring patriotism through community service."

Construction sees moderating costs

WASHINGTON, D.C. – At 3.7 percent, the latest U.S. inflation rate announced on Oct. 12 was level with the month prior, according to the latest U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Price Index report released Oct. 11.

In the construction industry, the same report said input prices for industry-related goods increased 0.2 percent in September compared to the prior month. It continued a year-old moderation trend of construction input inflation, which was 0.3 percent over the past year. Longer term, however, construction goods prices are up 41 percent since February 2020, the month before the pandemic hit.

The leading contributor to the current inflation: fuel prices in the "crude petroleum" category, which was up 10.1 percent for the month. But costs had only risen slightly last month or were down a bit in all other product sectors. The next greatest sector where costs increased for the month was in concrete products, up 0.8 percent.

Gordie's bridge goes up, over the river

DETROIT – It's really looking like a bridge, now.

For the past three years, the construction profile of the Gordie Howe International Bridge between Detroit and Windsor has been dominated by the rise of the 722-foot concrete towers on either side of the Detroit River.

Over the course of the past few weeks, the last concrete pour for the sloped architectural feature at the pylon head on the Detroit side has been completed, and that tower has reached its full height.

Construction crews on the Windsor side will soon be complete the top of that tower. And on both sides, concrete decks, delicately supported by stay cables, are being extended well past the

riverbanks and over the Detroit River toward their inevitable meeting in the center.

"We are excited to share the US tower has reached its final height and the Canadian tower is nearing completion. These majestic towers have been the most visible and inspiring signs of progress representing a major step forward

Prevailing wage a boon to nonunion workers, too

More proof that prevailing wage laws lift the quality of life for construction workers, both union and nonunion, comes from the Cornell University School of Industrial and Labor Relations.

Many studies in the past have focused on whether or not prevailing wage increases costs for governments that employ the laws. Less attention is given to the potential benefits prevailing wages provide nonunion workers: when open shop contractors bid on jobs with higher prevailing wages baked in, in New York City, it also forces them to provide workers with better insurance benefits, or at least the cash equivalent for them.

"The conclusion is that pre-

vailing wage laws do seem to make union labor a little bit cheaper than non-union labor because of the vast differences in which a union shop versus an open shop provide their workers with comprehensive benefits," said Russel Weaver, the research

director of the Cornell School of Industrial and Labor Relations, Buffalo Co-Lab and co-author of the report.

The Cornell study, released last month under the wordy heading, "Building Responsible Projects in New York City: As-

sessing the Impact of Prevailing Wage Benefits on Workers, Contractors, and the New York City Economy," did conclude that developers are likely to save money by using union labor on private prevailing wage projects.

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Consumers' Karn Plant makes move to solar

ESSEXVILLE – As Consumers Energy is moving away from burning coal at its Karn Generating Complex, it's turning toward the sun.

On Oct. 4 the utility announced plans to build an 85-megawatt solar array on the grounds of its power plant here near Bay City

The announcement follows the June closure of the Karn Units 1 and 2, which the utility shut down as part of its long-term move away from coal-burning boilers.

"Consumers Energy put years of thoughtful work into closing the Karn facilities, and chief among those considerations

was how we wanted the site to operate and function after the closure," said David Hicks, Consumers Energy's vice president of clean energy development. "Based on future use studies and input from local stakeholders, solar emerged as the best option to ensure we continue to be good

DOL invites more worker reps to take a hike

In late August, the U.S. Department of Labor announced a proposed change to the groups that workers can authorize to accompany OSHA compliance officers on safety inspections. The proposed change would broaden the types of non-employee third-party representatives who can be designated to represent workers during these inspections.

"Choosing their walkaround representative during an OSHA inspection is one of the most important rights workers have under the OSH Act," says LHSFNA Management Co-Chair David

More 'walkaround' representatives can make construction worksites safer

F. Rampone. "To achieve safer working conditions, workers need the ability to make their voice heard to OSHA compliance officers."

The change would allow workers to designate "individuals with relevant skills, knowledge or experience that can assist in the inspection process." This could include expertise in specific hazards, workplace conditions or language skills that improve communication between OSHA and workers (e.g., an industrial hygienist or toxicology expert, a

union representative or workers' right group, a translator).

"This proposal aims to make inspections more effective and ultimately make workplaces safer by increasing opportunities for employees to be represented in the inspection process," said Doug Parker, assistant secretary of the U.S. Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

The proposal would still give OSHA compliance officers discretion to restrict access to an authorized third party if their

'Summer of strikes' extends to all seasons as worker walkouts grow

The ongoing strike by the United Auto Workers included 30,000 workers across 22 states as of last week.

Now more than a month old, the UAW strike is a major tip of the spear of strike actions taken by American workers in 2023. According to Cornell University's Labor Tracker, at least 453,000 workers have participated in 312 strikes in the U.S. this year. It's the highest number of workers on strike since 2000 and could be the highest since 1986 if all 150,000 UAW members go out.

Last year, workers – both union members and those seeking unions – surprised everyone with the "summer of strikes," and job walkouts ensued involving 123,000 workers. This year, boom: that seasonal bug has been spread over 10 months, so far, and brought about strikes by nearly three times as many workers.

A much more common number of strikers per year during the past two decades was the 37,000 workers who walked out in 2021.

"For a long time, working people in this country have felt powerless. They've been powerless," said AFL-CIO President Liz Shuler in her state of the

unions address on Aug. 29. "But here is the truth we're going to talk about today: Working people are reclaiming our power. Working people are taking on the companies that have exploited us for a long time now. The state of the unions is on the rise. With every strike. Every picket line. Every win we deliver for workers all over this country."

Picket signs are being taken up by a wide variety of workers: autoworkers, hotel maids, actors, screenwriters, restaurant waiters and baristas. Former U.S. Labor Secretary Robert Reich commented on disgruntled Starbucks

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Nation's jobs market persistently strong in construction, elsewhere

One of these months, the hot U.S. jobs market is going to cool off. It didn't in September: the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics reported Oct. 6 that the U.S. economy added an estimated 336,000 jobs last month, doubling most expectations, and marking the highest number of jobs added since January.

Employment gains were widespread, and the U.S. construction industry joined the fun. Construction employment in September totaled 8,014,000, seasonally adjusted, with a gain of 11,000 jobs or 0.1 percent from

August. The sector has added 217,000 jobs during the past 12 months, an increase of 2.8 percent.

The unemployment rate among jobseekers with construction experience was 3.8 percent in September, one of the lowest rates for that month in the 24-year history of the data. It matched the overall U.S. unemployment rate, which was steady at 3.8 percent. "The September jobs report mirrored other recently released employment metrics and confirmed that the labor market remains resilient," said Shawn Snyder, global investment strategist for J.P. Morgan Wealth Management. "With the economy adding 336,000 jobs, the three-month average employment gain has been 266,000 jobs. That pace is more than sufficient to keep the unemployment rate from rising."

Meanwhile, the latest numbers for U.S. construction spending showed an increase of 0.5 percent in August compared to the previous month, the BLS reported Oct. 2. There were increases in both residential and nonresidential construction.

"For now, all types of construction are growing," said Ken Simonson, the chief economist for the Associated General Contractors. "But unless the supply of qualified workers increases, many projects are likely to be delayed."

Spending on private nonresidential construction increased by 0.3 percent in August, while public construction investment increased 0.6

Workin' for the weekend

Ladies and gentlemen...the weekend. Why do we have it? The short answer: unions!

In the late 19th Century, many workers labored seven days a week, sometimes up to a grueling 100 hours in poor conditions. Workers were fed up. Many began to unionize and take to the streets in protest.

Violence against them at the hands of corporate union busters and law enforcement was common. Many lost their lives. But they didn't relent.



Organized labor kept up the pressure. Workers in the mining, printing and railroad industries eventually won 8-hour-work days. Major corporations, most notably Ford Motor Co., began to heed calls to institute five-day work weeks. But most workers across the country were not guaranteed these benefits.

Then came Frances Perkins – President Franklin D. Roosevelt's labor secretary and the first woman cabinet secretary. Before agreeing to the position, Perkins met with FDR to secure a guarantee that he would support her pro-labor agenda. To her surprise, FDR backed her.

In 1938, thanks to her advocacy and the momentum built by organized labor, Congress passed the Fair Labor Standards Act — which among many things ultimately established a 40-hour work week by forcing employers to pay time and a half for any hours worked beyond this limit. And thus, created the weekend.

While many workers now enjoy weekends won by organized labor, the fight continues for those who don't.

A rising number of contract employees, sometimes known as "gig workers," are putting in backbreaking hours, without the protections afforded to full-time workers.

Now is the time to renew the historic call of unions to make sure ALL workers are afforded the dignity — and time off from work — they deserve.

And who knows — maybe one day we'll move to a three-day weekend?

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ward in construction of the Gordie Howe International Bridge," said Charl van Niekerk, CEO of the Windsor-Detroit Bridge Authority.

Underground foundational work and the tower footings were completed in December 2020 and included six shafts per tower leg drilled into the bedrock to a depth of 118 feet. Lower pylon construction was completed in March 2022.

"Reaching tower completion is the result of years of meticulous planning, engineering expertise and hard work by thousands of men and women. The towers embody strength, durability and innovation in design. Bridging North America has reached this point in the project safely and is extremely pleased with the work of our team. It's a source of pride and an accomplishment we can

all be proud of."

The bridge deck is progressing on both sides of the river, and is being placed 138 feet above the Detroit River. It will support six lanes of vehicular traffic and a cycle/pedestrian path. The bridge is designed with a cable-stayed system and will include 216 parallel strand stay cables strung from the tower to the bridge deck.

When it's complete, the 1.5-mile-long cable-stayed bridge will be the longest of its type in North America.

Construction is also proceeding on the massive 167-acre U.S. Point of Entry behind the bridge in southwest Detroit. It contains inbound border inspection facilities for both passenger and commercial vehicles, outbound inspection facilities, and commercial exit control booths.

The bridge is expected to be open to traffic in 2025.

percent. Private residential construction spending had struggled earlier this year, but increased for the fourth consecutive month in August, by 0.6 percent.

"Construction firms have plenty of projects but a dip in nonresidential employment last month shows how hard it has been to find enough skilled workers," said Ken Simonson, the association's chief economist. "Job openings remain stubbornly high, even though the industry has been raising hourly pay at an elevated rate."

Average hourly earnings for production and nonsupervisory employees in construction—covering most onsite craft workers as well as many office workers—climbed by 5.5

percent over the year to \$34.54 per hour. Construction firms in August provided a wage "premium" of nearly 19 percent compared to the average hourly earnings for all private-sector production employees, the AGC said.

Among all occupations in the U.S. economy, average hourly earnings rose 0.2 percent in September, and were up 4.2 percent vs. September 2022. Wage hikes are decelerating, but that's not necessarily a bad thing, said Economic Policy Institute economist Elise Gould, as it could provide some impetus for the Federal Reserve not to hike interest rates.

"Nominal wage growth slowed," Goud said. "Faster

wage growth among lower-wage workers for much of the recovery has slowed; production nonsupervisory workers noted a sharp deceleration in wage growth over the last year and a half. The pace of overall wage growth continues to decelerate.

"Why applaud decelerating nominal wage growth? One: The Fed will be looking at that closely to determine whether there's overheating that may spur their rate hikes further. Two: Real (inflation-adjusted) wages are rising because inflation has been falling much faster than wage growth."

The Spectacle Reef Lighthouse

HISTORY IN THE MAKING

Michigan's lighthouse mavens and visitors know that finding their way to many of the state's 129 lighthouses can be at least challenging – and sometimes, downright impossible without a big boat.

Among the beacons are lighthouses built on shoals – rocky outcroppings that might peek above or lie just below the surface of one of the Great Lakes. Those lights were built on rock formations that, by their nature, are places mariners would want to avoid.

In that light, we bring some attention to the Spectacle Reef Lighthouse, a ridiculously stout structure erected 11 miles east of the Straits of Mackinac near the northern end of Lake Huron. Because of the challenges of building in a lake on a shoal, it was lauded by engineers at the time, and today. "The greatest engineering achievement in lighthouse construction on Lake Huron," said Francis Ross Hollan in *America's Lighthouses* "... and one of the outstanding feats in lighthouse construction as a whole... was the erection of the Spectacle Reef Lighthouse."

Added Linda Osborne Cynowa in *Lighthouses and Lifesaving on the Great Lakes*: "The building of the Spectacle Reef Lighthouse was considered one of the greatest engineering feats of its time in 1874."

And much of that interesting engineering is found in the robust construction of the lighthouse's foundation.

The U.S. Coast Guard said the "Spectacle Reef Lighthouse cost \$406,000 and is the best specimen of monolithic stone masonry in the United States. The work on the lighthouse, which stands on a submerged limestone reef off the eastern end of the Straits of Mackinac, was commenced in May 1870. It was planned and built by Maj. O. M. Poe, who was General Sherman's chief engineer on his march to the sea. The light was first exhibited from the finished structure in June 1874."

The Spectacle Reef is so-called because it is shaped like a pair of eyeglasses, and is submerged in Lake Huron in some places in only 4 feet of water. The need for a lighthouse was evident with the post-Civil War increase in Great Lakes ship traffic, and the site was marked, inadequately, by a buoy in 1868.

A year earlier, two schooners ran aground and broke up on the shoal. The U.S. Lighthouse Board said the site was "more dreaded by navigators than any other danger now unmarked throughout the entire chain of lakes." Congress authorized the money for the lighthouse, and it was the most expensive ever built on the Great Lakes.

It wasn't the first shoal-based lighthouse on the Great Lakes. That distinction would go to the lighthouse at Waughshance in Lake Michigan, about 15 miles west of Mackinaw City. Currently abandoned and in danger of succumbing to the elements, it was likely the first light in the region to be built (in 1850) surrounded by water.

But the Spectacle Reef structure led the way for a generation of shoal-based Great Lakes lighthouse construction. The Spectacle Reef Lighthouse was built at the start of a 40-year period – between 1870 and 1910 – when engineers began to build lights atop isolated islands, reefs and shoals that were hazards to ships.

The Spectacle Reef Preservation Society said the "interlocking, hand cut limestone block" were part of an "engineering feat" of constructing the light.

Prior to construction, a careful survey of the reef was made in July 1869, and the following spring a work depot, outfitted with a wharf, storehouse, and temporary quarters, was established at Scammon's Harbor on Government Island, 17 miles northeast of the reef.

Work began on July 19, 1871. It would take 200 men and four years to complete.

The foundation was formed within a barrel-shaped cofferdam submerged 11 feet below the lake's surface, protected by a crib made from 12-inch thick timbers. In October the cofferdam was pumped dry to expose the bedrock, upon which the masonry courses would be laid. Masons then began to level the shoal for the installation of the base of the tower.

Meanwhile, some of the work crew labored on turning the cofferdam into a pier, complete with erecting buildings and setting machinery needed for construction. In September 1871 the work crew had the pier built up 12 feet above the lake level and had completed the needed buildings.


Then came the start of specialized work setting the lighthouse's base. A group of stonecutters at the base of the cofferdam laid the first course of cut stone atop the shoal that was finished on Oct. 27. With winter coming, work resumed the next year.

Work on Government Island, where the stone was cut, opened for the 1872 season on May 3 – but the base of the lighthouse site was still a block of ice and would not fully melt until May 20. The bottom course of the tower was then bolted to the shoal with three-foot-long bolts that penetrated the limestone rock, while subsequent stone courses, each two feet thick, were linked together with 2-foot-long bolts, or pins. The bottom 17 courses of stone formed a solid tower, 34-feet tall, which extended from the shoal to a height of 23 feet above water.

"The stones were cut at the depot at Scammon's Harbor, 16 miles away, and fitted, course by course, on a platform of masonry. The stones were so well prepared that a course could be set, drilled, and bolted in three days," a Coast Guard history said. By the end of work that October, the solid portion of the tower was finished along with five courses in the upper part of the tower.

"Each course of stone measures 2 feet tall, with each piece of stone being carved in a manner to make it interlock with the ones surrounding it."

"The design of these pieces

is done in a way so no stone can move and that the force of the waves pounding against the tower actually makes it stronger," said the Spectacle Reef Preservation Society. "The holes for the pins were then plugged with Portland cement. This, as well as the mortar used, fused the limestone blocks together forming one massive monolithic structure."

The combination of a crib foundation and the monolithic limestone masonry worked so well that the Lighthouse Board used the design and a similar process in constructing the Standard Rock lighthouse in Lake Superior in 1878. We featured that project here earlier this year ("The loneliest place in North America?").

Looking up from the base, the Spectacle Reef lighthouse tower's lower 17 limestone courses are solid stone, with a center opening for a well. The upper portion of the tower contains five rooms with a diameter of 14 feet as living quarters for keepers, as well as a pedestal room and lantern room. The walls of the tower at the base of the living quarters measure more than five feet thick, tapering to 16 inches thick at the top.


The Preservation Society said unlike most light towers made of brick, where there is an inner and outer wall with an air gap, Spectacle Reef is solid stone throughout. A lining of brick was placed in the upper portion of the tower, to which a metal lath and plaster are attached.

The completed tower, 32 feet in diameter at the base, rises 97 feet above the reef. The lighthouse station included two fog signal buildings, two cranes, and a boathouse.

The lighthouse keeper's life – here, generally a keeper and three assistants – was likely as monotonous as one can imagine. The lake weather, of course, could be unrelenting and make living there uncomfortable. After the winter of 1873-74, when the keepers returned to the newly completed tower in the spring, they found ice piled against it at a height of 30 feet – or seven feet higher than the doorway.

The Coast Guard removed the last keepers from Spectacle Reef Lighthouse in 1972, and a decade later the Fresnel lens was taken out and replaced with a solar-powered, automated light.

In December 2020, ownership of Spectacle Reef Lighthouse was transferred to the non-profit Spectacle Reef Preservation Society. The society plans to restore the station for use as a public museum and an event and education center with a resident keeper program.

(Continued from Page 1) employees, who were among the first unlikely groups in the past few years to start organizing.

"Starbucks is a multibillion company," said Reich. "Its new CEO will start with a pay package estimated to be worth over \$28 million. That's roughly 800 times the pay of the workers who actually brew and serve the coffee the business is built on – and who barely earn a living wage. That's why those workers have begun to unionize."

"Since December 2021, Starbucks Workers United has won union elections in more than 300 Starbucks stores, covering more than 8,000 workers and counting. And most of the union campaigns in individual stores won by overwhelming margins, gaining more than 70 percent of the total votes – and in parts of the country where private sector unions rarely win."

"The Starbucks union campaign has inspired young workers across the country and breathed life into a U.S. labor movement that has been stagnant for decades."

The U.S. labor movement may be breathing better but it is still short of breath. In its annual report on unionization in January, the Bureau of Labor Statistics said the percent of wage and salary workers who were members of unions was 10.1 percent in 2022, the lowest on record, down from 10.3 percent in 2021.

And this wave of strike activity pales in comparison to some years in the middle of the last century, when commonly, more than 1 million workers – and in some years more than 2 million workers – walked out. Much of that worker fervor was chilled when President Reagan fired strik-

ing air traffic controllers in 1981.

The modern strike activity may or may not lead to a resurgence in union numbers, but the worker militancy is getting attention. Some recent leads and headlines:

"Recent economic conditions have led to what some economists see as a perfect storm for the rise of organized labor movements," said *Barron's* on Oct. 6. Some of those conditions include consumer goods inflation out-weighing slowing wage gains, elevated interest rates and the high costs of housing.

"It's been a big year for labor organizing in the U.S. And from auto production lines to Hollywood, all eyes are on strikes taking the world of work by storm," was the lead of an article by the *Associated Press* on Oct. 5.

There are other major strikes whose numbers surpass the UAW's. Earlier this month, 75,000 health care workers – support staffers, pharmacists, lab techs and others – walked off the job from Oct. 4-6. The walkout by the members of the Coalition of Kaiser Permanente Unions was the largest health care strike in U.S. history. Strikers returned to work but may walk again.

More than 14,000 Unite HERE Local 11 members in Los Angeles are out on a series of rolling strikes against dozens of hotels.

And the nation's 160,000 SAG-AFTRA members still walk picket lines from New York to Los Angeles against their TV, movie, stage, Netflix and streaming video bosses. The Hollywood writers' strike has ended but the actors' strike continues.

Prevailing wage a boon to nonunion

(Continued from Page 1)

"What this (prevailing wage) law does is, as the report showed, really eliminate labor costs from the equation. So it really should be leveling the playing field," said Aislin McGuire, general counsel for the Contractors' Association of Greater New York.

At the beginning of 2022, the State of New York expanded the scope of the state's prevailing wage law to cover certain types of private construction projects that receive significant portions of public funding. A goal of the legislation is to make private construction more competitive for union labor. Developers, who might have hired

lower wages and offer workers fewer benefits, now have greater incentive to consider using union labor because prevailing wage rates require non-union contractors to pay closer to union-level wages.

In union shops, almost all employees receive group health and retirement benefits, whereas many non-union contractors do not provide this for all their employees. The prevailing wage rules dictate that if a non-union firm isn't providing their employees a comprehensive group benefits package, the firm has to pay the cost of that package as an hourly rate to their employees on top of the

prevailing wage. The idea for the new prevailing wage rules is to equalize the labor costs of union and non-union contractors, but in practice unions often end up costing less due to differences in how the law treats fringe benefits, Weaver found in his research. Unions and their contractors have for decades established cost-effective benefit plans.

A nonunion employer or employee attempting to purchase, say, individual workers compensation to meet requirements for a prevailing wage job, could hardly expect to get the same cost advantage as a group policy.





Each member must sign the form along with the number of hours they worked. The completed form must be sent back to by hall by the end of the day on the following Monday. Weekend work assignments must be called or emailed into the hall prior to 3:00 pm on Friday.

WORK ASSIGNMENTS: Everyone must obtain a work assignment prior to starting work. If you fail to do so you could be written up on charges.

LAY-OFFS: All members must report to the Union Hall immediately upon lay-off, even if you only work one day. These are the By-Law rules for the Out-of-Work List. Your name will be removed from the list 14 days after receiving an assignment. It is very important to report to the union hall immediately after your layoff. Members get confused because the S.U.B. Fund allows you a period of up to seven days to apply for S.U.B. benefits after lay-off.

LAY-OFF SLIPS/TERMINATION NOTICES: Lay off slips must accompany all applications for sub pay. Without lay off slips you cannot collect sub pay. It is the member’s responsibility to make sure they get one from the contractor when laid off. Your application cannot be submitted without one. It is the contractor’s responsibility to issue one in accordance with our contract.

S.U.B. BENEFITS: Report to the hall promptly upon layoff. You must complete a S.U.B. Application within seven days from your layoff date or you will forfeit S.U.B. benefits. Lay-off slips must accompany the application to be eligible. Proof of UIA benefit payments must be submitted within 21 days of when you were paid in order to receive SUB benefits. Do not submit your sub applications directly to the fund office. Your application must be signed by the hall or you will not collect benefits.

OUT-OF-WORK LIST: You must be on the out-of-work list to collect S.U.B. benefits or SASMI. Members must re-register bi-annually: March 1 through March 20 and Sept. 1 through Sept.20. If you fail to re-register you will be removed from the list.

SHORT WORK WEEK SUB PAY: If you work 16 hours or less in a week or have a short work week due to weather you may collect sub for that week but only if it is at the beginning or the end of a layoff. You may NOT collect if you are not laid off. You must complete a sub application at the hall, provide a pay stub for that week and the hall will submit it to the fund office. If you are not laid off and it is due to weather the company MUST provide written documentation that it was weather related.

MEMBERS ASSISTANCE PROGRAM: If you are experiencing problems in your family, marriage or relationships, stress or emotional difficulties, grief or loss issues or problems with alcohol and drug use please contact our assistance program. Ulliance is there to help you with your needs. They can also help you with legal issues, financial concerns, elder care referrals and child care resources. Contact them at 1-800-448-8326 or www.LifeAdvisorEAP.com. **Make sure you mention Sheet Metal Workers Local 80 when calling and not the contractor you are working for.**



Consumers' Karn Plant makes move to solar

stewards of the land and to provide valuable tax dollars for the community while still pushing us further toward our sustainability goals.”

The now-shuttered Units 1 and 2 coal burners were rated at a total of 515 megawatts. The new solar array, whose construc-

tion Consumers Energy said is in its “early stages,” is expected to produce 85 megawatts. The utility said it expects the solar works will be operational in 2026.

Two additional generating units on the grounds, Karn 3 and 4, were built in the mid-1970s and will continue to produce about

638 megawatts each, burning natural gas and oil. The company plans to keep them operating through 2031 as it continues to build its renewable energy portfolio. Consumers Energy's goal is to have 90 percent of its energy coming from renewable sources by 2040.
