Apply online now to vote absentee

Michiganders can now apply to vote absentee in the Nov. 8 general election. Voters choosing to vote by mail are encouraged to submit their application as soon as possible to avoid postal delays.

All voters registered in Michigan are eligible to vote absentee. They can apply online at Michigan.gov/Vote or print an application form from the site and mail, email or hand deliver it to their local clerk. Voters can find their clerk's contact information at Michigan.gov/Vote.

"Every successful election we have held in Michigan over the last three years, voters have made it clear they want options for how and when to cast their ballot by choosing to do so absentee in record numbers," said Secretary of State Jocelyn Benson. "No matter what secure method they choose - whether voting by mail, local drop box or at their clerk's office -Michiganders can be confident their vote will be counted and their voice will be heard."

Clerks will begin mailing out absent voter ballots by Sept. 29. They will be available for early, in-person voting in clerks' offices on that date as well.

A ballot-tracking tool on the Michigan.gov/Vote site allows voters to check when their clerk received their absentee ballot request, when they mailed out the ballot and, when they received the ballot back from the voter.

Gallup poll: Approval of nation's unions nears record high

WASHINGTON, D.C. -More Americans are liking labor unions.

In their annual question on union approval, the Gallup organization reported on Aug. 30 that 71 percent of Americans now approve of labor unions, up from 68 percent a year ago and the highest number on this matter the polling group has recorded since 1965.

'The latest approval figure comes amid a burst of 2022 union victories across the country," Gallup reported Aug. 30, "with high-profile successes at major American corporations such as Amazon and Starbucks. The National Labor Relations Board reported a 57 percent increase in union election petitions filed during the first six months of fiscal year 2021."

The data is from Gallup's annual Work and Education survey, was collected Aug. 1-23.

"Here's why this isn't surprising" said a statement by the labor-backed Economic Policy Institute's Celine McNicholas and Eve Tahmincioglu. "U.S. workers see unions as critical to fixing our nation's broken workplace – where most workers have little power or agency at work.

It's been a decades-long slog to get the federal government to loosen the purse strings on fixing road, sewer, water, electrical transmission systems and the myriad of other public hardware that needs to be repaired or replaced. But the human factor - in the form of the dearth experienced construction workers-will likely slow progress on spending. "Construction workforce shortages are severe and having a significant impact on construction firms of all types, all sizes and all labor arrangements," said Ken Simonson, the Associated General Contractors' chief economist. "These workforce shortages are compounding the challenges firms are having with supply chain disruptions that are inflating the cost of construction materials and making delivery schedules and product availability uncertain."

Gallup said support for labor unions was highest between 1953-57, when 75 percent of Americans said they approved. Support only dipped below the 50 percent mark once, in 2009 during the Great Recession, but has improved in the 13 years since and now sits at a level last seen nearly 60 years ago.

"The low unemployment rate that developed during the pandemic altered the balance of power between employers and employees, creating an environment fostering union membership that has resulted in the formation (Continued on Page 3)

Lansing Chipotle first to organize

Workers at the Chipotle Mexican Grill in Lansing voted 11-3 on Aug. 25 to form a union with the International Brotherhood of Teamsters – making it the first of the restaurant chain's 3,000 locations to organize.

"Today's victory is an amazing moment for our team that has worked so hard and spent many months organizing," said Samantha Smith, 18, a crew member at Chipotle who has worked at the Lansing-area restaurant for more than two years. "We set out to show that our generation can make substantial change in this world and improve our working conditions by taking action collectively."

In addition to the security of a Teamster contract, workers are forming a union to improve their work schedules, increase wages, and gain respect from management.

The workers filed for the election with the National Labor Relations Board on July 5. The corporate-owned restaurant did not object to the filing.

"All of us are fighting for our brothers and sisters at Chipotle to get the rights and workplace protections they deserve," said Teamsters General President Sean O'Brien. "Now is the time for working people in this country to take back what's theirs. No matter your industry, no matter your age or how intimidating your employer may seem, you too can protect your labor with a union.'

A workforce survey conducted by the AGC and Autodesk and released Aug. 31 show that "construction workforce shortages are affecting nearly all construction

of construction firms report they have open positions they are trying to fill. Among those firms, 91 percent are having trouble hiring in at least some of those positions - particularly among the craft workforce that performs the bulk of onsite construction work.

And all types of firms are experiencing similar challenges. Nearly identical results were reported by contractors that use exclusively union craft labor and by firms that operate as open-shop employers; by firms with \$50 million or less in annual revenue and ones with more than \$500 million in revenue; by companies in all four regions of the country; and by contractors doing building construction, highway and transportation projects, federal and heavy work, or utility infrastructure.

Labor shortages are also exacerbating the impacts of the widespread supply chain disruptions that have made it difficult for firms to get materials delivered on time and that are driving up the cost of those materials.

Eighty-two percent of firms report projects they work on have been delayed because of supply chain challenges and two-thirds (66 percent) have projects that have been delayed because of labor shortages.

More than 1,300 U.S. construction firms participated in the 10th annual survey.

Biden puts thumb on scale to give IBEW charging network

The task of building a national network of electric vehicle charging stations could soon fall primarily to IBEW members, the union announced Aug. 26, thanks to a recent announcement by the U.S. Department of Transportation.

The Biden Administration's DOT recommends the union-affiliated Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Training Program (EVITP) as the preferred national certification standard for training the workers who will install \$5 billion of EV

charging equipment.

'We helped create the EVITP more than 10 years ago and it's been our gold-standard EV training and certification program ever since," said IBEW International President Lonnie R. Stephenson. We've consistently touted our highly skilled, highly trained workforce as leaders in installing and maintaining EV charging infrastructure, and we're very pleased that the DOT is putting its faith not just in the program, but also in the skills that make our

electricians the best qualified men and women to help build a quality and reliable national charging network."

The non-profit EVITP was developed in collaboration with industry partners and stakeholders across the automotive, utility and manufacturing sectors, alongside the IBEW, the National Electrical Contractors Association and educational institutions. The Electrical Training Alli-

Union approval? Of course

It's been nearly 60 years since approval for unions in the U.S. has been this high.

More than 70 percent of Americans now approve of labor unions. Those are the findings of a Gallup poll released Aug. 30, and they shouldn't be surprising.

Why? U.S. workers see unions as critical to fixing our nation's broken workplace – where most workers have little power or agency at work.

The pandemic revealed much about work in this country. We saw countless examples of workers performing essential jobs - such as health care and food service. They were forced to work without appropriate health and safety gear and certainly without pay commensurate with the critical nature of the work they were doing.

Those conditions, however, pre-dated the pandemic. The pandemic merely exposed these decades-old anti-worker dynamics. Clearly, as the new poll and recent data on strikes and union organizing shows, workers today are rejecting these dynamics and awakening to the benefits of unions.

Nonunion workers are forced to take their jobs - accept their employer's terms as is – or leave them. Unions enable workers to have a voice in those terms and set them through collective bargaining.

We know the powerful impact unions have on workers' lives, and broader effects on communities and on our democracy. Here's a run-down based on the Economic Policy Institute's extensive research on unions:

Pay and benefits:

•Unionized workers (workers covered by a union contract) earn on average 10.2 percent more in wages than nonunionized peers (workers in the same industry and occupation with similar education and experience).

•Unions don't just help union workers - they help all of us. When union density is high, nonunion workers benefit, because unions effectively set broader standards - including higher wages.

•Union workers are more likely to be covered by employerprovided health insurance. More than 9 in 10 workers covered by a union contract (95 percent) have access to employer-sponsored health benefits, compared with just 69 percent of nonunion workers.

•Union workers have greater access to paid vacation days. Ninety percent of workers covered by a union contract received paid holidays off compared to 78 percent of nonunion workers.

•Union workers also have greater access to paid sick days.

The 17 U.S. states with the highest union densities:

•Have state minimum wages that are on average 19 percent higher than the national average and 40 percent higher than those in low-union-density states.

•Have median annual incomes \$6,000 higher than the U.S. average. •Have higher-than-average unemployment insurance recipiency rates (that is, a higher share of those who are unemployed actually receive unemployment insurance).

Equity and equality:

•Black and Hispanic workers get a larger boost from unionization. Black workers represented by a union are paid 13.1 percent more than their nonunionized peers. Hispanic workers represented by unions are paid 18.8 percent more than their nonunionized peers.

•Hourly wages for women represented by a union are 4.7 percent higher on average than for nonunionized women with comparable characteristics.

the door for tremendous regional economic growth opportunities, such as BWL being the catalyst for the State of Michigan and General Motors to locate GM's \$2.6 billion electric vehicle battery plant just a few miles down the road. DEP has also resulted in ongoing conversations with new, large industrial customers looking to build in Lansing."

Closure of the Erickson Station at the end of this year "means we'll be out of the coal business," Peffley added. Erickson's retirement will make the BWL the largest utility in Michigan to generate coal-free power by 2022, reducing its carbon emissions by 80 percent.

The Delta Energy Park plant went operational on March 16, 2022. The plant has combustion turbines capable of 57 megawatts each and one steam turbine generator capable of 90 megawatts. The plant took 1.4 million laborhours to create, which included laying 30,000 cubic yards of concrete, 10 miles of mechanical piping, 20,000 miles of electrical cabling, and 20,000 hours of operator training.

Delta Energy Park was built by a combination of local and national firms, including:

Biden puts thumb on scale to give **IBEW charging jobs**

(Continued from Page 1) apprenticeship training centers, estimates that more than half of the IBEW's roughly 270 inside wiremen JATCs in the U.S. are actively enrolling students for electric vehicle charging system training programs.

"The rapid adoption of electric vehicles hinges on the safe, orderly build-out of charging infrastructure," Stephenson said. "Proposing the EVITP as the required certification, something that the IBEW already offers, is a huge win for our members."

President Joe Biden has long promised that, under his administration and its signature \$1 trillion infrastructure law, the \$5 billion, 500,000-station national charging network would be built by IBEW members.

Federal agencies like the Department of Transportation have the authority to create rules that will help them implement laws like the infrastructure law, and guidance the agency released earlier this year strongly encouraged jurisdictions to consider using the EVITP when applying for a share of the funding. The DOT's Federal Highway Administration formalized that recommendation when it specified the EVITP within FHWA's proposed federal rules governing the National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Formula Program.

As written, the rule, under Section 680.106(j) of the Federal Register, requires journeymen wiremen who install, maintain and operate EV service equipment be certified through the EVITP. It also mandates, for projects where more than one electrician is needed, that at least one be an apprentice in a registered electrical apprenticeship program.

The FHWA admits that jurisdictions can meet the requirement through another appropriate registered apprenticeship program, but states that the EVITP would be the preferred one. Electricians must be licensed or certified by the states where they live to be eligible for the EVITP, and if their states do not license or certify, then they must prove that they've had at least 8,000 hours of hands-on electrical construction experience – similar to what

possible, to meet the demand both from the federal government as well as from the private sector. The growing need for EV charging stations also creates major opportunities for the IBEW to organize nonunion electricians into the brotherhood, he said.

"With the right federal standards in place," he said, "our government can ensure that EV charging stations are installed to high-quality standards, sparing costly and time-consuming repairs down the road while creating good, union jobs. All of this is a huge step in the right direction."

The Federal Register accepted public comments on the rule through Aug. 22. The rule will go into effect 30 days after it's finalized.

(Continued from Page 1) "Underlying Causes of Falls from Heights." But it never hurts to call attention to inattention to fall safety, a nagging problem in the construction industry. Falls account for about one-third of fatal incidents at construction sites, causing 353 U.S. deaths in 2020. And that year, with the most recent data available, fall protection irregularities remained the most cited OSHA violation standard for the ninth year in a row.

The survey was conducted to "better understand why serious falls from heights continue to occur with such frequency despite being preventable," said the study. The group based its results on a survey of persons who experienced, witnessed, or investigated a workplace fall incident.

Among their key findings: •Respondents believe that

lack of adequate planning is a key underlying cause of falls. Insufficient or ineffective planning was the most selected primary cause for falls (27.4 percent). •That lack of planning is associated with a lower likelihood of using fall protection. The odds of using fall protection were 71 percent lower for individuals whose employer or competent person did not do any planning compared to those whose employer or competent person did do planning.



BUILDING MICHIGAN:

The Gibson Guitar Co. Factory

THIS 1941 VIEW of the Gibson Guitar Co. factory at 255 Parsons St. in Kalamazoo is little

changed today, although the plant made several additions over the decades, expanding into 150,000 square feet. This original building was completed in 1917. Many of the guitars and other stringed instruments made at the plant became preferred tools of the trade for some of the biggest names in country, rock and blues. "Gibson experienced remarkable growth in the 1950s, aided in part by the introduction of the famous Les Paul guitar in 1952," says the Kalamazoo Public Library. "Named after the famous guitarist, it was designed to his specifications. The company's success continued during the 1960s, when it manufactured over 1,000 guitars a day and employed nearly 1,000 workers, but a sharp nationwide decline in guitar sales contributed to Gibson's difficulties during the 1970s and 1980s." Michigan's historical reputation as a manufacturing state is usually limited to automotive production. Although, in various eras we have also built reputations for building boats, assembling furniture, making kitchen stoves, producing cereal – even rolling cigars.

But if you were to ask B.B. King, Keith Richards, Ron Wood, Steve Winwood, Johnny Cash, Alice Cooper, or Peter Frampton and many others well, those among them who are still alive - they might tell you that their favorite Michigan export were the guitars designed, constructed and exported from the Gibson guitar plant in Kalamazoo. At one time or other in the 1950s, 60, or 70s, all of those musicians, and others, played Gibson guitars, or even stopped by the building at 255 Parsons St. to get the feel of a guitar, see how they're built, make suggestions in how to improve their sound, or jam a little.

"Gibson's Parsons Street factory is the building most associated with the company," said Spann's Guide to Gibson, 1902-1941. "It was home to Gibson for 67 years and was the location where most of today's highly prized, collectable 'golden-age' instruments were produced."

THE GIBSON GUITAR Factory in 1936. During the 1920s, Gibson was one of the first manufacturers to experiment with the electric guitar, 20 years before it found popular success. In 1934, Gibson introduced the "Super 400" guitar, which revolutionized standards for tone and volume. Production of a low cost "Kalamazoo" guitar line helped the company stay open during the Great Depression. on.

Designed by local architect George Gilbert Worden, the block-long, three-story Gibson factory was certainly influenced by the contemporary industrial building designs of Albert Kahn.

"The design of the structure is in the 'daylight factory' style, popular in the early 20th Century for its innovative use of concrete, steel and glass," says Spann's Guide to Gibson, which said the three-level building used a system of poured con-

for five to 10 years before being used in instruments, according to a 1937 catalog.

A steaming area was set up to shape wood without breaking it. Jigs held the bent wood in place. The facility also included a patternmaker's shop, engineering office, experimental lab, a machine shop and a repair shop.

The Gallup polling series on union approval is a particularly valuable annual snapshot since they have asked the question annually since the 1930s.

The survey also discerned some other tidbits about union membership:

•Sixteen percent of Americans live in a household where at least one resident is a union member.

•Among union members, two in five (40 percent) rate their membership as "extremely important," or as a five on a five-point scale, with another 28 percent rating it a four.

•Union members were asked which of various potential reasons for joining a union are most important to them. Their top answers: better pay and benefits (65 percent) and employee rights and representation (57 percent). •While many union members

truly value their organization, those who are not members don't generally feel they are missing out. A majority of nonunion workers in the U.S. (58 percent) say they are "not interested at all" in joining a union. Only about 10 percent say they are "extremely

History of Gibson: "In addition to being one of the world's 'big two' electric guitar brands along with Fender, whose fame and recognition have transcended the guitar sphere and become household names – Gibson is also one of the oldest American musical instrument manufacturers, with a history dating all the way back to 1894."

The iconic Gibson name came from Orville Gibson (1856-1918) a Kalamazoo stringed instrument maker (or "luthier"), who decided that he could make a living selling his creations. He founded the Gibson Mandolin-Guitar Manufacturing Co. Ltd. in 1902 in Kalamazoo after making string instruments in his home workshop starting in 1894. Mandolins were much more popular instruments at the time, but he and his thriving company also made violins, lutes and all other stringed instruments.

"The present manufacturer has been swamped with orders constantly ever since the Gibson musical instruments have attracted public attention by reason of the excellent workmanship and exquisite quality," said the Kalamazoo Gazette in **1902.** The successful company outgrew two manufacturing locations in Kalamazoo before it settled into its long-term location on Parsons Street, several blocks north of downtown.

"Built in 1917, the Gibson Factory there created some of the most iconic guitars ever made," says The Old Gibson Guitar Factory in the Atlas Obscura. Music historian Paul Sparks called the **Gibson F-5 mandolin "the finest** flat-back mandolin ever produced," and it is still treasured by bluegrass musicians.

Gibson was a self-taught maker of instruments, and his new style of mandolin and guitar included a patented violin-like curve. The sides were carved from a single block of wood, creating a louder and more durable instrument popular with musicians.

Gibson died in 1918, but his company and name lived

crete beams strengthened with reinforcing rods to form the skeleton of his buildings.

The cast-in-place concrete structure helped reduce the risk of fire – an especially great benefit with all the wood products about - and was supplemented by the presence of a fire sprinkler system.

Designed to be easily expanded, it was: over the course of seven decades, the Parsons Street factory was enlarged several times and modified considerably. Spann' Guide said "updated manufacturing techniques, new equipment, and the constantly changing instrument types all required that production areas be re-purposed from their original uses.'

The first floor, actually a half-basement, had polished concrete with many interior walls covered with ceramic tile.

The building had a coalburning furnace in its own structure adjacent to the northwest corner of the factory. A furnace provided heat to the plant as well as a place for burning scrap. It also heated water to provide steam for the wood bender. An iconic brick stack with "Gibson" painted on it has been reduced in recent years.

A white wood shop accepted seasoned lumber ready for production, where a band saw did its work. Wood was stored outside and allowed to air dry

workforce at the plant made parts for gliders and radar assemblies. One contemporary account said the plant simultaneously produced 25,000

instruments during the war. The Gibson name, and its products, remain iconic in the music industry. Its products and designs changed as the nation's tastes changed during the Jazz Age, Big Bang and rock eras.

"Gibson electric guitars are some of the best instruments on the planet, but if you have been playing guitar for more than ten minutes, you already know that," says a review in Spinditty, a musical enthusiast website. "What you might not realize is just how integral Gibson has been to the development of the electric guitar.

"Throughout their history, Gibson's willingness to take chances in design and innovation has made them a leader in the guitar industry. Models like the Les Paul, SG, Flying V, and Explorer broke new ground in the guitar universe at the time of their creation.

"Though we take them for granted today, these Gibson guitar models have helped to shape rock, jazz, blues, and country music over the past half-century. They've become sought after, collected, and revered, and even some people who don't play guitar often know a Gibson when they see it."



THIS IS A RENDERING of a proposal released in March 2021 to renovate and re-purpose the old Gibson factory into a hotel, brewery and Hard Rock Cafe, with a design that pays homage to the building's original purpose. The landmark smokestack would be rebuilt. In 1985 the Gibson factory left Kalamazoo and relocated in Nashville. A few Gibson employees stayed behind and created Heritage Guitars in the site of the old Gibson factory. They continue to operate at the site today. There has been no visible progress on the new project.

interested" in joining.

•Union members, while not disgruntled at work, aren't exactly gruntled, either - members' attachment to their union does not carry over to their jobs. Rather, the data show that workers who are union members are less engaged at work (27 percent) than are nonunion members (33 percent). Gallup defines employee engagement as the involvement in and enthusiasm of employees in their work and workplace. On the flip side, 24 percent of union members are "actively disengaged" at work, compared with 17 percent of nonunion workers.



an IBEW journeyman wireman already brings to the table.

The U.S. Department of Energy estimates that there are already about 43,000 charging stations installed across the country. •Nearly half (48.8 percent) of respondents said that no fall protection was being used at the time of the fall.

•Employee beliefs about their company's fall protection policy are strongly associated with the use of fall protection. Respondents who believed fall protection was required by their employer were eight times more likely to use fall protection compared to those who did not believe fall protection was required.

•Rescue training may help reduce fall-related deaths. The odds of a fall being fatal were 76 percent lower for those who had self-rescue training compared to those who did not have this training.

·Workers employed by subcontractors face an elevated risk of dying from falls. Individuals who worked for a subcontractor at the time of the fall incident were 2.7 times more likely to die from the fall compared to those who worked for a general contractor.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH and DISMEMBERMENT IN-SURANCE FROM OUR INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION: Members who have their dues paid in advance (prior to the month of the accident) are eligible for accidental death and dismemberment benefits up to \$7,500.00. This benefit comes as a dues paying member of SMART International.

WEEKEND WORK ASSIGNMENTS: Saturday and Sunday work assignments. Please remember that when performing work on a Saturday or Sunday the steward must report it to the hall, give each members name and obtain a form for signatures. Each member must sign the form along with the number of hours they worked. The completed form must be sent back to by hall by the end of the day on the following Monday. Weekend work assignments must be called or emailed into the hall prior to 3:00 pm on Friday.

WORK ASSIGNMENTS: Everyone must obtain a work assignment prior to starting work. If you fail to do so you could be written up on charges

LAY-OFFS: All members must report to the Union Hall immediately upon lay-off, even if you only work one day. These are the By-Law rules for the Out-of-Work List. Your name will be removed from the list 14 days after receiving an assignment. It is very important to report to the union hall immediately after your layoff. Members get confused because the S.U.B. Fund allows you a period of up to seven (7) days to apply for S.U.B. benefits after lay-off.

LAY-OFF SLIPS/TERMINATION NOTICES: Lay off slips must accompany all applications for sub pay. Without lay off slips you cannot collect sub pay. It is the member's responsibility to make sure they get one from the contractor when laid off. Your application cannot be submitted without one. It is the contractor's responsibility to issue one in accordance with our contract.

S.U.B. BENEFITS: Report to the hall promptly upon layoff. You must complete a S.U.B. Application within seven days from your layoff date or you will forfeit S.U.B. benefits. Lay-off slips must accompany the application to be eligible. Proof of UIA benefit payments must be submitted within 21 days of when you were paid in order to receive SUB benefits. Do not submit your sub applications directly to the fund office. Your application must be signed by the hall or you will not collect benefits.

OUT-OF-WORK LIST: You must be on the out-of-work list to collect S.U.B. benefits or SASMI. Members must re-register biannually: March 1 through March 20 and September 1 through Sept. 20. If you fail to re-register you will be removed from the list.

SHORT WORK WEEK SUB PAY: If you work 16 hours or less in a week or have a short work week due to weather you may collect sub for that week but only if it is at the beginning or the end of a layoff. You may NOT collect if you are not laid off. You must complete a sub application at the hall, provide a pay stub for that week and the hall will submit it to the fund office. If you are not laid off and it is due to weather the company MUST provide written documentation that it was weather related.

Executive Board Meeting. The September Executive Board Meeting will be held at 6:00 P.M. on Monday, September 19, 2022.

Message from the Business Manager. A bylaws change was proposed and will be voted on at the next general membership meeting on September 12, 2022. The proposed change will increase the Local Death Benefit from the current rate of \$5 to the amount of \$10 per death. Please consider attending the next meeting to vote on this proposal.

Work Report. Ongoing projects in our jurisdiction that may require additional manpower include; Clements Electric - Liberty Bridge (short calls) and 7 Mile Grow Facility in Bay City as well as Kalitta Air's new hanger in Oscoda. Conti Corporation – multiple projects in Midland's I-Park as well as the grounding and bonding at Michigan Sugar in Bay City.

Nelson Electric – GM Powertrain work starting Labor Day thru the end of the year. Swan Electric – Multiple DTE natural gas pumping stations throughout Zones 1 and 2. J.Ranck Electric – continuing work on phase 1 of the SK Siltron semi-conductor chip manufacturing facility, the second phase of which is valued at over \$300 million and slated to kick off in January 2023. Goyette Mechanical continues PFAS filtration and mitigation work in Oscoda.

Countyline Power has secured upcoming wastewater treatment facility work at Sagining Eagles Landing in Standish, multiple pump stations in the Mt. Pleasant and Clare areas, MDOT Welcome Center remodel in Clare, and runway lighting at Gladwin Airport.

Bay City's Karn 3 & 4 seems to be remaining operational until 2031, which will likely lead to multiple electrical projects this Fall. Robinson Industries in Coleman plans to rebuild facilities damaged in their recent fire, our contractors are expected to secure that work and hire late this year. Northpointe Distribution Center (Frito Lay) will be awarded shortly, signatory contractors are likely to secure the electrical work.

Projects that are currently bidding include East Tawas Wastewater, Bay City State Park Welcome Center, Mio DNR Field Office, and Soaring Eagle Reservation Education Center, all of which are Prevailing Wage projects. Midland City Hall and Isabella County administration buildings re-lighting projects and the Oscoda Holiday Inn Express are also out for bid.

Future projects we are keeping an eye on include Ascension Emergency Room, Waiting Area and Medical Office Building in Standish, Ascension Birthing Center in Tawas, North Peak Brewing in Bay City, and further De-sugarization Process upgrades at Michigan Sugar.

Rest assured both organizers and myself are working very diligently to secure whatever work is being bid in our jurisdiction for our membership. Detroit, Traverse City and Lansing may soon have calls getting into Book II if you are looking to travel. Please contact the hall if you would like to sign any books.

Organizers Report. 692's Organizing team continues to reach out to unrepresented workers in our jurisdiction about the benefits of joining the IBEW. The third quarter of 2022 will see demand for local manpower increase considerably. Sister Local 498 also expects to need help manning projects in their southeastern region, which provide opportunities to 692 members residing in Isabella, Clare, and Gladwin counties. The ability to provide adequate manpower to larger-scale projects will only strengthen our contractors' chances of continually securing this type of work. If you'd like to register on any other IBEW out-of-work lists, please reach out to the hall for details on which locals accept fax registration.

We have noticed a rise in IBEW members employed by out-oftown contractors checking in with the hall before performing their work in Local 692. This is a welcome development as it prevents organizers from making additional trips while policing our large jurisdiction. The easiest way to ensure that contractors are adhering to portability standards is to issue portability referrals to eligible traveling workers. This allows assessments to be paid to Local 692, as they should be. Also, if a contractor is porting the maximum number of employees allowed under our Agreement, they will be required to utilize 692 members to perform any additional work. Bottom line - if you are working for a signatory contactor and told to report to a job outside of your jurisdiction, check in with the hall where you will be working, every time. It's simply the right thing to do. 692 Organizers continue to visit jobsites within our jurisdiction to speak with unrepresented electricians, building relationships and making those workers aware of the opportunities that exist by joining our union. We should never lose sight of the organizing mission that guided the birth and growth of the Brotherhood. Our founders built a strong union by organizing all qualified workers, which allows us to build a higher union density and ultimately increases our bargaining power. Unfortunately, we haven't always made the best decisions when it comes to welcoming all qualified electricians into membership. Organizational policies of the past were often focused on keeping membership numbers steady, often employing electricians to work under our Agreement for years without officially swearing them into membership (some veteran members may recall utilizing white ticket workers to fill open calls decades ago). Exclusionary practices such as that, though perhaps well-intentioned at the time, have proven to be a misstep that we are currently working to correct. There are many simple tasks that all members can perform to help our Local's organizing efforts. Know any non-union electricians? Talk to them about the benefits of becoming a Brother or Sister. Volunteering your time at a community event? Wear an IBEW shirt and represent our Local and speak about the positive aspects of your involvement within our organization. Notice a construction project taking place within our jurisdiction? Call organizers so we can schedule a visit during our travels. Trades set new stage for performing arts at WSU

(Continued from Page 1) and Communication Arts, and has been closely involved with the Gateway Project's design, planning and construction process. "This project is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity and a historic moment for the university." Work on the new theatre is expected to wrap up in early 2023.

Under construction at the corner of Forest and Cass, the Hillberry Gateway Project – the future performance home for the Maggie Allesee Department of Theatre and Dance and the Department of Music - is a dramatic improvement to and augmentation of the aging Hillberry Theatre, which is on the site and has been the home of graduate student theatre productions since 1963

After several years of planning for the creation of new space adjacent to the Hilberry, in 2018 the Wayne State Board of Governors green-lighted construction/ renovation of:

*A new 513-space proscenium theatre with a wide stage and modern "fly loft" for easily moving scenery;

*A second 250-seat "black box" theatre with highly adjustable seating and configurations,

*Numerous backstage areas for set designers, costume creation, dressing rooms, make-up rooms, green rooms and production accommodations. New audio and visual booths will help bolster performances, allowing state-of-the-art audio, video and lighting technology during production.

Meanwhile, stage performances are still ongoing at the adjoining Hillberry Theatre. The project's next phase will renovate and transform that venue into the 350-seat Gretchen C. Valade Jazz Center, plus the 110-seat Jazz Underground.

Rockford Construction Senior Project Manager Krista Amalio said construction began about two years ago at the site, which mostly consisted of space for parking. "At the start we dealt with a lot of underground activity, lots of unknown electrical and piping that took a bit for us to work around," she said. "The site work was a bit of a challenge."

She said the onset of the pandemic led, initially, to a great deal of remote work and Zoom calls among the construction planning team. Fortunately, she said most of the materials had already been ordered, so delays were minimized. Amalio said about 60-80 trades people work on the job on a daily basis. "The project is coming together well," she said. "The workmanship we've seen overall has been wonderful." Wayne State Construction Project Manager Kidest Albaari said the project is creating about 70,000 square feet of new space on campus. She said a water main running on Hancock Street changed their plans a bit, which prevented the addition to the Hilberry Theatre but lead to the creation of a new outdoor public space on the performing arts campus. "It's been one of the largest projects we've seen on campus in quite a while," she said. "Covid was a challenge early on, but Rockford and the trades have been good, and this is coming together well." The new theatre will have a spacious lobby and have space nearby devoted to displaying art owned by Wayne State. The list of modern improvements for the new theatre is long, from the modern LED lighting, to the sound-absorbing construction materials, to unconventional features like the advanced ventilation controls that will allow theatrical smoke to linger on stage. And the entire project, with its big footprint in the neighborhood, can't help but be a positive for

that area of the Midtown campus. Albaari pointed out that the project, while very much in the public's eye, will be of primary benefit to Wayne State students working on their productions, either on stage or in the dedicated

areas elsewhere in building. Wolf agreed, and said there is much more to the project than new performing arts space, which alone "will be a showcase for the university; it's phenomenal to have the university's commitment and dedication to the arts," he said.

A longtime professor of lighting design and director of production for University of North Carolina Greensboro, Wolf, in walking through the new space at Wayne State, has obvious high regard for all the thought that went into the new backstage setup, with its myriad of dedicated rooms to all facets of stage production. The Hillberry Theatre, completed in 1917, can't come close to matching the new

(From the Michigan DNR) Last year, nearly 7,000 deer hunters voluntarily reported their deer harvest online to help test the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' new reporting system. Starting with the fall 2022 deer seasons, online harvest reporting is required for all hunters who successfully take a deer.

Chad Stewart, the DNR's deer, elk and moose management specialist, said there are several reasons the department is moving to online harvest reporting, but one of the most important is more precise data.

"The decline in response rate to our post-season mail surveys increases the amount of uncertainty in our harvest estimates, which can lead to incorrect regulation recommendations in some locations," Stewart said.

Brian Frawley, the DNR wildlife biologist who manages the surveys, agreed. "Twenty years ago, 75 percent of recipients responded to the survey, but in recent years we have seen a response rate consistently under 40 percent," Frawley said. "If we're going to provide hunters, wildlife managers and the Michigan Natural Resources Commission with timely, accurate data, we need to change how we collect it."

Reporting options. Hunters will have up to 72 hours after taking a deer to report their harvest. The DNR estimates it should take about three to five minutes to complete the report, and there are two ways to do it:

•Report online at Michigan. gov/DNRHarvestReport.

•Use the DNR's new mobile app – an even faster option – available in the Google Play store (for Android devices) and the Apple App Store.

Hunters who can't report their harvest due to a lack of internet access or smart device may get help from a family member or friend with access, by providing them with their kill tag license number, date of birth and harvest location to report on the hunter's behalf. Reporting by phone to the DNR is not possible because of

the need for accurate harvest location data, which is provided by selecting the location on a digital map

Why is specific location important? Some hunters have expressed concern about sharing their harvest location, but Stewart stressed the confidentiality and value of that accurate data and how it helps the DNR and, ultimately, hunters.

"While we will have near real-time harvest data available for hunters throughout the season on our website, that data is at the county level," Stewart said. "Only the DNR will have access to the GPS coordinates of the actual harvest location, which is needed for two very important reasons: more effective disease surveillance, and the ability to build a network of harvest locations over time so we can adapt management guidelines to better align with harvest numbers. That means better overall management recommendations for Michigan's

deer population."

The move to required online harvest reporting, like any change, will take some time for people to embrace as part of the Michigan hunting experience, but the DNR is confident the ease of reporting and the benefits of better data will outweigh any initial concerns some may have. This first year will be all about familiarizing hunters with the new reporting requirement.

"Above all, we know Michigan's deer hunters care about quality hunting opportunities and healthy deer herds," said Stewart. "Each online harvest report takes just a few minutes but provides critical information about hunting experiences and deer abundance all over the state."

Editor's note: The new reporting rule is not without controversy due to privacy concerns, and a bill has been introduced in the state House (HB 6354) to rescind the requirement.
