Line 5 tunnel is 'years' from starting

The proposed \$500 million Line 5 tunnel project under the Straits of Mackinac, which has been a matter of public discussion since 2018, is "years" from breaking ground, according to a spokesman for Enbridge, the company seeking to undertake the project.

An earlier timeline by Ebridge for the project said the five-mile long utility tunnel could be under construction in 2021 and complete as early as 2024 – but state legal action and permit holdups have obviously quashed that schedule.

The news service MIRS reported on Oct. 12 that Ryan Mitchell, the Michigan Department of Transportation representative for the Mackinac Straits Corridor Authority, said the National Environmental Policy Act review process by the Environmental Protection Agency to create an environmental impact statement had just started in August and would not have a final report for "quite some time."

"I don't have an accurate or reliable timeline, but it is generally considered to be a two-year process," Mitchell said.

U.S. Army Corps of Engineers documents say the environmental impact study isn't expected to be complete until 2024, MIRS reports. Permits are also being sought from the Michigan Public Service Commission.

The project would retire the 1950s-era dual Line 5 petroleum pipelines that sit on the lake bed of Straits, creating a new line set in a tunnel between St. Ignace and Mackinac City.

"To date, Enbridge has invested more than \$100 million on the project," said company spokesman Ryan Duffy. 'Enbridge remains intensely focused on obtaining the required permits to construct the project."

Construction input costs rise 12.6%

Ouch. The price of materials and services used in nonresidential construction jumped 12.6 percent in September from a year earlier despite a dip of 0.2 percent in September, according to an Oct. 12 analysis by the Associated General Contractors of America.

The rise in the producer price index for those inputs outpaced the 8.5 percent year-overyear rise in the overall producer price index for finished goods.

Diesel fuel lead the price hikes, it was up 65.9 percent from the year before and rose 11.7 percent in September.

Whitmer's resurrection of prevailing wage law upheld by claims judge

LANSING - A 2021 policy set by Gov. Gretchen Whitmer to re-implement elements of the formerly buried Michigan Prevailing Wage Act was upheld on Oct. 10 by Michigan Court of Claims Judge Douglas Shapiro.

In his ruling, Shapiro agreed with the plaintiffs - the Michigan **Building and Construction Trades** Council and the Michigan Department of Technology, Management and Budget (DTMB) - that Whitmer's interpretation of state law "did not restrict defendant (the state) from establishing its own prevailing wage policy based on its authority to develop the terms of state contracts."

Whitmer's announcement of the reinstatement of prevailing wage on certain state contracts was announced at an event in October 2021 at the Plumbers and Pipe Fitters Local 333 Train-

ing Center in Lansing, and then formally implemented on March 1. The effect of her decree was limited: it would generally apply to work at state-owned buildings, but doesn't apply to big-ticket projects like school work (which is usually locally contracted) or road work (which usually uses federal money and thus already invokes prevailing wage rules).

But reinstatement has been a major benefit to workers, prompting a state-sponsored update of often years-old prevailing wage rates in various localities in Michigan, which can now be used as wage guides by local municipalities utilizing their own prevailing wage laws.

"We're very pleased we won the case," said Michigan Building and Construction Trades Council attorney John Canzano, "and I think we have a good chance of the ruling being affirmed on appeal.' (Continued on Page 3)

U.S. construction industry still has significant upside

Of course, it would be rather nice to have the highest wage gains the U.S. construction industry has seen since the early 1980s without having to countenance that aggravatingly similar high inflation rate for goods and

But here we are. We're in a most unusual economic environment, with high wages, high inflation (8.3 percent), high numbers of job openings, low unemployment (3.4 percent), and a nagging low pool of workers seeking

Around the corner in the coming months are expectations of an economic slowdown and even fears of a recession, but as the fourth quarter of 2022 began, the nation's construction industry finds itself in relatively good

"Average hourly earnings for production and nonsupervisory employees in construction – craft and office workers – increased 6.7 percent from September 2021 to last month, the largest gain in 40 years," the Associated General Contractors reported Oct. 7. That outpaced the average 5.8 percent wage increase for the overall private sector.

A fairly strong demand for construction workers is helping to drive the wage hikes. "The construction industry added 19,000 employees in September as it boosted wages for hourly workers at the fastest rate in 40 years," the AGC said. Even with the pay hikes, association officials said many contractors are still having a difficult time finding qualified

workers to hire. "Contractors are raising pay faster than other sectors and are hiring more workers," said Ken Simonson, the AGC's chief economist. "But job openings going into September were at record levels and the industry's unemployment rate last month was close to an all-time low, suggesting that jobs will remain hard to fill."

Total U.S. construction employment moved up by 19,000 employees to 7.71 million in September, an increase of 292,000 or 3.9 percent from a year earlier. Nonresidential firms added 13,100 employees for the month. Conversely, there were 437,000 construction industry job openings at the end of August, an increase of 47,000 or 12 percent from a year earlier. The figure is the largest August total since that series began in 2000, Simonson added, citing government data (Continued on Page 3)

DOL seeks to lessen 1099 cheating

WASHINGTON (PAI) – The Labor Department plans to switch course and make it tougher for firms to misclassify workers – and tougher to rob them of the right to organize, obtain jobless benefits, and get workers compensation.

In a new proposed federal rule published Oct. 13, the DOL said it wants to "both rescind" the Trump Administration's existing pro-corporate scheme "and replace it with detailed regulations addressing multifactor economic

reality – in a way that more fully... be helpful for both workers and employers."

"The Biden Administration once again delivered on its promise to put working people first," said AFL-CIO President Liz Shuler. "By restoring commonsense rules to determine who is an employee, and making it harder for employers to intentionally misclassify their employees as independent contractors, the Department of Labor's announcement will increase protections and expand benefits to so many

working people who have been an "employee" or an "independent subjected to corporate work-

arounds," she said. "Too many companies put profits over people, intentionally misclassifying their workers as contractors to avoid providing the pay, overtime, workplace rights and benefits employees are due under labor and employment laws. This proposed rule will ensure DOL has the tools to protect employees against the current and escalating problem of misclassification."

Under the new proposal, the DOL would judge if a worker is

contractor" (who receives an IRS Form 1099) based on "the totality of circumstances" on the job.

That would include not just who sets schedules – the employer or the employee – but who sets work rules, if the firm can hire or fire the worker, pay, benefits, and requirements such as driving company vehicles and using company materials and carrying out company orders.

A guide for union voters

I am a retired member of IBEW Local 445 in Battle Creek and have been a member of the IBEW for more than 43 years. Because of the wages and benefits fought for and secured by the union, I have enjoyed a very comfortable life both while working and as a retiree. I was able to provide for myself and my family: I live in a comfortable home, put food on the table, take nice vacations, and drive nice vehicles (American-made of course). I have a very good life!

Unlike millions of Americans, I don't worry about the cost of health care. The health insurance I receive through the union is more than adequate. Let's be honest. None of us would be where we are today without a strong union and without a government that supports us as union members.

I am very concerned about the possible outcome of the upcoming midterm elections. If Republicans control the House and Senate in Congress, the working men and women of this great country we live in will suffer. Everything we have worked for as union tradesmen and everything our predecessors worked for will be in jeopardy.

In my estimation, Democrats have shown over the years that they support the working men and women - me and you - and recognize the need for labor to organize in order to maintain the wages and benefits that we all enjoy. A case in point on the national level is the comparison of two recent bills submitted in Congress.

In February 2021, Sen. Patty Murray (D-Wash.) introduced the 'Protection of the Right to Organize Act" in the Senate. The bill is intended to remedy the disparity between income for working families and the middle class and the income enjoyed by corporations and the wealthiest 1 percent of Americans.

Recognizing the importance of unions to increasing wages and rewarding hard-working people, the act protects the basic right to

- 1. Introducing meaningful, enforceable penalties for companies and executives that violate workers' rights
- 2. Expanding workers' collective bargaining rights and closing loopholes that corporations use to exploit workers
- 3. Strengthening workers' access to fair union elections and

requiring corporations to respect the result.

Contrast the bill introduced by Republican Sen. Marco Rubio (R-Fla.) and U.S. Rep. Jim Banks (R-Ind.) in February 2022, captioned the "Teamwork for Employees and Managers (TEAM) Act." If you look past the name, you will see that the act does nothing to help working people. Nevertheless, in his press release, Sen. Rubio attempts to spin the Act as one intended to help the American worker:

"Unfortunately," Rubio said, "current law makes it impossible for employers to have any meaningful discussion about workplace conditions with a non-unionized group of employees. . . . Our bill solves this problem by creating a pro-worker alternative to unions, which are notoriously left-wing and almost always pit workers

against management, only worsening the workplace environment.' According to Rubio, "the TEAM Act would breathe fresh air into the American labor movement, which has left behind hard working Americans for far too long." Given the obvious purpose of Rubio's bill – to further erode the ability of unions to protect the American worker – it's difficult to understand why any union member would vote Republican.

I am also concerned on the state level. The Republican-controlled Legislature in Michigan has consistently acted against the interest of working men and women.

In 2012, it was the Republican party that passed right-to-work legislation in our state. After signing the legislation into law Gov. Rick Snyder remarked, "This is a major day in Michigan's history." Like most union tradesmen, I saw it as a very horrible day in Michigan's history for the working men and women of our state.

Our unions are now required to represent workers who reject the union but still have all of the right to representation and fair wages as if they were union members – even though these people don't pay a single dime in union dues.

In 2011, the Republican-controlled Michigan Legislature passed bills - signed into law by Snyder - doing away with the Michigan Business Tax and enacting other laws favorable only to small business. But in order to pay for these tax breaks that are beneficial to business and not the people whose sweat makes businesses profitable, laws were enacted requiring retiree benefits be taxed. (Gov. Whitmer is attempting to change the taxing of retirees benefits.)

In 2018, the Republican-controlled Michigan Legislature repealed the Michigan Prevailing Wage Act that had been in place since 1965. The claim was that state and local governments would save money if they were not required to pay the prevailing wage. Study after study has shown that the only thing that has come of repealing prevailing wage laws is a significant decrease in wages with little fiscal benefit to government entities.

For example in a January 2018 study published by the Midwest Policy Institute, the authors concluded that the 2015 repeal of Indiana's prevailing wage statute led to an 8.5 percent decrease in construction workers' income. Thankfully, in October 2021 Gov. Whitmer reinstated the prevailing wage requirement for many construction projects contracted on behalf of the State of Michigan.

It should be obvious to all of us that Democrats will support our interests far more often that the Republicans. Do I always agree with the Democratic Party and their platform(s)? Certainly not. But if the examples of actual legislative action do not make you realize how the Republicans affect your pocketbook, and how Democrats are in favor of helping you, then I don't know what will. I do know Democrats are far more interested and engaged with the working men and women than their counterparts.

Some people vote for a candidate who supports a point of view on a specific issue – be it Second Amendment rights, abortion, immigration, etc. – despite the fact that the candidate's other priorities are completely contrary to keeping the right to organize, and therefore union jobs, safe. I cannot take that approach to deciding how to cast my vote.

I am a single issue person who votes for a candidate who will look after my health and welfare as well as my pocketbook. If you are singularly focused on a particular issue - Second Amendment, abortion, immigration, voter registration, etc. – then go vote for that candidate. However, remember this, the lifestyle that we enjoy exists because of the benefits we receive as union members.

We have a right and a duty to vote. When you vote this November, I strongly encourage you to vote Democrat.

should go even further and write stronger worker protections into law. The Protect The Right To Organize (PRO) Act, labor's No.1 congressional priority – idled by a corporate-backed Senate Republican filibuster threat - would curb bosses' abuse of calling workers "independent contractors," among other changes.

Biden's DOL dumped Trump's pro-corporate independent contractor rule in March 2021, but corporate chieftains found a Republican-named federal judge in rural East Texas - their favorite court area - to restore it. Biden's proposed rule would override that judge's decision, DOL says.

The problem, DOL said, lies in the definition of who's an "independent contractor" and who's an "employee." The Trump system, pushed by bosses, made the independent contractor category as broad as possible. Biden's DOL, favoring "employees," wants to restore the pre-Trump difference federal courts upheld for years.

Misclassifying workers as "independent contractors" under federal labor law is a favorite corporate strategy to shortchange workers.

If workers are "employees," they have the right to unionize, enjoy the NLRA's protections however weak - and qualify for the federal minimum wage, plus overtime pay if they toil more than 40 hours a week.

They also come under the Social Security Act and workers' comp laws, which force bosses to pay payroll taxes to fund all three earned benefits.

But if bosses can get away with calling workers "independent contractors," working for themselves, even when they don't, the bosses don't pay the taxes or overtime. In the construction industry, that provides a huge competitive bidding advantage for unscrupulous, nonunion con-

impact for our cooperative," said Mark Flegenheimer, the retiring president of the company, which was founded in 1906 and became a grower-owned cooperative in 2002. "This is a historic day for our owners, our employees, our customers and our community.'

Michigan Sugar is linked with nearly 900 grower-owners, who harvest about 160,000 acres of sugarbeets each year in 20 Michigan counties, as well as in Ontario. Those beets are sliced at the company's factories and turned into about 1.2 billion pounds of sugar annually.

The project began about a year ago and is expected to be complete in October 2023. Once operational, the company expects to process as much as 650 tons of molasses daily, up from the current amount of 325 tons per day.

"Simply put, we can sell sugar at a higher price than we sell molasses," Flegenheimer said. "Our nearly 900 growerowners will see added annual revenue of \$10 million to \$15 million, in perpetuity.'

The new facility's "desugaring" process of the molasses they produce will allow Michigan Sugar to produce up to 80 million more pounds of sugar

annually without any additional sugarbeet planting. The company's grower-owners annually plant and harvest about 160,000 acres of sugarbeets. "That means 80 million more pounds without any additional passes over our farm fields with our equipment, without any further spraying of our crops to ward off disease and pests, and without burning any additional fuel on our farms to

expand operations," Herford said. Michigan Sugar Co. was

founded in 1906 when six smaller sugar companies merged their operations. In 2002, Michigan Sugar became a grower-owned cooperative, and in 2004, it merged with Monitor Sugar Co. to form the company that exists today.

Headquartered in Bay City, the company has sugarbeet processing facilities in Bay City, Caro, Croswell and Sebewaing. Their sugar is sold to industrial, commercial and retail customers under the Pioneer and Big Chief brands.

Today, CEOs of big corporations are playing the tricky "Inflation Blame Game!"

Publicly, they moan that the pandemic is slamming their poor corporations



shutdowns. supply chain delays, wage hikes, and other increased costs. But wait - inside

their board rooms, executives are high fiving each other and pocketing bonuses. What's going on?

The trick is that these giants are in non-competitive markets operating as monopolies, so they can set prices, mug you and me, and scamper away with record profits. In 2019 for example, before the pandemic, corporate behemoths hauled in roughly a trillion dollars in profit.

In 2021, during the pandemic, they grabbed more than \$1.7 trillion. This huge profit jump accounts for 60 percent of

the inflation now slapping U.S.

Take supermarket goliath Kroger. Its CEO gloated last summer that "a little bit of inflation is always good in our business." adding that "we've been very comfortable with our ability to pass on (price) increases" to consumers.

"Comfortable" indeed. Last year, Kroger used its monopoly pricing power to reap record profits, then it spent \$1.5 billion of those gains not to benefit consumers or workers, but to buy back its own stock – a scam that siphons profits to top executives and big shareholders.

Or take the fast-food purvevor McDonalds's. It bragged to its shareholders that despite the supply disruptions of the pandemic and higher costs for meat and labor, its top executives had used the chain's monopoly power in 2021 to up prices, thus increasing corporate profits by a stunning 59 percent over the previous year.

And the game goes on: "We're going to have the best growth we've ever had this year," Wall Street banking titan Jamie Dimon exulted at the start of 2022.

Hocus Pocus, this is how the rich get richer and inequality "happens."



BUILDING MICHIGAN: Marquette's Presque Isle Ore Dock HISTORY IN THE MAKING By Marty Mulcahy



THE 767-FOOT-LONG freighter Kaye E Barker is shown lined up in a modern photo at the Presque Isle Ore Dock Dock in Marquette, ready to accept gravity-fed iron ore pellets dumped from rail cars above. "Although the dock was originally built to load three ships on each side at once, its length allows it to accommodate the modern 1,000-foot vessels," said the Mining Journal. The ore dock is one of only three that are still operational in the upper Great Lakes.

Of all of Michigan's singular historic engineering feats in bridge, highway, tunnel, maritime lock and factory design, there aren't many structures that are more unique and remarkable than our mighty iron ore docks.

And Michigan's only operational ore dock is in Marquette, in place since 1913, and still serving the Cliffs Mining Co. Also known as the Upper Harbor Dock, or the Presque Isle Dock, or the Lake Superior & Ishpeming Railroad Ore Dock, the structure is the rail terminus for the off-loading of ore harvested from the state's only operating iron ore mine, the Tilden Mine, located about five miles south of Ishpeming.


Over the past century-plus, 27 "classic" ore docks - with gravity-operated chutes dumping ore into bulk lake freighters - have been erected along ports in the upper Great Lakes. Today only three are operational - with the other two located in Minnesota.

"Iron ore docks are one of the most iconic symbols of the northern Great Lakes," sys a Panethos article, Great Ore Docks of the Great Lakes. "From the last quarter of the 19th-century to the mid-20th Century these enormous timber or steel/concrete structures dominated the skylines naba, Marquette, and Su perior."

According to Travel Marquette, the Marquette dock was built (starting in) 1911 and is still commercially active. Each year approximately 9.5 million to 10 million tons of ore are shipped from this dock. The dock is owned and operated by **Cliffs Natural Resources. This** steel-framed dock is 1,250 feet long and 60 feet wide, with the top deck sitting 75 feet above the water level. It contains 200 pockets, each of which has a capacity of 250 tons of ore, for a total storage capacity of 50,000 tons. Supporting the dock is a foundation of 10,000 wooden piles enclosed by a 12-inch thick timber sheet plank wall filled with sand."

The Upper Harbor Dock is the end point for the Lake Superior, Ishpeming and Superior Railroad. Pulled or pushed by locomotives, decades-old "Jenny" cars riding on tracks above the dock are positioned to drop their iron ore loads into pockets below. When lake freighters line up with the dock, chutes drop the pellets into their holds.

Located near Presque Isle State Park, the close-up view of the loading of lake freighters is a consistent attraction

for visitors. "They can see the chutes come down. They can hear the terrific rumble of those pellets as they go down into the cargo holds. It is the closest people will ever come to that type of activity anywhere in the Great Lakes," maritime historian Frederick Stonehouse told Michigan Radio.

"To load the boat, the chute is lowered to the open cargo hatch and a door at the bottom of the pocket opens, allowing the pellets to run into the boat," says Travel Marquette. "Loading time is variable, depending on the size of the boat and how prepared the dock is to load. Four hours is typical. It is important to load the ore in a proper sequence to avoid overstressing the boat unevenly. Each chute (or drop of ore) is about 20 tons."

Owners of iron ore mines of places like Ashland, Duluth, built ever-larger and taller ore docks as lake freighters grew larger, and locomotives grew more powerful. The Marquette ore dock with its four tracks and 100 pockets "revolutionized the loading of ore vessels," said Archipedia.

"This reinforced concrete and steel dock replaced a timber dock built in 1896 and located nearby. The railroad decided in favor of this design because the estimated maintenance savings over a wooden dock outweighed the higher initial construction costs," said an article published after construction by the January 1913 Engineering News. "The structure was designed by J.F. Jackson, vice president of the Wisconsin Bridge and Iron Co. of Milwaukee. His firm erected the steel superstructure, while the reinforced concrete substructure, designed by R.C. Young, the chief engineer of the Lake Superior and Ishpeming Railroad, was built by the Raymond Concrete Pile Co.

"This was the second reinforced concrete dock built in the United States, completed a year after a similar dock was built by the Great Northern Railway at Superior, Wis."

The Engineers News said the chutes "utilized a novel

design intended to prevent the ore from sticking to the chute or overflowing its confines. They were designed with curved bottoms... which were inserted into the bulk ore carrier."

The average ore load per vessel today is 21,146 tons, while the average in 1899 was 2,431 tons per ship.


Since 1912, the ore dock has seen various improvements, including in 2006 and 2007, when a new control system for the pocket chute doors was installed for safer and more efficient ship loading, said the Mining Journal. The dock also has seen concrete restoration work and repainting.

The approach to the ore dock was no less an engineering feat, with the construction of a mile-long earth embankment supporting a steel trestle. It was built with a gradual 1.5 percent grade - necessary so as not to overstress railroad locomotives hauling the incredibly heavy ore cars. The embankments were fortified with 100,000 cubic yards of

dredgings from the harbor. "This bridge is an extremely unique structure because its purpose is to provide an approach to the historic ore dock located in Lake Superior, which is itself a rare and impressive structure that continues to function as originally designed, transferring iron ore from train cars to freighters in the lake," says Historic Bridges.

Marquette is actually home to a pair of still existing ore docks, with the Presque Isle Dock being the oldest. The Lower Harbor Dock was erected in 1931-32, but was closed due to economic conditions in 1971. But it remains in place today as a curiosity, and a windbreak if nothing else, jutting out into the harbor, with vague plans for public re-use. Another abandoned ore dock in Escanaba, closed in 2017, also remains in place.

In the interview, Stonehouse also talks about the Lower Harbor ore dock. "It's just such a very powerful visual reminder of the city's maritime past and our heritage."

Whitmer's resurrection of prevailing wage law upheld by claims judge

The Republican-led Michigan Legislature repealed the Michigan Prevailing Wage Act in 2018, capping a years-long agenda against labor unions in the state that included passage of a ban on project labor agreements in 2011 and implementation of a right-to-work law in 2012. Until the GOP's action, all of Michigan trades workers, both union and nonunion, enjoyed the benefit of prevailing wages on statesponsored contracts since the law was put in place in 1965.

This lawsuit was brought in July, when the anti-union Associated Builders and Contractors of Michigan and the conservative Mackinac Center for Public Policy asked for a preliminary injunction to stop the DTMB from requiring that contractors pay workers a prevailing wage for jobs on state contracts exceeding \$50,000, arguing that the repeal of the Michigan Prevailing Wage Act nullified the state's ability to

But Whitmer's administration maintained that while the Legislature repealed the prevailing wage requirement - they didn't ban it from being enacted again. The governor's office said: "Michigan's repeal eliminated the state's prevailing wage requirement, but left the door open for DTMB to require prevailing wage under its authority to develop the terms of state contracts."

Canzano said the state's argument was simple: "the law that threw out prevailing wage law did not prevent the state from using prevailing wage in the future." If that seems like some sort of a contradiction, it isn't: when GOP lawmakers outlawed the use of what were often unionfriendly, state-involved project labor agreements in 2011, they included language that expressly

prohibited their use in the future. Judge Shapiro, a Jennifer Granholm appointee said in his ruling that the Legislature, which originally delegated authority to the DTMB to make state contracts, "could pass a new law at any time prohibiting defendant from establishing a prevailing wage policy," but hasn't. The judge continued: "At present, the Management and Budget Act provides defendant with broad discretionary authority, which en-

a prevailing-wage policy." In response to the ruling, Whitmer wrote on Twitter: "This ensures more opportunities and good paying jobs for working families while saving taxpayers money and time on crucial infrastructure projects.'

Attorney General Dana Nessel, who defended Whitmer's policy, said the ruling "affirms the authority of the state to set best business practices and require fair wages be paid by those who do business with Michigan."

ABC-Michigan President Jimmy Greene, president of the Associated Builders and Contractors of Michigan, said in a statement: "This dismissal was totally unsurprising, especially since we've seen the lower courts give Gov. Whitmer a pass on abusing executive authority before, as was evidenced by the lockdowns that ultimately were declared illegal by Michigan Supreme

"Reinstating prevailing wage is yet another example of the governor using unilateral authority, this time to directly ignore the will of the people and the Legislature. We will bring this fight to the Court of Appeals on behalf of contractors and taxpayers. We hope they will dig much deeper on this issue and render a decision supporting

U.S. construction industry still has significant upside

in August as spending on new houses turned sharply lower, the AGC reported on Oct. 3, while public and private nonresidential construction posted mixed results. Association officials said that rising interest rates were hurting demand for housing and many private-sector projects, while the impacts of new federal funding for infrastructure, semiconductor plants and green energy facilities have yet to fully kick

"The construction market is in a transition that is likely to accelerate in the months ahead," said Simonson. "Steeply rising interest rates have crushed demand for single-family housing and threaten developer-financed projects, while newly enacted federal legislation will soon boost investment in power, manufacturing, and infrastructure construction. But a pickup in these segments will require improvements in the timely approval of projects and adequate supplies of workers and materials.

The real estate investment firm CBRE's Construction Cost Index forecasts a 14.1 percent year-over-year increase in construction input costs by year-end 2022, and there was a 12.6 percent jump in

The people at Dodge Data and Analytics took all that into consideration and they moved their monthly construction "Momentum Index" higher in September, improving by 5.7 percent. The index is a monthly measure of the initial report for nonresidential building projects in planning, shown to lead construction spending for nonresidential buildings by a full year.

The index is now within 5 percent of its all-time high, with a total of 39 U.S. projects with a value of \$100 million or more entered the planning stage in September.

"The gain in the Momentum Index and its components in September reassures us that despite whispers of recession, owners and developers are still looking to move forward with projects to meet demand," stated David Reaves, senior economist for Dodge Construction Network. "Certain subsectors have shown resilience since the pandemic's onset, such as data center projects, and continue to stream into the planning pipeline. However, looming challenges still remain for the sector, including supply shortages and the rising cost of materials that could chip away at the flow of new projects if inflation is not tempered."

Freedom Compressor gets \$260M overhaul

(Continued from Page 1) We are committed to creating a cleaner and more resilient natural gas future for Michigan."

Each of Freedom's five compressors are enormous V-12 engines, capable of generating more than 3,750 horsepower. They've replaced 13 aging units the company has retired and plans to remove in 2023.

Consumers Energy operates approximately 30,000 miles of natural gas pipeline, as well as one of the nation's largest underground storage systems, comprised of 15 fields and nearly cubic feet of gas storage capacity.

Freedom Compressor Station, a key piece of the system, takes in natural gas purchased for customers at lower prices, then boosts pressure to push supplies to the transmission network as well as underground storage fields, which provide up to 80 percent of the natural gas needed on the coldest winter days.

"We provide natural gas to more than 4 million people in 45 counties and we're working to shield those customers from price

More and more manufacturers have brought the alpinestyle helmet to market, and we know that companies have a lot to consider when making their helmet selection. Cost, color, classification/ratings and options for attachable accessories such as face shields, visors and hearing protection are important to organizations.

As part of Alberici's zeroincident safety culture, early in to try to better protect workers in 2019 we set out to improve on our head protection program by

evaluating several manufacturers' helmets, then brainstorming with a group that included safety representatives, trades representatives and craft leaders as well as upper management.

By mid-2020, we made a corporate-wide decision to change from the traditional style hard hat to an alpine-style helmet, and in April 2021, all projects were issued their new branded helmets. Alberici is continuing to issue helmets to every employee who is hired by the company.

To date, over 3,000 helmets have been distributed. Alberici acknowledges the cost of the helmets is not cheap, compared with the traditional style hard hat; however, after having an employee suffer a severe head injury during a fall when his hard hat flew off, it was an easy decision

"The traditional hard hat is good, but if there's something better on the market, it's our responsibility as employers to find it and incorporate it into our work processes," noted John Alberici, chairman emeritus. "Further, if we can save one person from a traumatic brain injury, the value to that person and their family is immeasurable," he added.

Concerned safety professionals see this as a way for OSHA to issue citations. The general duty clause states that employers have a responsibility to their workers: "Each employer shall furnish to each of his employees employment and a place of employment which are free from recognized hazards that are causing or are likely to cause death or serious physical harm to his employees."

If employers do not provide the best safety option for their workers and a significant incident happens, will OSHA look the other way if the incident involves a head injury with a hard hat versus a helmet?

At Alberici, we developed an internal committee with our labor superintendents to review all the newest head-protection technology. After months of testing several products, and carefully weighing the pros and cons of each, we came to a consensus decision on the type of helmet we provided to our projects and field workers. Having the commitment of the field leaders AND upper management was huge in getting all the trades to buy into the process.

As part of this collaborative effort, everyone understood we were doing it for the right reasons, and that made it more agreeable to everyone in the end.

The life span of the helmet is longer than the traditional hard hat, where we may see some cost savings over time with the new headgear. Regardless, the overall performance and increased protection is why we've made the change. There are many pros and cons to selecting one helmet over another.

Milwaukee Tool, TAUC's Legacy Partner, has invested

heavily into research and development of one of the best helmets on the market. If your return on investment is important to you, their helmets offer more than one style of helmet - brimmed and brimless, a wide variety of optional equipment at a fair cost, and they can prove their worthiness with data.

For those who need assurance that a helmet can protect a worker, we look to standards. Consensus standards are developed much like tripartite agreements, in that there is a variety of interested parties involved in the overall decision-making

The ANSI/ISEA 89.1 standard for industrial head protection is a consensus standard, developed by manufacturers, technical advisors, end users and more, and is a basis for design and protection. Voluntary industry consensus standards recognized by the American National Standards Institute are required to be reviewed every five years to account for improvements in technology, test methods and materials, user needs and trends in use and application of products covered under the respective standard.

Milwaukee's helmets are ANSI/ISEA 89.1 Type II Rated. They meet the energy-absorption capacity clauses for front, side and rear and for strength.

They also have a 10-year shelf life, which helps reduce replacement costs.

As helmets become more prevalent in our industry, make the right choice based on cost, comfort, and function. Use research and merit to decide. Always get competitive bids and look to who has the best "fit" for your organization.





BAY CITY – Union Meeting. The November monthly membership meeting will be held at 6:00 P.M. on Monday, Nov. 7, 2022. Hopefully we will see everyone there.

Executive Board Meeting. The November Executive Board Meeting will be held at 6:00 P.M. on Monday, Nov. 21, 2022.

Message from the Business Manager. The by-laws change that was first proposed at July's monthly membership meeting seeking to raise the local death benefit from \$5 to \$10 per death was overwhelmingly passed by the membership at the September meeting. The next step in making a change to the by-laws will be to have it approved by the international office. I will keep you posted on this process.

At the 40th International Convention, Local Union Delegates unanimously passed a monthly assessment increase that will increase your monthly membership dues to \$45.20 effective Jan. 1, 2023. Also, effective Jan. 1, 2023 you will see an increase to the amount credited to your PBF Pension. That amount will increase to \$5.50 per year of service.

As we fast approach the Nov. 8 general election, please support labor-friendly candidates. We need legislators that will strike down right to work, bring back statewide project labor agreements, and introduce campaign finance reform that will benefit the working man or woman. Let's get out and vote for the issues that affect our paycheck not the wedge issues which are intended to divide us.

Work Report. The first and most important thing I am going to say about the work outlook is supply issues continue to slow or stall projects. This is our work outlook to the best of my knowledge.

Ongoing projects in our jurisdiction that may require additional manpower include:

Nelson Electric - GM Powertrain work started on Oct. 3 and will run through the end of the year. Swan Electric - Multiple DTE natural gas pumping stations throughout Zones 1 and 2. This project, just as many others have seen delays due to supply issues. J.Ranck Electric - continuing work on phase 1 of the SK Siltron semi-conductor chip manufacturing facility, the second phase of which is valued at over \$300 million and slated to kick off in Jan. 2023. Ranck Electric has also secured the Balance of System work on a Solar Farm in Gladwin County. Goyette Mechanical continues PFAS filtration and mitigation work in Oscoda.

Countyline Power has secured upcoming wastewater treatment facility work at Sagining Eagles Landing in Standish, multiple pump stations in the Mt. Pleasant and Clare areas, MDOT Welcome Center remodel in Clare, and runway lighting at Gladwin Airport.

Bay City's Karn 3 & 4 seems to be remaining operational until 2031, which will likely lead to multiple electrical projects this Fall. Robinson Industries in Coleman plans to rebuild facilities damaged in their recent fire, our contractors are expected to secure that work and hire late this year. Northpointe Distribution Center (Frito Lay) has been secured by Clements Electric. You have been seeing dirt being moved on this project with steel to follow in the next couple weeks.

Future projects we are keeping an eye on include North Peak Brewing in Bay City, and further De-sugarization Process

upgrades at Michigan Sugar. Rest assured both organizers and myself are working very diligently to secure whatever work is being bid in our jurisdiction for our membership. Detroit, Traverse City and Lansing may soon have calls getting into Book II if you are looking to travel. Please contact the hall if you would like

692 Organizers continue to visit jobsites within our jurisdiction to speak with unrepresented

electricians to build relationships and make those workers aware of the opportunities that exist by joining our Brotherhood. We should never lose sight of the organizing mission that guided the birth and growth of the IBEW. Our founders built a strong union by organizing all qualified workers, which allows us to build a higher union density and ultimately increases our bargaining power during negotiations.

As the midterm elections on Nov. 8 approach, it is important to elect candidates into office who have pledged to support legislation that will positively impact the ability of signatory contactors to secure work for Local 692 members. You should have received an official candidate endorsement list in the mail.

If you have any questions about local races or proposals not covered by the endorsement list, feel free to reach out to the office as Organizers or the Business Manager will be happy to speak to you about where specific candidates for office stand on labor issues. Local school board and commissioner races are of particular focus and should be researched if you are unsure. Socalled Right to Work, Prevailing Wage repeal, taxing our pensions...remember where these harmful policies came from. The only way to prevent the further dismantling of the working class is to ensure labor-friendly candidates are successful in all local, state and federal elections.



Each member must sign the form along with the number of hours they worked. The completed form must be sent back to by hall by the end of the day on the following Monday. Weekend work assignments must be called or emailed into the hall **prior to 3:00 pm on Friday**.

WORK ASSIGNMENTS: Everyone must obtain a work assignment prior to starting work. If you fail to do so you could be written up on charges.

LAY-OFFS: All members must report to the Union Hall immediately upon lay-off, even if you only work one day. These are the By-Law rules for the Out-of-Work List. Your name will be removed from the list 14 days after receiving an assignment. It is very important to report to the union hall immediately after your layoff. Members get confused because the S.U.B. Fund allows you a period of up to seven (7) days to apply for S.U.B. benefits after lay-off.

LAY-OFF SLIPS/TERMINATION NOTICES: Lay off slips must accompany all applications for sub pay. Without lay off slips you cannot collect sub pay. It is the member's responsibility to make sure they get one from the contractor when laid off. Your application cannot be submitted without one. It is the contractor's responsibility to issue one in accordance with our contract.

S.U.B. BENEFITS: Report to the hall promptly upon layoff. You must complete a S.U.B. Application within seven days from your layoff date or you will forfeit S.U.B. benefits. Lay-off slips must accompany the application to be eligible. Proof of UIA benefit payments must be submitted within 21 days of when you were paid in order to receive SUB benefits. Do not submit your sub applications directly to the fund office. Your application must be signed by the hall or you will not collect benefits.

OUT-OF-WORK LIST: You must be on the out-of-work list to collect S.U.B. benefits or SASMI. Members must re-register biannually: March 1 through March 20 and Sept. 1 through Sept.20. If you fail to re-register you will be removed from the list.

SHORT WORK WEEK SUB PAY: If you work 16 hours or less in a week or have a short work week due to weather you may collect sub for that week but only if it is at the beginning or the end of a layoff. You may NOT collect if you are not laid off. You must complete a sub application at the hall, provide a pay stub for that week and the hall will submit it to the fund office. If you are not laid off and it is due to weather the company MUST provide written documentation that it was weather related.

Yes, fall, one of a deer hunter's most coveted times of year. Many summer days have been spent planting trails on our land, scouting new spots, dreaming of this time. The smell of a crisp fall day is a mixture of fading ferns and leaves mingled with the musty scent of moss and earth.

Sounds of early morning shots echo along the river from duck and goose hunters seeking migrating waterfowl. The lingering fog that hangs low in the air diffusing the sun's rays casts a mystical hue. All these smells, sounds and sights plant you easily

Along with this planting comes the excitement of pursuing the mighty whitetail. The freezer is empty of the previous year's harvest, and store meat prices give us one more reason to harvest, like we really needed

Our spots for archery opener have been selected based on wind direction. Mother Nature has a way of making sure you know she is in charge, so you make sure you have options.

Through the night I have several false wakes before it is time to get up and moving. My best friend and hunting mentor (aka my husband), compares this to the night before Christmas as a young boy.

The excitement is hard to contain, but I've got it all planned out. My clothes and gear have been placed strategically so I can get out the door quickly and with confidence that I have everything

to my jewelry box and pull my combo tags from the bottom drawer. I purchased them back in April when I got my fishing license and purposely stashed them in this spot to remember where I put them.

My licenses placed in the front pocket of my waist pack, I gather my bow and head out. I walk with my headlamp off, enjoying the calm and still the dark provides. Purposefully, I make my way down the trail to where I set up my climbing tree stand.

As I walk, I listen and step softly, trying not to make extra noise. I am sure I sound like a freight train, yet I do my best to be stealthy.

My morning hunting spot is

up in an oak. This oak is just the right size, and the bark welcomes my slow and steady ascent to the key height. My outline is camouflaged by a black spruce, and there is an opening to a well-used trail at 25 yards, just right to catch a deer walking through.

I attach my safety harness to the belt on the tree and cinch down the seat with the strap. I then begin pulling up my bow. I need to remind myself to take it easy, pull even and smoothly. I don't want it to swing and knock into nearby branches.

Once my bow is in hand, I nock an arrow, draw back and aim at a spot while mentally following through with a shot. Slowly I let down, depress the drop-away rest

and place my bow in the holder. I now sit and try to be still, calm my breathing and listen.

It is glorious to experience, the waking of a day. As the sun begins its rise, so does the activity of the critters in the woods. As I strain to hear footsteps of deer, there are so many other sounds. On a calm day, the release and landing of a single maple leaf is amazingly loud.

The abrupt screech of a recently arrived blue jay shatters the calm. Then a tree frog speaks up with several chirps. A beaver splashes, as it swims in the channel it created to maneuver trees to

Beaver ... my eyes find the poplar tree with a couple chomps out of the base. Didn't it suit his taste or was he interrupted by me bringing my stand in or by a wolf seeking her favorite meal?

I am amazed by these industrious animals. They are fun to watch, but they have been cursed by many who have had to unplug a culvert time after time or by a grove of poplar harvested for the beaver's lodge and dam.

That dam now provides a well-used passage for deer. In my perch I can easily monitor this spot in hope that a mature whitetailed uses it while I go unnoticed.

Suddenly, I hear leaves softly crunch underfoot. My senses perk up, my ears straining to hear that next step. Yes, another and then nothing. My eyes scan the area as I gently pick up my bow and try to pick out a flick of a tail, a wiggle of an ear.

Nothing.

Then ... another step. Yes, it must be a deer.

Is it that monster that the neighbors have on their trail camera?

Another step.

The brush is thick, but I continue to scan for any movement. It is not that confounded squirrel. He is up and to the right, keeping watch on this human in his oak.

These steps are coming from where a smart, old buck would

come. My heart is beating faster in anticipation and then ... flutter, flutter, flutter, the flight of a ruffed

Dang, you little bugger, you got me! I smile to myself.

This is what it is all about. You never know what you will see, hear, experience. Time spent being still and watching the woods come alive is healing, settling, a soothing balm.

Oh, there are the "woot, woot, purr" sounds of the grouse as they meander through, pecking at the ground. Then I notice Mr.

Squirrel caching a mushroom on a spruce limb. After seeing them do this, I realize there are mushrooms cached on limbs all over the area. He goes from one limb to another, picks up a mushroom, takes a few nibbles, sets it down and travels to the next and repeats. So cool! He does give me the side eye, probably thinking I am competition for his bounty.

And so it goes. I may not have encountered that buck this sit, but there is beauty and wonder in every moment if you just be still, observe and soak it in.

It's firewood month: Do you know what's in your wood?

Most people don't spend much time thinking about firewood. If it's split and dry, it's good to go, right?

Well, maybe not. In recognition of firewood month, Michigan's landowner who finds their young Invasive Species Program is taking a few minutes to unpack some firewood facts to help you make safe firewood choices to protect Michigan's trees and forests.

> Heating a home or enjoying a cozy evening by the fire is a great way to repurpose dead trees, but we often don't think about what killed

> Invasive insects like emerald ash borer or fungi like oak wilt can kill even healthy trees. Other trees succumb to environmental conditions like drought, overcrowding or storm damage. Once a tree is weakened, it can become home to a host of insects and fungi that often remain in the wood even after it has been cut.

> That means dead wood is often alive with harmful insects and diseases that can be transported to new locations on or in firewood

> What pests are in my firewood? Wood borers, adelgids, spongy moths, the spotted lanternfly. A Michigan study of 1,045 firewood pieces transported by the public indicated 23 percent contained live borers and an additional 41 percent showed evidence of previous borer infestation

Here's the takeaway: Don't take it away!

Wood that looks clean and healthy can harbor tiny insects, eggs or microscopic fungi spores that can start a new and deadly infestation. Always leave your backyard firewood at home, even if you think it

Aged or seasoned wood is not safe to move. Just because it is dry doesn't mean it's clean. A recent study showed insects continued to emerge from firewood even three years after it had been cut.

Buy firewood near where you will burn it – a good rule of thumb is only using wood that was cut within 50 miles of where you'll have your fire. Don't bring home firewood that you don't burn.
