Go ahead and swear, NLRB says

A little profanity or unpleasant speech in pursuit of supporting your union is now permissible when dealing with management, the National Labor Relations Board ruled last

In a ruling from the Lion Elastomers case, the NLRB restored the rights of union representatives to use heated language, including occasional profanity, during arguments with management. The Board ordered Texas employer Lion Elastomers to reinstate steward Joseph Colone with full back pay going back to a 2018 discharge, Labor Notes reported.

The ruling upended the President Trump-NLRB era's infamous General Motors decision, which flipped 70 years of precedent protecting workers' rights, outlawing the use of strong language when pressing union points during grievance discussions and other meetings.

Colone, Labor Notes said, was a United Steelworkers member who had worked for Lion Elastomers at a Texas synthetic rubber plant for 41 years. He was fired largely for making two allegedly uncivil comments during a monthly union-management safety committee meeting. In one outburst, he told the safety and security manager to "just go ahead and leave." In another he said the manager was not doing his job.

"Union supporters are enthusiastic about Elastomers because General Motors was one of the most backward decisions issued in the years the Board was under the control of its Trump-appointed chairman, John F. Ring, a management labor lawyer who steadfastly served employer interests,' Labor Notes reported. "The principle behind *Elastomers* (and the longstanding precedent it brought back to life) is an understanding that grievances and other workplace issues are by nature hot-button disputes where the normal job rules of civility and respect cannot be applied. How could stewards defend their members if they must politely defer to their bosses?"

U.S. job market remains resilient

Economists were surprised once again by the resilience of the U.S. job market, as the Bureau of Labor Statistics on June 2 reported that U.S. employment rose by a seasonally adjusted 339,000 in May, far exceeding expectations and marking the 29th straight monthly increase in employment.

Construction employment joined the fun, rising by 25,000 in May, following an increase of 13,000 in April.


The construction unemployment rate dropped to 3.5 percent in May, from 4.1 percent a month earlier. Meanwhile, average hourly earnings in construction increased 0.4 percent in May (+5.1 percent on a year-over-year basis), faster than overall wage growth as construction labor continues to be scarce in the face of strengthening starts activity.

"Despite its resiliency, construction employment faces strong headwinds in the short term," says Dodge Data and Analytics, indicating that the good jobs report increases the odds of another Federal Reserve interest rate hike in June.

LANSING - Confidence in the prospects for a healthy construction market prompted Superior Electric Great Lakes Co. to seek more workspace in the mid-Michigan region.

On-the-job fatality rates in U.S. remain steady, unfortunately

It's hardly a happy title, but the annual report on workplace fatalities issued April 25 by the AFL-CIO offers some helpful insights on safety and fatality trends in U.S. workplaces.

It is the 32nd year the AFL-CIO has released the report, Death on the Job: The Toll of Neglect, and it outlines the state of safety and health protections for America's workers.

"Federal job safety agencies have issued many important regulations on safety hazards and health hazards like silica and coal dust, strengthened enforcement and expanded worker rights. These initiatives have undoubtedly made workplaces safer and saved lives. But

much more progress is needed." Following are some of the key points from the report, which uses the most recent Bureau of "Over the last 50 years, there Labor Statistics numbers made available from earlier this year (covering 2021). The numbers are naggingly consistent during

the course of this century:

• 343 workers died each day from hazardous working conditions, up from 340 in 2020.

• 5,190 workers were killed on the job in the United States, a 9 percent increase from the 4,764 who suffered fatalities on the job the year prior.

 An estimated 120,000 U.S. workers died from occupational diseases, about the same as last year. That includes slow-moving diseases, such as black lung and silicosis – even after-effects from toxic gases that, 20 years later, still kill former workers who (Continued on Page 3)

Supreme Court sets new curb on union members' right to strike

WASHINGTON (PAI) – By an 8-1 vote, the U.S. Supreme Court curbed workers' right to strike by, in so many words, letting companies sue unions whenever they want in state courts for alleged "damage" strikers cause, even if the National Labor Relations Board is already investigating and handling the dispute.

The six-year-old case is titled Glacier Northwest v. Teamsters Local 174. In it, Glacier, a cement company, sued Local 174 for striking, walking out and letting cement dry in trucks in Glacier's yard, costing it \$100,000 in damage to the trucks, plus lost business. Local 174 denied the charges, saying the workers ensured the cement truck drums were still spinning, keeping cement wet, when they left. It called Glacier's suit retaliatory labor law-breaking.

Under current law, strikes are legal under the National Labor Relations Act unless there is deliberate property damage, violence or both. In plain English, the justices in the majority took away the word "deliberate," letting bosses sue unions for any alleged damage strikes cause.

The decision in outraged Teamsters President Sean O'Brien. AFL-CIO President Liz Shuler predicted that when the case will be tried over again in Washington state, the union will win.

The majority's ruling also upset the dissenter, Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson, who said her colleagues misread the primacy of federal labor law and could make workers "indentured servants."

She said the ruling "places a significant burden on the employees' exercise of their statutory right to strike, unjustifiably undermining Congress's intent. Workers are not indentured servants, bound to continue laboring until any planned work stoppage would be as painless as possible for their master."

The ruling has the potential to stop strikes before they happen - if it can be broadly argued that workers can cause damage to an employer simply by walking off the job. Cornell Law School's analysis said Local 174 cited several cases where opportunistically (Continued on Page 3)

The practical impact of the court's decision is that employers will be suing unions more often for alleged property damage caused by strikes - and that therefore unions (and their attorneys) are likely to be more cautious.

But the Supreme Court did not do what many had feared it would do in this case: overrule longstanding precedent that employers generally cannot sue unions in state court over activities – like strikes – covered by the National Labor Relations Act.

Workers and unions are right Unions still have the right to be furious at this ruling. But we should be careful not to sensationalize or overstate it – which could do more damage to the right to strike than the ruling itself does, by making workers scared to exercise it.

> "American workers must remember that their right to strike has not been taken away," said Teamsters President Sean O'Brien in response to the ruling. "All workers, union and nonunion alike, will forever have the right to withhold their labor."

> The question the Supreme Court considered in the Glacier case was whether the employer could sue Teamsters Local 174 in state court over the allegedly intentional destruction of the company's concrete when striking drivers who had set out with deliveries of ready-mix concrete returned their loaded trucks, requiring the company to dispose of it before it set.

> Prior court cases say that an employer can't sue a union in state court over activity arguably covered by the National Labor Relations Act. Instead, the employer has to go to the National Labor Relations Board.

Flint sites to see a cool \$1.3 billion in investments


FLINT – General Motors on June 5 announced plans to invest \$1.3 billion in two manufacturing sites in the city: Flint Assembly and Flint Metal Center. The investments will employ hundreds of building trades workers – and prepare those plants for production of the next-generation internal combustion engine (ICE) heavy-duty (HD) trucks.

And a former GM property, Buick City, will see a \$300 million investment.

The GM announcement increases the automaker's U.S. manufacturing and parts distribution facility investment commitments to more than \$30.5 billion since 2013 – and its Michigan properties have enjoyed the lion's share of the plant construction. The automaker has more than 50 assembly, stamping, propulsion, component and parts distribution centers nationwide.

A 90% tax rate on the B's?

What happens when you tax billionaires at 90 percent?

We did it before, and the result was the creation of the world's first and largest middle class and a level of peace and prosperity that held its own until Ronald Reagan took a meat-axe to it...

America's billionaires (and soon to be trillionaires) pay an average of around 3.1 percent as their functional income tax rate; as a result, America is the most unequal developed society in the world. The last time severe poverty and extravagant wealth coexisted in such extremes as today in this country was during the 1920s and 1930s.

The last time we saw the consequences of such inequality was during the Republican "Roaring '20s" 100 years ago, when Warren Harding dropped the top income tax rate from 91 percent to 25 percent, the morbidly rich openly bought our politicians, and gangs whose names are still known today roamed the country robbing and killing with impunity.

Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal put an end to all that, and we need to repeat his example today. FDR raised the top income tax bracket from 25 to 90 percent. Wealthy people in America screamed and yelled, claiming it would crash the economy, but instead that top tax rate kicked off the first middle class to encompass more than half a nation's population in world history.

FDR created America's first widespread middle class with a combination of high taxes on the rich and strong unions for working class people. He broke the politically corrupt power of organized wealth for two generations.

Abraham Lincoln was the first president to use the word unions to describe labor organizations; it was such a novelty that newspapers of the day put the word in quotation marks. By the 1920s the union movement had seized the nation, but employers and Republican politicians were still using police, the army, and private armed militias to kill union leaders and intimidate people who wanted to join them.

Franklin Roosevelt put an end to that with the Wagner Act in 1935, fully legalizing unions. By the time Reagan took office in 1981 about a third of Americans had a good union job, and as a result fully two-thirds of American workers had union-level wages and benefits (because unions created the local wage and benefit floor for employers).

The people who were obscenely rich throughout the era from the 1930s to the 1980s had mostly inherited their money from their 19th Century Gilded Age ancestors (the Rockefellers, Vanderbilts, DuPonts, Carnegies, etc.), because the combination of the 90 percent income tax bracket and union demands for meaningful wages kept inequality at reasonable levels.

Rich people were still rich, but that top income tax bracket combined with the power of unions kept the average CEO from taking much more than 30 times what their lowest-paid worker made every year. (Today, some CEOs make more than a thousand times what their workers make.)

FDR's and LBJ's social safety nets caught Americans before they could fall into the dire poverty that characterized earlier eras when Republicans ran the show. Social Security and unemployment benefits both rolled out by FDR in the 1930s – lifted the elderly and the jobless out of poverty, and LBJ's Medicare and Medicaid (1960s) kept Americans healthy.

The result of this was that crime went down and lifespans increased. When the grinding inequality of the Roaring '20s and the Republican Great Depression went away in the 1940s and 1950s, the crime sprees and hatepromoting demagogues went with it. Working people with decent wages and benefits, after all, have neither the time nor the need to

engage in criminal activity. Corporate executives lived and worked in normal - albeit upscale - neighborhoods, and workers made enough to sustain a decent lifestyle.

Nonetheless, the morbidly rich campaigned relentlessly to take us back to the oligarchic 1920s, demanding tax cuts and union-busting. They funded media campaigns, think tanks, publications, judges and politicians.

In 1981 they got their guy into office; Reagan dropped the top tax rate all the way down to 27 percent and destroyed the nation's air traffic controllers union as his opening salvo in the modern-day Republican War Against Workers.

Reaganism kicked off a 42-year-long explosion of wealth at the very top of our economic hierarchy, making today's billionaires richer than the pharaohs.

Simultaneously, the middle class began its collapse from twothirds of us in 1980 all the way down to today's 45 percent (and today it takes two incomes to sustain the same middle class lifestyle that could be done with just one when Jimmy Carter was president).

As the middle class collapsed, lifespans in America followed the same trajectory, unlike other countries in the world that rejected Reaganomics.

To solve this crisis, we must gather and gain the political strength and will to once again raise the top income tax rate up to 90 percent; to overturn the Taft-Hartley Act and restore the right to unionize without interference; and to strip the poison of big money out of our political system.

The morbidly rich will squeal at even the mention of these tried-and-tested solutions, just like they did in the 1930s.

FDR framed the need to raise taxes on the morbidly rich into the 90 percent region. Again, FDR took the truth right to

"You would think, to hear some people talk, that those good people who live at the top of our economic pyramid are being taxed into rags and tatters. What is the fact? The fact is that they are much farther away from the poorhouse than they were in 1932. You and I know that as a matter of personal observation.'

Like today, there were Republican politicians and media commentators who warned about a "welfare nanny state" and predicted that if people weren't kept in near-poverty they'd lose their incentive to work.

Like today, it was a lie.

Republicans act like raising taxes on the morbidly rich, enforcing anti-monopoly laws, returning the right to unionize to workers, and ending the "right" of billionaires and corporations to buy politicians and Supreme Court judges is some sort of radical, untried experiment that will ruin our nation.

It's a lie. When you tax billionaires at 90 percent, they're still fabulously rich and you have the resources to rebuild a healthy and happy middle class across the nation.

We did it before, and the result was the creation of the world's first and largest middle class, a life expectancy never before seen in all of history, and a level of peace and prosperity that held its own until Ronald Reagan took a meat-axe to it.

We can do it again. If we want to preserve our democracy, in fact, we must do it again.

Details of the June 5 announcements include work at:

•Flint Assembly: GM will invest \$788 million to prepare the plant to assemble GM's next-

generation internal combustion heavy duty trucks. Plant updates will include a body shop building expansion, general assembly conveyor expansion, and new tooling and equipment.

Flint Assembly is located on Vanslyke Road. The 5.2 million square-foot plant, now spread over 159 acres, opened in 1947 and has produced more than 15 million vehicles. Workers there currently build truck products: the Chevrolet Silverado Heavy Duty, the GMC Sierra Heavy

•Flint Metal Center: GM will invest \$233 million for new stamping dies to support production of GM's next-generation internal combustion heavy-duty trucks, as well as press refurbishments and new equipment.

Opened in 1954, the Metal Center produces sheet metal stampings for GM's heavy duty and light duty trucks, full size SUVs, and crossovers.

GM said the investments in the Flint plants "highlights the company's commitment to continue providing customers "a strong portfolio" of internal combustion engines "for years to come."

In 2022, GM said it achieved a 38 percent year-over-year increase in heavy duty pickup sales with nearly 288,000 trucks sold. Additionally, the 2023 Chevrolet Silverado Heavy Duty was the best-selling retail full-size HD

GM has now announced more than \$1.7 billion in investments for Flint-area operations in 2023, including \$579 million in Flint Engine Operations for a sixth-generation small block V-8 engine production and \$103.5 million in Davison Road Processing Center for technology upgrades to improve workplace safety and ergonomics.

•Buick City: After GM's announcement, Michigan Gov. Gretchen Whitmer, Flint Mayor Sheldon Neeley and U.S. Rep. Dan Kildee, D-Flint Twp. drove several miles north to the empty, former grounds of GM's Buick City for an announcement of a \$300 million investment at the site. Ground was broken to launch the new Flint Commerce Center, which will be set up to will host industrial tenants. GM left the site in 1999.

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Building Michigan: Safety...last? HISTORY IN THE MAKING By Marty Mulcahy

There are occupations that are more hazardous than construction, among them logging, farming and mining. But construction perennially remains near the top of the list of jobs that are plagued with high rates of injuries and fatalities.

Fortunately, in the years since the passage of the Occupational Safety and Health Act in 1970, the rates of death, disease and injury have plummeted. Contractors, owners and government agencies in recent decades, spurred by humanitarian, productivity and financial incentives, have prioritized on-the-job safety to a degree that would have been either highly unlikely or simply unfathomable a century ago.

Although, there were exceptions.

"In the 1920s, workplace injuries and deaths were common and, in many cases, labor conditions were nothing less than grueling," wrote Samuel Greengard in a paper for workforce.com, Playing It Safe: A Look at Workplace Safety During the Roaring '20s and Now. "Movies played up unsafe conditions, including silentfilm comedian Harold Lloyd's iconic 1923 picture Safety Last! - where a worker is seen dangling perilously from the hands of a large clock near the top of a 12-story building. Government regulations were nearly nonexistent, workers' compensation was still largely voluntary and labor unions hadn't yet emerged as a significant force."


"It was a different era with entirely different thinking," says Tom Leamon, adjunct professor of occupational safety at the Harvard University School of Public Health. That "different thinking" extended back to the start of the Industrial Revolution the 1870s.

"As society moved away from an agrarian lifestyle and toward a more urban, mass-produced one, dangerous working conditions abounded," says a paper by Beck Technology, which performs pre-construction services. "Ridiculously long hours, unsanitary working environments, zero PPE or regulations – all of these became extremely commonplace, and construction was definitely not spared."

Massachusetts, Beck said, was the first state to pass any kind of law in regard to onsite safety. Adopted in 1877, the law required job sites to mandate precautions such as proper fire exits and guards for shafts, gears, and belts. "These are things we take for granted today, but at the time they were passed, they were considered groundbreaking. About a decade later, nine other states would follow in Massachussetts' footsteps and pass their own regulations."

It wasn't until the turn of the 20th Century that the U.S. government would issue federal requirements around construction safety measures. In 1912, the government formed the National Council for Industrial Safety – known simply as the National Safety Council today. This group was tasked with collecting incident/injury data and using it to help develop accident prevention initiatives.

In just a year after its founding, the group found that a total of 19,000-21,000 employees died from workplacerelated injuries. (To compare, there were 5,190 fatal work injuries recorded in the United

States in 2021, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported in December. And that's in a working population far greater than it was a century ago).

Henry Ford is famous and infamous for a number of innovations, but among the least heralded is the establishment of The Ford Motor Co. Safety Dept. as a separate corporate entity in 1914, headed by Robert Shaw. The focus on safety made Ford a bit of a corporate unicorn.

By 1922," said The Henry Ford, "the department had around 30 inspectors, some general and some specialists, it also included a bacteriologist who examined areas in the factory to help stop the spread of disease, and a range of cleaners who sanitized, scrubbed, and scoured every inch of the factory to make sure the environment was as germ-free and clean for the workers as a factory could be.

"Shaw worked not only to fix machines that caused accidents, but also to heighten awareness of unsafe behavior and correct problems before they caused injury. Safety statistics for each department would be compiled monthly and distributed to all the departments for contests with departments competing against each other for the best safety record."

Ford's focus on efficiency, cleanliness and safety extended to his contractors building his company works, including the massive Rouge plant in Dearborn (constructed 1917-1928).

"Shaw extended the Ford safety program outside the company as well and was a founding member of the Detroit **Industrial Safety Council," The** Henry Ford said.

The rise and fall of on-thejob safety standards has been related to economics perhaps as much an any other factor.

"In 1929 the United States plummeted into economic depression, and stopped virtually all industrial production and construction," said A History of Occupational Health and Safety: From 1905 to the Present by Michelle Follette Turk (2017). "The shift prompted widespread unemployment, but the employed were only slightly better off. Most work opportunities required temporary, unskilled labor with low wages and little career advancement. To retain jobs, employees regularly ignored safety standards, subjecting themselves and coworkers to dangerous working conditions. The harmful effects of industrial diseases – carbon monoxide, silica, lead poisoning, and others – were well documented but consistently overlooked."

In the past few decades, simple humanitarian enlightenment spurred many owners and contractors to establish a culture of safety on their job sites. But that shift came after decades of dark-age attitudes.

"The history of safety in construction is fraught with accidents and fatalities, with true focus on improving safety only emerging within the last 50-80 years," says a paper by Perlo Construction. In fact, at the time of the construction of the Golden Gate Bridge in San Francisco (1933-37), it was expected that one person would die for every \$1 million spent on a project. The Golden Gate job was the first project to mandate the use of hard hats.

The arrival of construction industry safety improvements were agonizingly slow, and piecement, over the ensuing decades. For the electrical industry, for example, the lockout/ tagout standard to de-energize and secure equipment was standardized by OSHA in 1989. A new worker ergonomics standard was adopted by OSHA in 2000, but it was repealed by President Bush in 2001. OSHA upgraded its silica dust standard in 2016 to help reduce permissible exposure levels for masons and other trades.

Hi-visibility clothes didn't start to become a mandatory safety feature for workers on many of Michigan's construction sites until 2010 or so.

Contractors' safety focus during this decade has varied, but mandatory safety glasses on many sites came become standard issue, as have the use of gloves on some projects.

"Tool talks" over safety and job concerns between contractors and workers have become the norm on many jobs, as have regular safety meetings. Contractors have held drawings with some terrific prizes on larger jobs to encourage safe behavior.

Construction sites today are safer than ever, but they're hardly perfect. The "fatal four" falls, struck-by, electrocutions, and caught-in or between – are a constant focus of MIOSHA and responsible contractors.

"As a society, we have become a lot more conscious and focused on safe working environments," says Jack Glass, principal consultant at J. Tyler Scientific Co., a New Jersey-based environmental consulting and services firm. "We also witnessed remarkable advances in ergonomics and achieved a far greater understanding of what safety is and how to achieve it."

Supreme Court sets new curb on union members' right to strike

(Continued from Page 1) timed strikes were previously deemed protected, including a strike at a poultry plant and a strike at a cheese factory timed to maximize product spoilage.

According to Local 174, in both the prior cases and on the present facts, there was no "affirmative" act that caused physical damage; instead, the workers merely stopped working. Local 174 contends that if those examples were "actually protected," the circumstances here must be at least "arguably protected."

The NLRB General Counsel agreed with the union and took over the case, but Glacier went to Washington State Supreme Court to argue it could sue the union for damages. That court threw the case out, saying federal law preempted Glacier's damages claim. The U.S. Supreme Court majority overwhelmingly disagreed.

"By reporting for duty and pretending as if they would deliver the concrete, the drivers prompted the creation of the perishable product," the cement, Justice Amy Coney Barrett wrote. 'Then, they waited to walk off the job until the concrete was mixed and poured in the trucks. In so doing, they not only destroyed the concrete but also put Glacier's trucks in harm's way."

Because they did so, in Coney Barrett's lengthy retelling of the dispute, Glacier could sue the union for damages. The ruling reverses precedents and opens the

(Continued from Page 1) toiled on "The Pile" in Manhattan after the 9/11 attacks.

•The job fatality rate increased from 3.4 to 3.6 per 100,000 workers, but has remained in that range for the past decade. But the death rate was 5.2 deaths per 100,000 workers

· Black workers died on the job at the highest rate in more than a decade.

•Latino workers continue to be at greater risk of dying on the job than all workers.

•Employers reported nearly 3.2 million work-related injuries and illnesses.

·Workplace violence, musculoskeletal disorders from repetitive motion injuries and occupational heat illness continue to be major problems. but data no longer is reported annually to track and understand these important issues.

•Underreporting is widespread – the true toll of workrelated injuries and illnesses is 5.4 million to 8.1 million each year in private industry.

In Michigan fatal work injuries totaled 140 in 2021 up from 131 in 2020, the U.S Bureau of Labor Statistics reported in February. Fatal occupational injuries in the state have ranged from a high of 182 in 1999 to a low of 94 in 2009 (when the economy cratered) In Michigan, transportation incidents resulted in 47 fatal work injuries and accounted for 34 percent of all fatal workplace injuries in the state in 2021.

Michigan's rate of 3.3 deaths per 100,000 workers in 2021 - a number consistent over the past decade - ranked our state No. 17 among the states, tied with a host of others.

States with the highest fatality rates in 2021 were: Wyoming (10.4 per 100,000 workers); North Dakota (9.0); Montana (8.0); Louisiana (7.7); Alaska (6.2); New Mexico (6.2).

The private construction industry sector had the highest number of fatalities in Michigan with 29 in 2021, up from 23 in the previous year. Transportation incidents resulted in eight of the 29 fatalities.

The AFL-CIO responded to the report: "Preventing injury, illness and death at work to restore dignity, save lives, improve livelihoods, and reduce burdens on families and communities must be a high priority. Employers must meet their responsibilities to protect workers and be held accountable if they put workers in danger. Only then can the promise of safe jobs for all of America's workers be fulfilled. There is much more work to be done to ensure the fundamental right to a safe job is a reality for all."

floodgates to similar expensive lawsuits by firms against striking unions

O'Brien said the ruling showed the court's tilt towards the corporate class and the "billionaires ...they socialize with at cocktail parties and who they owe their jobs to in the first place." The justices "are not upholding the law," he added.

"American workers must remember their right to strike has not been taken away. All workers, union and nonunion alike, will forever have the right to withhold their labor. The Teamsters will strike any employer, when necessary, no matter their size or the depth of their pockets," he

"Unions will never be broken by this court or any other. Today's shameful ruling is simply one more reminder the people cannot rely on their government or their courts to protect them. They cannot rely on their employers. We must rely on each other."

Shuler predicted that in a rerun of the company's case in Washington state courts, the union would win. "The Supreme Court unnecessarily gave the employer another bite at the apple" by relying on "unfounded allegations in the employer's complaint that the union intended to damage the cement trucks when it called the strike," she said.

to protect employer property. For example, in one case, employees walked out of a foundry when molten iron was ready to be poured – which the court found could have caused substantial property damage.

This exception is narrow: failure to take reasonable precautions to prevent foreseeable, imminent, aggravated damage to employer property. It doesn't include things like economic losses due to temporary closure of a store or factory, strawberries rotting in the field because farmworkers are on strike, or milk going sour in the fridge because baristas have walked out.

The trial court in Washington state dismissed Glacier's claim because it found that the Teamsters' strike action was arguably protected under the National Labor Relations Act. The Washington State Supreme Court affirmed.

The U.S. Supreme Court has now overruled that decision and sent the case back to the trial court, because it says that - assuming the facts alleged in the employer's complaint are true – the union did not take reasonable precautions to prevent concrete from hardening.

The Supreme Court did not order the trial court to decide against the union, just that the case be allowed to proceed. And it left open the possibility for the state courts to dismiss the case again, depending on what the NLRB does about a pending unfair labor practices complaint against Glacier related to the same strike.

The NLRB issued its complaint against Glacier after the Washington State Supreme Court affirmed dismissal of the state court case. The U.S. Supreme Court explicitly did not rule on whether the lawsuit would have been preempted if the NLRB had issued the complaint

Depending on how future cases play out in state and federal court, Glacier could end up being a relatively small change to labor law, or another in an escalating series of court decisions chipping away at the right to strike.

Already the laws are stacked against powerful strikes. Employers routinely obtain injunctions limiting where and how many strikers can picket; economic strikers can be permanently replaced; secondary targets often can't be picketed; and so on.

Similarly, right-wing attorneys and judges will try to build on Glacier to expand employers' ability to sue unions. But for the moment, the labor movement may have dodged a bullet.

predicting a slowdown, possibly a recession, for much of the past year. •Higher, and volatile people and material costs are continuing to wear on the industry. Rycon CEO John Sabatos told ENR that the volatility is prompting owners to "weigh whether to pause projects or cancel them altogether." Further, bid increases "will not be able to be recovered by simply making designs more efficient." Worker overtime, then, becomes a costly necessity.

•Fatigue is setting in more than three years after the start of the Covid pandemic, and the disruptions it has wrought. McShane Cos. CEO Molly McShane told the magazine: "It's been a long two-to-three years working through labor shortages and supply chain issues, and people are getting worn out."

For Southfield-based Barton Malow, the availability of projects isn't what ultimately affects bottom lines. "The projects are still all out there regardless of various economic indicators," says Chuck Binkowski, COO and executive vice president. "The biggest impact to our bottom line comes back to labor availability. He added, "There hasn't been the natural progression in talent replacement that we see in other industries. The veterans have left or are leaving and there isn't enough coming in to replace them."

For Michigan's top construction contractors on the ENR Top 400 list, the revenue rankings from 2022 to 2023 had a familiar look near the top. For at the past three decades, Barton Malow and Detroit's Walbridge have perenially led Michigan's contractors on the list, and this year's company rankings were no different. Barton Malow was again tops in revenue among Michigan's contractors and No. 25 in the nation in 2023, improving five positions from 2022. Next was Walbridge, No. 34, improving five positions from 2022.

Other Michigan-based contractors on the 2023 Top 400 List included The Christman Co., Lansing (No. 85, improved from No. 87, +2); Commercial Contracting Corp., Auburn Hills (182, +72); Aristeo, Livonia (No. 238, +1); Granger Construction, Lansing (No. 241, +1); Wieland, Lansing (No. 264, -118); Rockford Construction, Grand Rapids (No. 269, -23); Clark Construction, Lansing (No. 306, -85); Pioneer General Contractors, Grand Rapids (No. 313, +1), and Roncelli, Inc., Sterling Heights (No. 372, -9).

Among the top five contractors on the entire list: The Turner Corp., NYC; Bechtel, Reston, Virg.; MasTec, Inc., Coral Gables, Fla.; Kiewit, Omaha, Neb., and STO Building Group, NYC.

It's an unusual construction marketplace, and it varies from place to place and among contractors. "Some market segments are flush with optimism and are looking to capitalize on pent-up consumer demand," said John Cannito, president and CEO of PENTA Building Group, ranked No. 128, to ENR. "Others are more cautious, with concern about a potential recession." He said those "two extremes" are driving owners to make decisions based on a false sense of security in experiences that do not transcend all markets.

Managing cost volatility continues to be a top priority for firms, says Rycon Construction Inc. CEO John Sabatos, as owners weigh whether to pause projects or cancel them altogether, "which will in turn cause a slowdown in construction starts.'

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



If you are working in the City of Detroit or the State of Michigan,

there MUST be a city or state license on the job! It doesn't matter if you are doing standby, unloading a truck, doing cabs and flooring, running a car, mod, construction, repair, or contract service you must have a licensed elevator constructor on the job.

I just wanted to remind anyone doing safety tests, you are doing these tests under your State or City license. You are to perform these tests per State or City code and not the time frame your boss tells you it takes.

Anyone driving a personal vehicle during working hours, Mechanics can carry their personal tools, meter, safety bag and a drill, Apprentices can carry their safety bag. You are not to transport anything for the company in your personal vehicle, if they need something taken out to a job, they have company trucks, boss's trucks, and other means to transport the material.

As you are aware, individuals with a Mechanic Exam Pass Date on or after Jul 9, 2022, must take a Mechanic Required (MR) Continuing Education course in 2023 to receive their scheduled pay raises Jan. 1, 2024. I highly recommend if you fall in this category and haven't

done so, take the course and keep up on it.

If you are going to be working in another local's area, you and your Apprentice MUST call their hall to make sure it is ok to work, don't take your supervisor's word for it.

If you start a new job in MOD/construction, you **MUST** call those jobs into the hall!! If you are going to be working a 4/10 job in construction or MOD, it **MUST** be submitted in writing to the Local Business Representative per Article VII Par. 2A. and Article VIII(A) Par. 2A.

Anyone interested in becoming a State of Michigan Elevator inspector, contact the State of Michigan or call the Hall.

Anyone interested in getting certified in Welding, you can sign up with NEIEP @ Local 85 or call Mike Janca.



Job creation rises, as does the nation's jobless rate

WASHINGTON (PAI) – Private sector businesses claimed to create a net of 283,000 new jobs in May, the Bureau of Labor

Statistics reported June 2. The U.S. unemployment rate increased 0.3 percent to 3.7 percent. Governments added 56,000 new jobs, with just over half of them in local governments and schools and another third in state government and schools.

The number of unemployed increased by 440,000, to 6.097 million, BLS added. But while the coronavirus pandemic's emergency was lifted and the pandemic is "officially" over, its impact continues to run through the jobs market.

"While the boost in government jobs is welcome news, state and local employment is still down 1.4 percent since Feb 2020," the last report before the pandemic really hit. "Private-sector jobs fell further and came back stronger due to large-scale policy investments. Lagging public sector jobs is concerning for the vital services

they provide," Economic Policy in May, and both were in ser-Institute Senior Analyst Elise Gould tweeted.

Superior Electric flips the switch on new building; targets mid-state market

up last month. Superior Electric Regional Director/Project Management Jim Baker was tasked with managing the project for the company.

Baker led the company's efforts to find the space, redesign it from its past purpose as a sporting goods store, and create a new, efficient space for the building's 17 employees. "We have phenomenal people here," he said. "And we're trying to make a nice environment for our staff, and treat them they way they want to be treated."

Last fall Superior Electric Great Lakes Co. was recognized by Crains Detroit Business among the top 10 in their category for medium-sized companies, and 28th overall for "100 Cool Places to Work in Michigan." The company was founded in 1950 by William Hull and his wife Viola, in their Lansing home.

Today Superior Electric is a full-service, employee-owned electrical contractor with extensive engineering and design experience. It provides union-backed electrical services for large and midsize industrial and commercial projects in manufacturing, automotive, oil and gas, health care, civil/state and specialty industries throughout the nation.

Baker said with major projects like the nearby Ultium Cells battery plant, expansion work at a wastewater treatment plant in East Lansing and projects at the GM-Delta Twp. plant ongoing or on the horizon, Superior Electric and the rest of the area's construction industry likely has a solid window of work ahead. The company is already employing some 250 electricians on area projects.

"It's been 28 years for us working in Lansing, and it it's time that we established a home here," Baker said. "Our folks have identified five years of work ahead, and it's great to have that kind of certainty in employment."

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Outdoors Cheers to the Kirtland's Warbler

The tiny, gray-and-yellow bird known as the Kirtland's warbler is a lot of things.

First, it's extremely rare, with only a few thousand of the birds alive anywhere – 95 percent of them in Michigan's northern Lower Peninsula. A comparative handful of others are found in Wisconsin, Minnesota and On-

Second, it's a conservation success story, the first passerine (perching songbird) removed from the federal endangered species list in 2019, although it remains on Michigan's threatened species list.

It's also a life-list must for birdwatchers who flock to Michigan to see or hear the bird each

And the warbler is extremely picky about where it lives, nesting only on the ground under the sheltering branches of shrub-like, young jack pine trees.

Tall trees won't cut it as condo space for this rare bird, which is why people may notice some large jack pine harvests in the northern Lower Peninsula this

The warbler also needs lots of space. And nesting birds favor the edges of clearings.

This why the bird needs human help to survive and thrive into the future.

"Jack pine is a fire-dependent species, which means the cones need heat to open," said Keith Kintigh, acting supervisor of the Planning and Adaptation Section for the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' Wildlife Division. "Because we protect against wildfire to keep communities safe, the large-scale fires that historically created the habitat the birds need aren't regularly happening."

That leaves cutting and replanting as the best way to make sure warblers have the conditions and space they need to thrive.

"The DNR will plant 1 million to 1.5 million jack pines on

1,000 to 1,500 acres per year to sects and berries, and they incucreate Kirtland's warbler habitat," said Jason Hartman, silviculturist for the DNR's Forest Resources Division.

Combined, the DNR and the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Forest Service contract for the harvest of about 2,000 to 3,000 acres per year to create young forest for the bird.

Most of those cuts are sized at 300 acres or more, since the warbler prefers to have room to roam. They will rarely nest in disturbed areas that are less than

Trees also are cut and planted into patterns that allow for many clearings that warblers prefer, a pattern known as the "opposing wave." It's sometimes also referred to fondly as "the warbler weave."

The warbler's story. The Kirtland's warbler – about 5.5 inches from beak to tail - was first identified and named in, of all places, Ohio. In May of 1851, Jared Kirtland, a doctor and naturalist, spotted some birds as they passed through Ohio on their way to Michigan from their winter home in the Bahamas.

He started the process to determine if the bird was separate and distinct from others in the wood warbler family.

bate about four eggs each year.

Besides the loss of habitat and suppression of wildfire, the warbler population also shrank through the 1980s due to brownheaded cowbirds.

The cowbirds are called nest parasites because they lay their eggs in the nests of other birds, leaving those other species to raise its young. The host bird parents typically cater to the largest birds in the nest, which in this case is the cowbird young.

Inattention by the parents leaves the young warblers to wither and often die.

Efforts to trap, poison or otherwise remove the cowbirds from areas where the warbler nests have helped ensure that warbler babies can thrive.

Bringing the Kirtland's warbler back from the brink of extinction and making sure it has appropriate nesting space has been a conservation success story that will continue into the future, said William Rapai, executive director of the Kirtland's Warbler

Created in 2014, the alliance is one of many public and private groups working together to ensure the warbler thrives.

because of its unusual story,' Rapai said. "This is a bird of fire. Unfortunately, we can't allow fire to run wild across the landscape anymore, so we have to harvest trees and plant young trees to accommodate it."

He pointed out that other species such as turkey, grouse, whitetail deer and snowshoe hare also benefit from the young forests and open spaces that warblers

And because it creates clear spaces on the landscape, the cutting of older trees also reduces the risk of later fire. Jack pine trees have a relatively short life as trees go, and they become a greater fire risk when they are older and

"If we do not harvest those trees, it increases the chance of a disastrous fire that could run across the landscape and do tremendous damage, not just to forests but to people and their houses and property," Rapai said.

Want to see a Kirtland's warbler? The Michigan Audubon Society and Hartwick Pines State Park work together to offer birdwatching tours to find the Kirtland's warbler in the wild from May 27-June 30.

Tours are at 7 a.m. weekdays "People come from all over and 7 a.m. and 11 a.m. Saturdays Kirtland's warblers eat in- the world to see it every spring and Sundays and leave from

Michigan Forest Visitor Center at Hartwick Pines, located along M-93, just east of I-75, near Grayling. Tours cost \$15 per person, and a state Recreation Passport is needed to enter the park.

Dress appropriately for the weather and be prepared to walk up to a mile or so with good shoes or boots. Sunscreen, bug repellent and a hat will help keep you comfortable on the tour. Binoculars, a spotting scope or a camera with a telephoto lens are helpful in getting a good look at the warblers. Register at www.michiganaudubon.org/kirtlands-warbler-tours/ for: June 17–23 or June 24–30.

The Forest Service offers guided tours of warbler habitat in the Huron-Manistee National Forest and a self-guided map for a driving tour.

To learn more, contact the Mio Ranger Station or email sm.fs.miokwtours@usda.gov.

The self-guided tour is a 58mile driving route through pine barrens favored by the warbler and other types of wildlife. You can also learn more through a story map. Be aware that warbler nesting grounds are closed to foot traffic during breeding season, although you may observe birds

from the roadsides.

Celebrate the bird. Across Michigan, the story of the comeback of Kirtland's warblers is a worthy success lauded by many. Efforts to showcase the warbler and even celebrate its occurrence in our state bear witness to our affinity with this species.

The Kirtland's warbler even appears on a specialized Michigan license plate. In short, the bird is the word.

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
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
