State to probe de-icing Mighty Mac

LANSING – Perhaps the building trades will one day have a hand in installing an ice mitigation system – whatever it might be – on the Mackinac Bridge.

If that happens, the first step is determining what might be done about stopping ice from falling from the Mighty Mac's 552-foot-tall towers and cables. Toward that end, the Michigan House last month adopted a budget that sets aside \$600,000 to study ice mitigation.

The research money would be directed to Michigan Technological University in Houghton.

Kim Nowack, director of the Mackinac Bridge Authority, told lawmakers and the news service MIRS that the agency has tracked 44 bridge closures since 1995. But she said 12 of them happened over last winter.

Freezing rain that coats the bridge's cables and towers thaws and then ice falls on the road deck below, imperiling motorists.

Nowack told lawmakers and MIRS that the Mackinac Bridge Authority has explored multiple options – including mechanical ice removal, heating systems and ice-resistant coatings – but none have proven practical for a structure as large and complex as the five-mile-long span.

On its website, the MBA last month addressed why the most obvious solution is likely impractical:

"Why doesn't the Authority install heat cables to the surfaces that ice up, or run a current through the bridge's metal structure to prevent ice from forming?"

The Mackinac Bridge Authority's answer: "Some type of heating system could be possible but running a current through the bridge could result in corrosion of some bridge components, and heat cables would be costly to install and maintain. Other methods, such as devices that 'patrol' cables to prevent ice from forming, are being tried on other bridges, but would be difficult to retrofit to a bridge like the Mighty Mac."

"So far, the authority has not found a cost-effective and practical solution relative to the infrequent, short-term closures resulting from falling ice, nor one that wouldn't potentially damage the bridge. Icing is a problem for cable bridges around the world in climates like ours and no one has developed a practical solution to this infrequent but annoying problem."

The authority said the longest closure to date was 30 hours, April 2-3, 2025. The average closure has lasted about five hours and 41 minutes.

Selfridge locks in \$1.4B in upgrades

LANSING – A new mission for Selfridge Air National Guard base, and new work for the building trades, is now a lock with the state Legislature's approval last week of \$152 million for a new runway project at the site.

The state appropriation unlocks \$792 million in federal military construction funding for the base in Macomb County's Harrison Twp. The money will prepare the base for hosting two new aircraft platforms, the F-15 EX fighter jets and KC-46 tankers.

The future of Selfridge, which was founded in 1917, had been up in the air since the Air Force announced the retirement of the A-10 fighters it hosted.

Majestic Scott Fountain gets makeover, inside and out

DETROIT – The James Scott Memorial Fountain is a remarkable public art monument that has graced Belle Isle in Detroit since its dolphins, turtles and other sculptures first started spewing water in 1925.

But it has also consistently needed a lot of work, with electric controls, plumbing,

masonry and foundations all more or less exposed to whatever weather elements Michigan's four seasons have thrown at it over the past 101 years.

Enter The Christman Co., a group of their subcontractors and union trades, who were hired last year by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources to repair, restore and address the many needs of the fountain as part of an

18-month, \$5 million project.

"Overall with this project there's a significant amount of restoration that needs to be done with the stone work and structural issues – we had to replace quite a bit more than we anticipated due to decay," said Christman Project Supt. Manuel Martinez. "We've come across some of these issues as we have

U.S. construction momentum sheds first-quarter blues

The Dodge Momentum Index for U.S. Construction increased 6.2 percent in April, the first monthly increase of the year from one of the major forecasters of the industry.

After a downward revise for the small increase in March's momentum numbers – and a combined 13 percent drop in the January-February index – the DMI rose 6.2 percent in April.

"After three months of slowing momentum, nonresidential planning began to find its footing in April," said Sarah Martin, director of economic research at Dodge Construction Network.

"Data centers remain the largest driver behind growth in the Dodge Momentum Index, but several other sectors appeared to stabilize over the month. Macroeconomic risks remain weighted

to the downside, with labor shortages, higher material costs and supply chain disruptions weighing on owner confidence in the near-term."

Year-over-year, the DMI was up 14.1 percent when compared to April 2025. The commercial segment was up 37.2 percent (but only rose +5.8 percent when data centers are removed) and the

Building input costs rise, led by energy and metals

The producer price index for inputs to new nonresidential construction rose 1.7 percent in April and 6.6 percent compared to April 2025, according to an analysis by the Associated General Contractors of America of government data released May 13.

"Construction input costs continue to rise much faster

than contractors' bid prices, particularly for energy-intensive and metals-related materials," said Macrina Wilkins, director of market insights for the Associated General Contractors of America.

"That gap is making it increasingly difficult for contractors to accurately price projects and raising the risk of delays, rede-

signs, and deferred construction activity if cost volatility persists.

Not surprisingly, with the nationwide pain-at-the-pump continuing since the Strait of Hormuz has been essentially shut down, energy-related inputs posted the steepest increases in April. Diesel fuel prices climbed 13.6 percent in April alone and

Appeal to an audience of one:
ABC issues survey to push Trump to deep-six PLAs

The Associated Builders and Contractors on May 6 released the results of an unusual survey it commissioned with the Harris Group, seemingly to remind President Trump about who in the U.S. construction industry has buttered his political bread.

"Across measures of party alignment, candidate support and policy preferences, merit shop (nonunion) workers in the trades consistently align more closely with the GOP than their union counterparts," was the concluding takeaway of the poll by the national ABC, which is the leading construction industry trade association for nonunion contractors.

The results of the poll would come as no surprise to anyone who remotely follows the U.S. construction industry: while Trump earned significant union building trades worker support in his three presidential runs, polling has shown more of his backers came from nonunion workers.

The ABC, however, seems to think that fact has been lost on Trump, and it's no stretch to surmise that they paid for this poll to appeal to him and him alone: "Midterm wake-up call for Trump: Study shows nonunion construction workers built the GOP coalition," says the ABC's headline in releasing the poll.

With this poll, however, context is everything.

The ABC released the poll two weeks and a day after a U.S. Court of Appeals ruling was issued which upheld a Biden-era mandate that union-friendly project labor agreements be employed on federally funded construction projects exceeding \$35 million. Trump – surprisingly – supported the rule, which irritated the ABC and led to its legal case before the appeals court. The ruling effectively shuts ABC contractors out of about \$800 billion in annual federal construction contracts.

Harris said its survey "reports on the data from 4,800 online interviews among the general public who are registered voters" in six political swing states, including Michigan. The survey was conducted prior to the last presidential election, Sept. 30-Oct. 6, but the results were released on May 6. Harris said there was an "oversample" of skilled trades workers in those six states.

According to the ABC's analysis of the survey:

- Open shop support for Trump exceeded union support across all six swing states.

- In Arizona, Georgia and North Carolina, nonunion workers supported Trump at a rate 19

Industry's focus on lowering drug-related deaths is paying off

While unintentional workplace overdose deaths involving drugs or alcohol have surged by 460 percent since 2011, recent figures show encouraging signs of progress. Among construction workers aged 16–64, drug-related overdose deaths fell by 28.8 percent between 2023 and 2024, dropping from 15,900 to 11,300.

This substantial decline suggests that targeted interventions are successfully reaching those in need.

"The recent drop in overdose fatalities demonstrates that purposeful action can lead to significant transformation in our industry," said Laborers International Union General President and Health and Safety Fund Labor Co-Chairman Brent Booker. "To continue this progress, we need continued investment in mental

health support, stronger leadership involvement and a jobsite culture that values mental health as much as physical safety."

Why are these rates dropping?

Recent improvements are not accidental; they are the result of coordinated, sustained efforts across the industry. Construction trade unions, associations, alliances and research organizations have worked collaboratively to better understand the root causes of substance use and mental health challenges and to implement practical solutions. Key contributions to these rates decreasing include:

- Expanding education and training on substance use and dependency.

- Increased availability of Naloxone (Narcan) on construction jobsites and in public.

- Reduced stigma surrounding substance use and mental health disorders.

- Greater access to treatment, recovery programs and peer support networks.

- Stronger integration of health and wellness programs into workplace safety culture.

These combined efforts are important because they show that change is possible when the industry works together. By focusing on awareness, early

The case for building data centers

Dear Brothers and Sisters,
As some of you already know, demand for electricity is rising at an unprecedented rate! I'm old enough to remember the introduction of new technology like Technicolor (so TV shows could be viewed in color rather than black and white), cordless tools, and the introduction of microwave ovens as kitchen appliances.

New electrical contraptions simply increase the demand for our existing power grid. Today's new appliances are more efficient but there are many more choices for consumers. Cell phones, Cloud based storage, AI, EV's and data centers all increase the load on our utility grid. I have even seen refrigerators with a built-in TV.

I drove to work today using Google Maps. My pay was deposited electronically this week. I can see the stock market in real time. If you have done this or streamed a movie, listened to a podcast, played an online video game or paid a bill with your phone you are using a data center. I don't remember the last time I had to go into a bank! We have Facetime and wrist watches that you can use to have a phone conversation. The sci-fi of days past is a reality today.

We are at a critical juncture in our jurisdiction. Our primary focus here is to make sure our members have as many job choices as possible. We need diversified employment opportunities all over our area. We simply cannot rely on our existing customer base to support our growing membership. Savvy investment counselors always advise us to have a variety of investments...to never put all our eggs in one basket! Why should we be any different in how we approach our electrical market?

Electricity has made all our lives better! The demand for electricity is always trending higher. There are several projects in our jurisdiction that are addressing this increased demand. Wind turbines, solar fields, powerhouse upgrades and utility scale battery storage have been putting our members

and the building trades to work for more than two decades!

I must say it disheartens me to hear so many union members speak out against data centers, solar or wind projects. We must understand there is ever-increasing use of cell phones, electric vehicles and new appliances. How can we expect electrical power usage to do anything other than continue to increase? We will have to share the cost of the increased upgrades to our utility grid... unless something else can pay for it.

Michigan already has 58 data centers located throughout the state. Michigan also has guardrails in place to make sure data centers do not pass the cost of grid expansion to consumers. I have been to township meetings where citizens are spewing disinformation and do not want to hear from anyone that may have valid points that may contradict what they believe.

It's difficult to get the villagers to put away the "pitchforks and torches." At one township meeting, a lady claimed that a data center would drain all our wells, make property values plummet, poison our air and make our electricity rates double. "If the data center were to catch fire, we'll all die of cancer!" she said.

The best way to combat misinformation is to provide our members with the truth. Please discuss the value brought to communities when data centers are allowed with the proper guardrails in place. Let your family, friends and neighbors know that robots are not building data centers.

It is people, thousands of people. I would encourage all of you to look up Michigan PA 207 of 2024 <https://share.google/1JIIHggOpcNB5GCR> This law has some key points:

- Data centers are required to use municipal water supplies to qualify for tax incentives. Data centers would need to run a closed loop cooling system that would use one million gallons of water annually. A smaller closed loop system is what keeps your car or truck engine from overheating. An 18-hole golf course would use

between 100,000 to 400,000 gallons a day, during the summer! How many of you want to rally with the townspeople to eliminate the golf courses?

- It is illegal to increase residential utility rates to cover the cost of grid expansion for data centers. In other words, data centers must pay for grid expansion! We must expand the grid... so why wouldn't we let companies like Microsoft, Amazon, OpenAI or Stargate pay for this expansion?

- Data center owners have been building new town halls and fire departments for municipalities that have allowed them to build. At that same meeting where the lady claimed we're all going to die from cancer, the township board was debating if \$500 to cover the cost of replacing a broken window, was a fair price.

- Data centers must invest a minimum of \$250 million and create at least 30 new, permanent jobs paying at least 150 percent above the median rate for workers in the community that allows them to build or they will not qualify for tax incentives.

- Data centers would become the fifth largest property taxpayer in Michigan.

Whether you are for or against data centers, they are coming and they employ thousands of trades people during construction. They will be built... somewhere. The question is, do we want them in our jurisdiction? Do we want our members to have this opportunity?

Data centers need annual maintenance, keeping contractors and our members working. This certainly helps us diversify our electrical opportunities. We have an opportunity to let data centers pay for utility grid expansion. We can also lose this opportunity! The choice is ours. I apologize for asking you to use a data center, again, but look up Seth Meyers interview of Chris Hayes on May 6 on You Tube. Chris does a great job discussing the chaos and fear that revolutionary technology brings.

the contest, welcome and check in participants, and then judge the welding practical application in the contest. The event has resulted in the placement of numerous students into the union over the past two decades.

"This event is an opportunity for these students to show their skills," said Ryan Willoughby, a superintendent with the Mid-American Group, a Local 169 contractor. "But you can also see its value in the number of people who have been placed here over the years. This event is a door-opener."

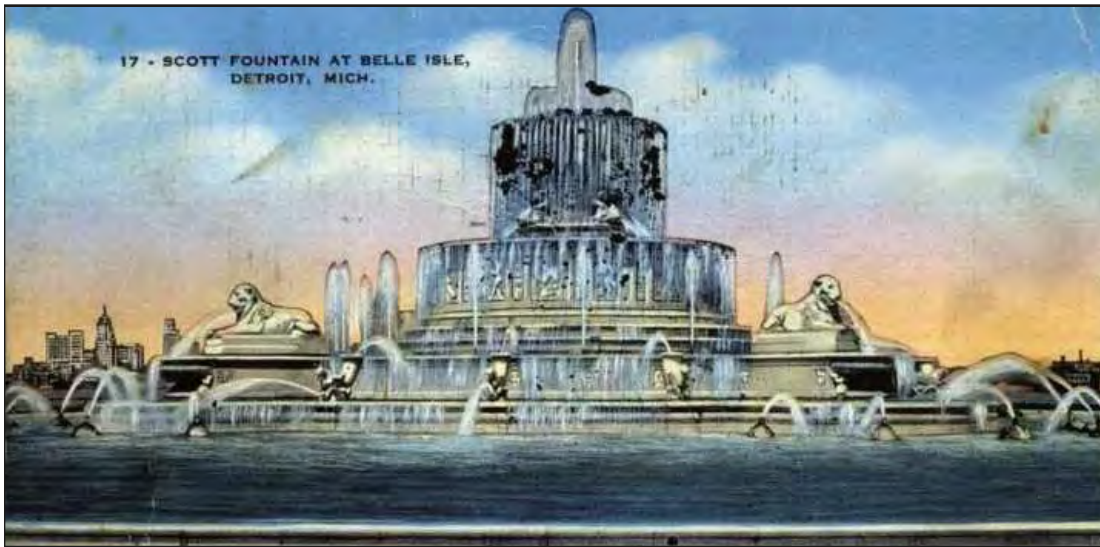

BUILDING MICHIGAN!

The James Scott Memorial Fountain HISTORY IN THE MAKING

“DETROIT IS TO HAVE A FOUNTAIN that will rank among the world’s greatest and will probably be the costliest in the United States,” said the February 1922 edition of *American Builder* magazine. “Preliminary work is underway. James Scott, an obscure citizen, died in 1910 and left his entire estate to the city to build it.” The national competition to hire an architect for the fountain, the publication said, “was one of the largest every in the United States,” with 92 designs being submitted from around the nation.

What a weird, wonderful origin story for the James Scott Memorial Fountain.

An architectural icon at the southwest end of Belle Isle – the 101-year-old fountain is among the most unique public art monuments in the country. Clad in gleaming white marble, the fountain features sculpted lions, dolphins, turtles, humans and the head of Neptune – collectively spouting 150,000 gallons of water into its lowest basin that holds about 1.5 million gallons. That’s when it’s working. Currently closed to the public, it will be a working showpiece again by the end of the year when The Christman Co., its subcontractors and the building trades finish an ongoing extensive rehabilitation project.

While the fountain has been shut down numerous times and has required extensive maintenance over the years, the fact that it was built in the first place is the result of a legendary move by a rich scoundrel to make himself... legendary. The term “own” has been tossed about quite a bit these days, and James Scott got away with an “own” against the City of Detroit, reaching beyond his grave to make the city’s fathers an offer they ultimately couldn’t refuse.

That’s why we have a larger-than-life bronze statue of a seated Scott staring at an awesome fountain that would be the envy of any city planner. So...who is this guy who has his name permanently etched on statue next to a fountain he paid for that the city reluctantly accepted?

“Socialite James Scott (1831-1910) was said to have been lazy, eccentric, a prankster and a real rascalion,” writes Dan Austin for *Historic Detroit*. “He had inherited his money from his father – a successful real estate tycoon – and spent his days, not working like the rest of his fellow Detroiters, but often gambling it away and being an all-around man about town. He also made shrewd real estate investments that only added to his fortune.”

In his *The Buildings of Detroit: A History*, William Hawkins Ferry writes that Scott ‘had the reputation for being a vindictive, scurrilous misanthrope... His enemies were legion, for he seemed to delight in feuds, lawsuits and practical jokes.’

Scott died as an heir-less bachelor in 1910. “Scott’s last will and testament,” says *Detroit 1701*, “devoted his fortune (about \$200,000) to the erection of a fountain on Belle Isle, but demanded that a life-size statue of himself be included. Some thought that his will was a mean-spirited practical joke, and many objected to building a monument to such a rogue.”

It took a few years for the ill feelings toward Scott to dissipate, but what resulted was worth the wait. Detroit was a growing, wealthy city that at the time was keenly interested in the “City Beautiful” movement to improve public spaces. And it became increasingly hard to justify not spending the gigantic gift to improve, and beautify, a portion of Belle Isle just because they didn’t like guy who put up the money.

When the green light even-

usually came from the city, executors of Scott’s will appointed four of the nation’s top architects to supervise a nationwide competition to select a designer for the fountain. They settled on Cass Gilbert, who also designed the main Detroit Public Library building and the U.S. Supreme Court building in Washington, D.C.

“As a result of a competition a design has been secured for the James Scott Memorial Fountain which is to be erected on Belle Isle, Detroit’s unique and beautiful pleasure park,” says a write-up in a 1914 edition of the *American Magazine of Art*, under the title “Art and Progress - A notable fountain for Detroit.”

“It is by Cass Gilbert of New York,” the article continued, “and provides for a great geyser which will throw a volume of water 90 feet high. This is surrounded by smaller jets which add to the beauty of the great column of water.” The national publication was kinder than local publications toward James Scott. It said only that his “generous bequest makes this magnificent work of art possible.” The bronze statue of Scott was modeled by sculptor Herbert Adams of New York.

Getting past the hangups about spending Scott’s gift and then settling on an architect was just the start of the process of building the fountain. Still fresh in city leaders’ minds was a failed effort – due to lack of funding – to build a 200th anniversary monument of the city’s founding on that southwest portion of Belle Isle in 1901.

“Many thought it was inappropriate to devote that same space on beautiful Belle Isle to a memorial for James Scott,” said *Detroit 1701*. “Scott’s estate kept appreciating as controversy raged. By the time building started, more than one \$1 million was available to add almost 1,000 yards to the west end of Belle Isle to accommodate the Scott Fountain.”

Construction of the fountain started 11 years after Scott’s death, and then took four years to open. “The long delays in starting work on the fountain were a matter of great concern to Gilbert,” wrote William A. Coles in

his book, *The History of America’s Greatest Fountain: The Scott Memorial Fountain on Belle Isle*. “There were many causes: disputes over jurisdiction and financial responsibilities, the cumbersome machinery of government, and surely, not least of all, the first World War was taking place.”

The city seemed to know it had a masterpiece in the making during the drawn-out building period. “With the completion of the grading about the fountain, which will provide a setting for the fountain and for landscape development,” said the 1922 city publication *Detroit Government: A Short Story of the Services Rendered*, “Detroit will have one of the most beautiful fountains in the world.”

The fountain was completed in 1923, but wasn’t unveiled until May 31, 1925, and cost \$500,000 to build (about \$9.3 million today). It is set on 40 acres of landfill with dirt and rock excavated from downtown building sites that was added to the west end of Belle Isle. Staring at the fountain and downtown Detroit is the statue of a seated Scott. Water from the fountain drains into a man-made lagoon.

“The fountain, executed from white marble, rises from a marble terrace in a series of basins,” says a write-up by the Cass Gilbert Society, admirers of the architect. “The basins are adorned with bas-relief panels. Sculpted lions, dolphins, and turtles, and the head of Neptune spout water. A life-sized bronze statue of Scott, set on a granite plinth, faces the fountain. Steps leading from the fountain terrace to the river evoke the design of Bethesda Terrace in New York’s Central Park.”

Nine pumps, ranging from 100 hp to 1/5 h.p. were originally installed under the fountain to push the water. The original electrical work, in a \$10,000 bid package, was handled by Donahue and Shoebottom, which also installed 54 “light outlets.” John Bollin Co. managed the entire project, and as best we can tell, that included the plumbing.

“Leaving \$500,000 to beautify the city, but only if it erected a statue in his honor, was Scott’s final practical joke, a thumb in the eye of those who found him and his antics offensive,” wrote Jeff Morrison in his book, *Guardians of Detroit – Architectural Sculpture in the Motor City*. “Scott finally had his last laugh, to the joy of generations of Detroiters.”

points higher than union workers.

•In Michigan, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin, nonunion workers supported Trump at a rate 7 points higher than union workers.

•The survey said 69 percent of nonunion skilled trades workers supported Trump, compared to 57 percent support among union trades.

“Nonunion construction workers not only supported President Trump at a significantly higher rate than union workers in 2024, but they also vastly outnumber union workers in the battleground states that will determine control of Congress next year,” said ABC President and CEO Michael Bellaman. “Despite this political reality, the Trump Administration continues to support the controversial project labor agreement mandate that President Joe Biden established

intervention and support, we can all help workers get the help they need before problems become more serious.

The Laborers Health and Safety Fund of North America has played a critical role in advancing these efforts. Through initiatives such as Laborers Escaping Adversity Now (LEAN LIUNA) and Blueprint for Balance (B4B), LIUNA members are provided with tools and resources to support both physical and mental well-being on and off the job-site. Additionally, collaboration with industry alliances, associations and roundtables ensures that best practices are continuously shared and improved upon.

The role of chronic pain. A critical component of maintaining this progress is recognizing the construction worker’s dual burden of physical and psychological stress; chronic pain is found at the root of both. While it’s well-established that construction workers experience psychological stress due to job insecurity, demanding hours, workplace bullying and high production pressures, there is also a powerful link between physical injury and mental health. Chronic pain can contribute to elevated levels of stress, anxiety and depression.

Sometimes, experiencing (or even witnessing) serious injuries can also cause long-term psychological issues, such as post-traumatic stress disorder.

Chronic pain is also one of the primary drivers behind the use of prescription pain medications in construction. The pressure to work through the pain and avoid lost wages often pushes workers toward quick pain relief solutions that carry long-term risks, such as addiction or dependence.

Research shows that workers diagnosed with musculoskeletal disorders (MSDs) are more than four times more likely to develop an opioid use disorder than those who started opioids for other diagnoses. A strong focus on injury prevention plays a crucial role in continuing to reduce the overdose death rate in construction.

The LHSFNA researches and promotes strategies to reduce musculoskeletal injuries, such as improving work environments, better task planning and the using innovative technologies such as exoskeletons. These devices are designed to reduce strain during repetitive or physically demanding tasks, which can help minimize fatigue and lower the risk of injury over time. Additionally, the fund researches and promotes non-drug approaches to managing pain like chiropractic care, acupuncture and yoga.

Moving forward. Reducing the physical strain of construction work can lower the need for pain medications and help address one cause of substance use. Even though construction is still a high-risk industry, the recent drop in overdose and suicide rates shows that progress is possible. To keep improving, the industry must continue focusing on safety, health education, mental health support and preventing injuries.

“The PLA mandate tells nonunion construction workers they are unworthy of participating in federally funded projects, which risks alienating a workforce that forms a critical part of the GOP’s electoral base, particularly in swing states where nonunion workers play an outsized role.”

•When asked whether the federal government should have the flexibility to select contractors based on best value for taxpayers, rather than union affiliation, 83 percent of nonunion construction workers agreed or strongly agreed, and 73 percent of union construction workers agreed or strongly agreed.

•The ABC chose not to highlight the survey question, “project labor agreements unfairly punish nonunion contractors just because they aren’t unionized.” The survey found that 64 percent of union workers agreed or strongly agreed with that statement. Among nonunion respondents, 78 percent agreed or strongly agreed – but that means, tellingly, that 22 percent of open shop workers did not agree that PLAs punish their own employers.

Maybe they’re on to something? Maybe there is also a basic flaw in the survey, which seems to assume that the opinions of nonunion workers are in lockstep with their companies’ non-union owners. That’s akin to mistakenly assuming that union workers are in political agreement with union leaders or their companies’ owners.

The ABC has probably never seen a PLA that it liked: such agreements, which are widely used in private industries and

among state and local governments, usually require the hiring of construction contractors whose workers are paid collectively bargained wages, who have passed Department of Labor-approved apprenticeship programs, who have taken part in training and safety programs, and who may agree to undergo drug and alcohol testing.

Utilizing any or all of those employment conditions can make good business sense for the project owner or governing agency, as PLAs can help assure ready availability of a skilled, fairly compensated workforce, with no strikes or lockouts, and a verifiably trained workforce.

If ABC contractors were more willing to do all that, then they would be more apt to bid on PLA projects. Instead, they file lawsuits seeking to cancel PLAs.

The ABC’s efforts in filing lawsuits and undertaking an odd survey to try to force the elimination of construction PLAs isn’t part of an effective business plan for its contractors – it is simply not giving the customer what he or she wants.

Perhaps a more effective plan would be to take the high road, and properly train construction staff, hire local workers for local projects, avoid cheaper 1099 hires, pay a prevailing wage and pension, and offer good health care insurance.

Learning how to improve the living standards of their workforce would be a value-add for ABC contractors looking to improve their competitiveness. Perhaps they could develop a new employee survey to help them do that.

Building input costs rise, led by energy and metals

a sharp 41.0 percent monthly increase from March to April.

Metals prices also continued to increase sharply. Aluminum mill shapes prices were up 37.3 percent compared to April 2025, while copper and brass mill shapes increased 20.9 percent over the year. Fabricated structural metal bar joists and rebar increased 13.6 percent year over year, while steel mill products prices climbed 13.3 percent over the same period.

There were more moderate percentage changes from April 2024 to April 2025 among other construction inputs. Construction machinery and equipment prices increased 4.0 percent year over year. Lumber and plywood rose 2.1 percent. Cement declined 0.1 percent, and gypsum building materials declined 1.5 percent.

“Construction input prices surged again in April,” said ABC Chief Economist Anirban Basu. “Input prices have now risen more during the first four months of 2026 (6.2 percent) than over the prior three years (4.8 percent).”

institutional segment was up 28.8 percent over the same period.

The DMI is a monthly measure based on the three-month moving value of nonresidential building projects going into planning, shown to lead construction spending for nonresidential buildings by a full year to 18 months.

While much of the recent rise can be traced to soaring oil prices, escalation was widespread in April, with tariff-affected materials like iron and steel posting particularly large price increases.”

Plumbing Law Changes: Starting March 20, 2025, anyone performing plumbing work in Michigan must either be registered and in good standing with the State as a plumbing apprentice or hold a current journeyman or master plumbing license. The new legislation also establishes a ratio of one journeyman for every two apprentices, with significant penalties, including steep fines and the suspension or revocation of a plumbing contractor's license for non-compliance.

This is excellent news for our industry and presents a great opportunity to expand our market share in West Michigan. Make sure that your license or apprentice registration is up to date with the State. If your license has expired or you need to register as an apprentice, you must contact the State Licensing Division at 517-241-9316.

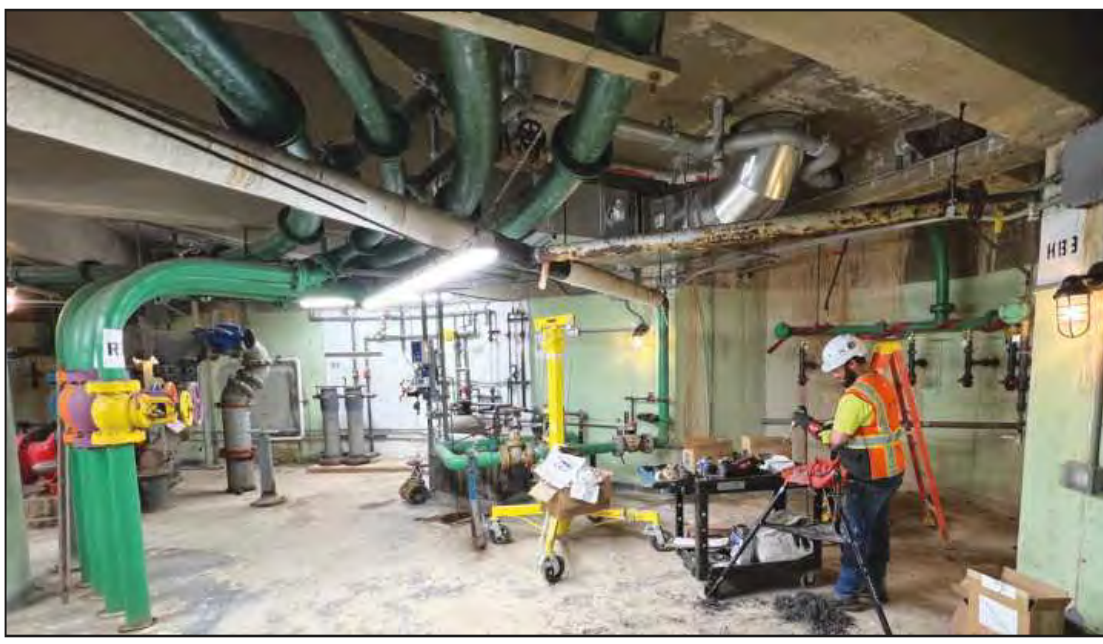

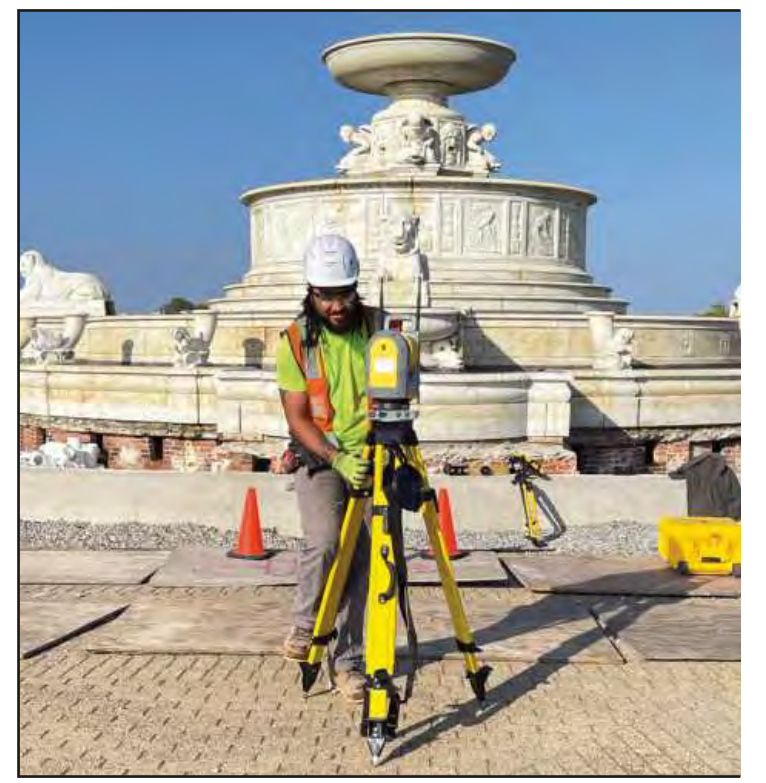

Majestic Scott Fountain gets makeover, both inside and out

(Continued from Page 1) disassembled the fountain. We're replacing electrical and plumbing systems. It is a beautiful fountain, but over the years it's been out here, just exposed to the elements. Minimal water infiltration can cause a significant impact on the structure."

Constructed of white Vermont marble, the diameter of the fountain's lower bowl is 510 feet. The structure is 38 feet tall and its central water column spouts about 125 feet in the air.

The fountain also has 109 water outlets in the shape of dolphins, turtles, lions and human figures.

The fountain is the most prominent part of the landscape in its spot on the southwest end of Belle Isle, closest to downtown Detroit. For decades the fountain has been a destination for Belle Isle visitors, and the subject or backdrop for countless family, graduation and tourist photos.

While there's a lot going on above ground with the fountain's complex marble basins and fixtures,

as well as pipes and drains, there's plenty of complexity below, too. An entire level under the fountain includes a water intake, three pumps, feeder pipe, drains, and electric equipment powering the fountain's pumps and lights. The space underground has been unheated, and Martinez said a new air intake system will help relieve some of the high humidity that's present in the warmer months.

Over the decades the fountain has been in and out of service. It is currently out of service for the duration of this project.

In 2006 we featured a general cleaning and significant rehabilitation project of the fountain's joints and seams led by Bricklayers and Allied Craftworker masons employed by Chezcore. At the time electricians and plumbers also rehabilitated the fountain's three pumps and associated wiring. More plumbing work and stone cleaning was performed in 2014. Christman was not involved in either project.

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources, which oversees operations on Belle Isle, provided an outline of this Scott Fountain project when it kicked off in May 2025, in the structure's 100th anniversary year.

"To ensure the basin's structural integrity and protect the underlying mechanical room, the renovation project will involve installing new concrete beams and replacing the underlying fountain plumbing," the Michigan DNR said.

Said Thomas Bissett, urban district supervisor for the DNR Parks and Recreation Division: "Results of the concrete core samples taken from the lower bowl showed the basin structure needed to be addressed. Additionally, a watertight seal and marble elements around the lower bowl will help prevent water infiltration to subgrade

operational space."

The DNR said the money to rehabilitate the fountain comes via an allocation from the 2021 federal American Rescue Plan. The DNR said other money from that source will help "tackle a decades-long backlog of infrastructure and rehabilitation projects" in state parks and trails.

"This investment, made possible by American Rescue Plan funds, will ensure the long-term preservation of an iconic feature in Belle Isle Park," said Ron Olson, DNR Parks and Recreation chief.

Maintenance of the fountain has come in cycles, and this latest effort involves extensive work on the plumbing, a task being led by Progressive Mechanical Foreman Kevin Shepherd of Plumbers Local 98.

Working with apprentice Jalief Thomas, Shepherd said their scope of work includes plumbing in the lower bowl of the fountain and below: replacing old valves, re-working the water supply system all the way to the mouths of the decorative turtles and other features, replacing water lines and adding new overflow drains.

"The system wasn't really operational when we got on site," Sheperd said. "We valved off everything to get done what we need to do. We haven't found

anything leaking. A lot of it is just old."

He said he can only speculate exactly what existing plumbing materials might be original to the fountain, but some of the older fittings include brass pipes feeding the turtles and galvanized drain lines. Both are getting PVC replacements.

The toughest part of the job so far, Shepherd said, has been drilling 28 holes through three-foot-thick walls to allow passage of new water supply pipe to feed features on the fountain.

Looking around at all the one-of-kind pipe work in the fountain's basement, Shepherd said, "this is a cool project to be a part of. I'm looking forward to bringing my family down here when it's complete and telling them I had a role in restoring it."

Ospreys: a hawk to look up to

(From the Michigan DNR)
 Help observe osprey nests – they're built in surprising spots!
 Once you know where ospreys like to build their giant nests, you won't be able to stop looking for them.

Ospreys are long-lived birds (averaging 15-20 years), and pairs usually return to the same nest and add to it each year. Made of sticks and lined with grasses, mud and soft materials, nests can reach 10-13 feet deep and 3-6 feet in diameter after years of building.

Historically, ospreys nested only on cliffs, at the tops of tall trees or on "snags" – dead trees that are still standing. But due to humans removing or disturbing these important habitat elements, ospreys have adapted to build nests on human-built structures like utility poles, towers and platforms.

They seem to especially like cell towers. In 2024 and 2025, Adopt-A-Nest community scientists conducted 238 osprey nest check surveys in 22 Michigan counties and found that 56 percent of the nests observed were built in cell towers.

In fact, over 97 percent of the observations in this study period were of nests created on human-built structures. Nests were also found on pole platforms, electric poles, high tension towers, light poles, snags, telephone poles and water towers. Ospreys eat fish, so their favorite nesting sites are near rivers, lakes and wetlands.

"Once you know that ospreys might be nesting in tall structures all around you, it's hard to keep your eyes out of the sky," said Michigan Department of Natural Resources wildlife biologist Kara Colton. "These resilient raptors are amazing to witness, and every observation becomes part of their conservation story. Are you hooked yet? We hope you'll volunteer to adopt an osprey nest!"

Volunteer to observe nests near you.

The Osprey Adopt-A-Nest program was started by MI Birds, a partnership between Audubon Great Lakes and the DNR. In 2022, the Michigan Natural Fea-

tures Inventory stepped in to help support this important data collection effort long-term. This work is only possible with the help of Adopt-A-Nest volunteers who monitor osprey nests and track the reproductive success of nesting pairs throughout Michigan.

To sign up to volunteer, contact MNFI at mnfi@msu.edu and indicate the county where you would like to observe. Volunteers need to visit a nest three times, for 30 minutes each visit, in spring through late summer. A pair of binoculars is the only tool needed for most observations, though a spotting scope is helpful for monitoring cell tower nests.

Volunteers use an online form to report observations, including location information, whether a nest is occupied by a nesting pair of ospreys and, if so, whether they are successfully raising chicks.

In southern Michigan, May through July is the most active period for osprey nesting; in northern Michigan, it's June through August. By late summer, young ospreys develop feathers (called "fledging") that are large enough for flight. The birds then

migrate south in the fall.

Ospreys (*Pandion haliaetus*) are large, 22- to 25-inch hawks with long, narrow wings, with dark brown feathers above and white feathers below. The osprey is a species of special concern in Michigan.

Ospreys are an indicator species for monitoring the long-term health of large rivers and other water bodies. They depend on fish as their main food source and are highly sensitive to contaminants. According to the International Osprey Foundation, "The osprey is considered a sentinel species, alerting us to the changing environmental conditions in the ecosystem they inhabit, and share with us, their neighbors."

Historically, ospreys lived all over Michigan, but in the 1940s they were wiped out in the southern Lower Peninsula due to indiscriminate shooting and contaminants like the pesticide DDT. After Michigan banned DDT in 1969 (the first state to do so) osprey populations recovered well in the north, but not as well in southern Michigan.

Today, ospreys are back in southern Michigan, but there are

still twice as many ospreys in the northern Lower Peninsula and three times as many in the Upper Peninsula.

"Surveying the reproductive success of osprey nesting pairs provides valuable insight into the distribution and health of populations across Michigan," said Michigan Natural Features Inventory zoologist David Cuthrell. "Data from these surveys can help scientists learn how to better aid ospreys in their recovery from previous near extirpation. It also helps us understand the overall health of the environments where they live."

New state-record gizzard shad caught in the Grand River

An angler from Lowell, Mich., caught a new state-record fish: a gizzard shad that weighed 4.45 pounds, measuring 20.3 inches long.

Sedrick Neinhuis was spincasting on the Grand River in Kent County on the afternoon of Wednesday, April 22, when he brought in the record-breaker.

This fish beats the previous state-record gizzard shad, which was 4.12 pounds and 21 inches, caught by baitcasting in 1996 on Lake St. Clair (St. Clair County).

Gizzard shad are a fish native to Michigan and are named for their gizzard, a muscular organ filled with grit and stones that helps to break down food. It's a characteristic more commonly associated with birds like chickens than with fish.

DNR fisheries biologist Matt Diana, who works out of Plainwell in the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' Southern Lake Michigan Fisheries Management Unit, verified Neinhuis' new state-record fish.

"We kind of knew the fish was there," said Neinhuis of that day on the water. "Our mission this year was to get one close to 5 pounds. There are a lot of big ones out there, but it's one of those fish people don't ever report. I'm hoping next year we can get one even bigger."

About state-record fish. Michigan's state-record fish are recognized by weight only. To qualify, fish must exceed the current listed state-record weight and be weighed on a certified commercial scale, and identification must be verified by a DNR fisheries biologist.

'Tis the season for stocking fish

 Fish stocking trucks are hitting the road!

It's a busy season: This time of year, Michigan Department of Natural Resources fish stocking trucks are releasing their prized cargo – trout, salmon, muskie and walleye – at hundreds of lakes and streams statewide.

The DNR accomplishes this work by rearing fish at its six fish production facilities located throughout the state, along with

other cooperative rearing facilities, and by maintaining a fleet of 18 specialized fish stocking vehicles.

More than 20 million fish (weighing more than 350 tons) are stocked by the DNR annually. Species stocked include steelhead; Atlantic, Chinook and coho salmon; splake (a hybrid of brook and lake trout) and brown, brook, lake and rainbow trout; muskellunge and walleye.

Beginning in mid-March and ending in early June, the DNR fish stocking trucks will travel well over 100,000 miles to stock more than a thousand locations.

Some of the many fish stocked will be salmon that have been implanted with a coded-wire tag or are otherwise marked or tagged. These tags provide useful information on the fishery to fisheries managers.
