Drop in fuel prices drives index lower

Construction input prices decreased 0.1 percent in April compared to the previous month, according to an Associated Builders and Contractors analysis of U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics' Producer Price Index data released May 15. Nonresidential construction input prices increased 0.2 percent for the month.

Overall construction input prices are 0.1 percent higher than a year ago, while nonresidential construction input prices were 0.2 percent higher.

Prices decreased in all three energy categories last month, including a 7.1 percent drop in natural gas prices.

"Construction input prices declined in April, but that was largely due to falling energy prices," said ABC Chief Economist Anirban Basu. "Materials directly affected by tariffs saw sharp price increases for the month. Steel mill product prices, for instance, rose 5.9 percent, while copper wire and cable prices increased 5.0 percent.

In other sectors year over year, concrete prices were up 2.3 percent, lumber and wood products rose 1.4 percent while fabricated structural metal products rose 4.6 percent.

Overall, the government numbers reveal that input prices for construction have risen 41.3 percent compared to the month prior to the onset of the pandemic, in February 2020. Those price hikes have generally moderated over the past three years - but the impact of President Trump's tariffs are just around the corner.

New and much improved: state erects modern psychiatric hospital

Editor NORTHVILLE TWP. – Michigan is finally building modern physical space to serve psychiatric patients.

Made possible by a \$325 million state budget allocation, a new inpatient psychiatric hospital is being erected on Haggerty Road south of Seven Mile, on land occupied by the demolished Hawthorn Center. Construction at the new hospital is being led by the Christman Co., which is undertaking a remarkably complex project, spread over 406,000 square feet.

"What we're building here is going to be such a great leap forward in what the state offers in terms of mental health facilities," said Christman Project Executive Andrew Miller. "We talk all the time about what a positive impact this is going to have on the mental health community."

Located on a 45-acre footprint, the new mental health facility will serve patients



On appeal, judges uphold Trump's union-busting for 1 million federal workers

WASHINGTON, D.C. (PAI) - Using the transparent excuse that lower courts are still hearing cases, a three-judge U.S. appeals court panel decided 2-1 to reinstate President Donald Trump's obliteration of union contracts covering a million federal workers.

The two Republican-named judges hearing the Trump regime's case against a nationwide injunction upheld Trump and ruled against the Treasury Employees (NTEU) and their allies.

Judges Karen Henderson and Justin Walker said NTEU acted purely on speculation and hadn't suffered any actual harm yet.

Without actual harm, the two Republican-named appellate judges also said NTEU didn't have "standing," or the right to sue to stop the Trump ax or multibillionaire Elon Musk's chainsaw against federal workers, agencies and programs. The Treasury Employees had no immediate comment on the appellate judges' May 19 ruling, overturning a nationwide preliminary injunction, in NTEU's favor, ordered by U.S. District Judge Paul Friedman in D.C.

The appellate judges also explained two other district courts, both in deep-red states, are still wading through virtually identical cases where the Trump government is on the offense, defending its order against the unions involved.

Trump also uses "national security" as an excuse to trash the collective bargaining agreements covering around two-thirds of the remaining federal workers, a million of whom are actual union members. The judges didn't deal with that rationale.

The practical effect of the D.C. appellate judges' order is to once again set Trump free to fire federal workers, regardless of federal law, the Constitution or actual harm to the economy, the workers, their families or the rest of the country.

The Treasury Employees "asserts that without a preliminary injunction it will losing bargaining power and suffer reputational harm that will deter present and future membership," the two GOP-named appellate judges wrote in their ruling overturning the injunction. "But those harms are speculative because they would materialize only after an agency terminates a collective bargaining agreement, and the government directed agencies to refrain from terminating collective bargaining agreements or decertifying bargaining units until after the litigation concludes.'

Conversely, the two appellate judges said Trump would suffer "an irreparable injury" by having his hands tied by union curbs on his "national security prerogatives." But they rejected NTEU's very real "irreparable injury" from lost members, revenues and ability to bargain on behalf of workers.

Work zone crashes deadly for drivers

Motorists are almost twice as likely to die in a work zone crash as construction workers, according to the results of a new highway work zone study released May 20 by the Associated General Contractors of America and HCSS, a construction software company.

More than 600 contractors participated in the related survey. Among those who reported experiencing a work zone crash, 30 percent experienced crashes that resulted in injury to construction workers. But 71 percent reported experiencing a crash in which drivers or passengers were injured.

The AGC said the new data highlights the need for stronger work zone safety laws and better enforcement.

"Workers are counting on the traveling public to slow down and pay attention, but too often, the public is letting them down," said Jeffrey D. Shoaf, the AGC's chief executive officer. He said 47 percent of contractors report that highway work zones are more dangerous than they were a year ago. Nearly one-third of firms reported experiencing five or more crashes during the past year.

Vital NIOSH joins list of imperiled **U.S.** agencies

By Marty Mulcahy Editor WASHINGTON, D.C. -NIOSH – the National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health - is a small, under-appreciated, but important federal agency that helps assure the health and safety of the American worker.

And like the rest of the federal government these days - especially those that support workers-NIOSH is under attack. The AFL-CIO and a group of member

unions on May 14 filed a federal lawsuit to stop what would be an existential threat to a government agency that conducts a wide body of research that has saved workers' lives and improved their well-being.

"The Trump Administration and Health and Human Services Secretary Robert F. Kennedy Jr.'s reckless cuts to NIOSH - made under the direction of Elon Musk's DOGE-have shut down vital programs and will result in the firing

LANSING - The decadeslong effort to stop employers in Michigan from misclassifying workers as "independent contractors" - and denying the employees all manner of benefits - took a step forward May 13.

The Senate Labor Committee moved Senate Bills 6 and 7 out of committee for a full vote on the Senate floor. The Democratsponsored legislation, which advanced on a party-line vote with all Republican lawmakers opposing, would bring new fines and a threepart "ABC Test" to determine if a construction employer is properly or improperly treating an employee as an independent contractor.

Editor WASHINGTON, D.C. - The Trump Administration's Department of Labor announced on May 1 that it will no longer enforce a Biden-formulated, worker-friendly federal policy on classifying independent contractors.

The Biden-era Department of Labor stated in 2024 that the new rule "provides guidance on proper classification and seeks to combat employee misclassification, a serious problem that impacts workers' rights to minimum wage and overtime pay, facilitates wage theft, allows some employers to undercut their law-abiding competition and hurts the economy at large."

The May 1 statement said the DOL is "reconsidering" the rule, and is "currently reviewing and developing the appropriate standard for determining FLSA employee versus independent contractor status."

In the meantime, the DOL said federal policy reverts to a more employer-friendly rule, which requires that employers distinguish an employment relationship from a strictly contractual one based on an "economic reality" test, rather than "technical concepts."

"The Biden rule had a standard that made it more likely that a given worker would be found to be an 'employee' rather than (Continued on Page 3)

Trades, Midwest Steel improve 1st responder training frame

HOWELL - Buildings fall over. Trench walls collapse. People get injured in high places that aren't easily accessible. And twisted metal and rubble often need to be moved out of the way in order to access victims who need help.

First responders to those situations are not always prepared to deal with what they find. Enter MUSAR - the nonprofit Michigan Urban Search and Rescue Training Foundation - which offers first responders the opportunity to practice all manner of victim rescues.

And the dedicated place they have had to conduct that training since 1999 – on a plot of land at the vast Operating Engineers Local 324 Training Center - just got more useful. Midwest Steel, and members of Operating Engineers Local 324 and Iron Workers Local 25 all stepped up last month to volunteer their time, talents and hardware to improve and bridge the steel towers. Their handiwork will enhance MUSAR's ability to train first responders, especially with high rope rescues.

No strikes. No balls?

You can spend a lifetime studying the rich history of the labor movement. While you are doing that, new union battles and campaigns will constantly arise. Laws will change, the economy will change, industries will rise and fall. New technologies will challenge workers in previously unimagined ways. Yet the fact remains that the more you study all of the complexities of the past, present, and future, you are left with one central truth: The power of organized labor is the power of the strike.

Without the strike, the labor movement's claim to power falls apart.

This fundamental and unalterable truth - the basic insight that led workers to form unions in the first place – has been echoing in my mind as I have watched the Trump Administration carry out the most naked assault on organized labor since World War II. In 1981, President Ronald Reagan fired about 12,000 striking air traffic controllers during the infamous PATCO Strike - an action long considered to be the worst thing the U.S. government has done to labor unions in my lifetime. For Donald Trump, that would hardly constitute a single day's work.

Trump has illegally fired hundreds of thousands of federal government workers; tossed out the active union contract covering nearly 50,000 TSA workers; and, most staggeringly, declared that more than 700,000 unionized workers at a slew of federal agencies are just not allowed to have unions. Using the laughably flimsy pretext of "national security," Trump's March 27 executive order purports to tell all of those union members, working under union contracts, that they are no longer union members working under union contracts after all.

It is the boldest and most grotesque example of union-busting the modern labor movement has seen from an American president.

So what will the labor movement do about it?

Rather than reciting legalistic details, let us say plainly what is happening here: Organized labor is being tested by a White House that wants to, to the furthest extent possible, wipe it off the map. The law prohibits federal employees from striking. Then again, the law also prohibits the executive branch from gutting the federal workforce and impounding Congressional appropriations and generally behaving in the unaccountable manner that it has.

When existing union contracts were disregarded during the wide-scale federal worker layoffs by Elon Musk's Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE), there were no strikes. When the TSA contract was thrown in the trash, there was no strike. When the hundreds of thousands of federal union members were preposterously told they are no longer union members, there was no strike.

Through every step of an increasingly aggressive series of tests of the labor movement's power, the administration has learned that there are no real consequences. Besides filing lawsuits and issuing angry statements, unions have done little to teach Trump that he has anything to fear from attempting to destroy them.

We are now living through a gruesome demonstration of what happens when unions allow their strike muscles to atrophy. A century ago, before workers had many legal protections, everything they won was won by fighting- by the strike. After the National Labor Relations Act of 1935 formalized the relationship between unions, business, and the government, that changed. Unions evolved to wield their power in the context of NLRB elections, federally mediated contracts and political lobbying.

This is more civilized than unconstrained strikes over every dispute. But this system is now being set on fire by a dictatorial Republican Party that refuses to respect labor law, and will almost certainly get the Supreme Court to disembowel its key parts over the next few years. Like a boxer who has not been told he is now in a street fight, organized labor finds itself waiting for a referee who no longer exists, as his opponent attacks him with a brick.

When Trump's executive order wiping away the federal unions came down, the biggest union impacted, the American Federation of Government Employees (AFGE), filed a lawsuit. They asked people to call their representatives. They held a press conference in Washington. They got allies in Congress to file a supportive bill. They ran, in other words, the playbook of a game that the other side is no longer playing. All of these tactics will fail. Trump- with the full support of his party- has decided to simply bulldoze unions first, and allow loyalists in the courts and the regulatory agencies to clean up the legal niceties later. The union world will either wake up to this reality very soon, or be smashed while it is waiting for the return of a comforting, bureaucratic system of protection that is already gone. What power do unions have when right wing courts are against us? When the NLRB has ceased to function? When the government disregards our contracts, fires our members, and declares our painstakingly won rights to be nonexistent? We have the power of the strike. That is the one power that no president or court or employer can ever take away. Workers do the work, and they can stop doing the work. Everything the labor movement has built flows from that truth. The power of the contracts and the laws and the agencies that are supposed to protect us are all, ultimately, contingent on the fundamental power of the strike. We are finding out the hard way that unions that cannot or will not strike are exceedingly easy to disregard. The institutions of the American labor movement, after decades spent intertwining themselves with electoral politics, have been fulled into the belief that capital and labor have mutually agreed to civilized government mediation of our relationship. Alas. Trump has evaporated that mirage. The public sector, which makes up half of U.S. union membership, is under direct attack, and the private sector will not be far behind, as employers realize that the government is no longer interested in restraining them from committing the most vicious attacks on their own unions and organizing campaigns. The less clear-eyed unions are going to be shocked by how quickly the rules that they thought were permanent are about to disappear. Even now, there are union leaders who will say it is foolish to start planning for illegal strikes, or wildcat strikes, or a general strike. They will say those things are irresponsible, dangerous, against the rules. Though I wish it were not the case, they will find that they themselves were the fools for clinging to old methods of power that are becoming less practical by the day. Look into the heart of your union. Is it ready to strike to keep what it has? If the answer is "no," the most important work you can do right now is to change that. We are all about to be forced to re-learn the lesson that our movement's ancestors knew: Without strikes, we will get nothing.

New, modern psychiatric hospital

(Continued from Page 1) Psychiatric Hospital (1979) in Westland. The two facilities have served nearly 200 patients and are among the state's five inpatient psychiatric hospitals for individuals who have severe mental illness or intellectual and developmental disabilities. During construction, Hawthorn patients have been moved to the Reuther center.

Combined with the completion two years ago of the a new psychiatric hospital in Caro, the state is finally upgrading its mental health care infrastructure after decades of inattention.

"This is such an interesting job," said Christman Senior Project Manager Keith Berry. "The facility has a thoughtful design, and there are so many details centered around benefiting patients and keeping them safe. When we walk away, this building is going to mean a lot to the patients and staff, and it's going to be such a major improvement over the existing facilities."

Spread out over 11 "neighborhoods" with courtyards and green space between buildings, the new facility will have all manner of interior and exterior spaces, including three wings for children separated from four wings for adults. In addition to 231 rooms with 264 beds, it will have a full-service medical suite, dental offices, a salon, a gymnasium with a stage, a chapel, music room, art room, library, and kitchen space. The complex, which is being erected on one or two levels, will include shared administration and food service.

"Anti-ligature" elements – referring to features or products that specifically avoid the use of materials like cords, ropes, fabrics or fixtures that could be used for self-harm-have actively

been designed into the facility. Design services are provided by Integrated Design Solutions LLC.

"We are excited to be able to provide Michigan families in need of inpatient, behavioral health care a new state-of-the-art hospital in southeastern Michigan," said Elizabeth Hertel, Michigan Department of Health and Human Services director. "The modern facility will allow MDHHS to continue providing quality, compassionate care to both children and adults. The consolidation of two of our current hospitals will also allow for efficiencies in administrative and support services while maintaining separate living and treatment facilities for adults and children."

Demolition at the site began in September 2023. Completion of the project is expected in June 2026, with patients arriving in January 2027. Last month there were 280 tradespeople on site, a number that will peak at 375-400 this summer. "We're making every attempt to sequence the trades in various area so no one is working on top of each other," said Christman Project Manager/ Supt. Brian Crumm.

Even with the wide variety of mechanical, structural and finish surface aspects that are going into the complex, Berry said the most challenging aspect so far has been timing. That is, on the calendar. "It's usually never a good thing to start earth work in December, but here we are," Berry said. "And the project, which is on a fast track, has gone well. We really have a good group of tradespeople out here and a lot of good foremen, and what they bring kind of trickles down to everybody.'

The State of Michigan operates five inpatient hospitals that serve nearly 650 patients. The newly erected Caro Center, as well as the Kalamazoo Psychiatric Hospital and Walter Reuther Psychiatric Hospital serve adult patients while children and adolescents have been treated at Hawthorn Center. The Center for Forensic Psychiatry provides diagnostic services to the criminal justice system and psychiatric treatment for criminal defendants adjudicated incompetent to stand trial or acquitted by not guilty by reason of insanity.

The state Department of Technology, Management and Budget "is proud to be a part of this effort to improve the lives of Michiganders most in need of care," said Michelle Lange, DTMB director. "Our team of construction experts are eager to exercise their skills to ensure that the new psychiatric facility is completed on time and on budget and is a top-notch facility that meets the needs of both the patients and staff."




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BUILDING MICHIGAN: Victoria Dam and powerhouse **HISTORY IN THE MAKING** By Marty Mulcahy



THE VICTORIA DAM and powerhouse have been using a drop in the Ontonogan River to create power since it opened in 1931. Originally built to power a copper mine, the plant now provides hydroelectricity to the local utility. The penstock (pipeline) seen in the middle of the photo delivers water down to the power plant.

Moving power across the remote Upper Peninsula has been a challenge since Edison invented the light bulb, and Westinghouse, Tesla and others made dynamos a thing.

Today, moving power in a cost-effective manner is a challenge more than ever, with electricity costs in the U.P. well above the national average and the switch to cleaner energy sources by regional utilities making power supply and distribution a constant source of concern and irritation because of rising utility bills.

A century ago, the power distribution system in the U.P. was in its infancy, and if you wanted a lot of electricity - say to run a copper mine or a sawmill – it helped to be in an area where a lot of water could be made to run downhill and the local geography allowed for the construction of a dam and powerhouse. And at Victoria, near Rockland, those same landscape features also made possible a remarkably innovative air compression system that used water and gravity to create compressed air to power tools and motors.

The Copper Range Mining Co. decided to take advantage of all those natural advantages and constructed the Victoria Dam and powerhouse on the Ontonagan River. "In 1929, before the great stock market crash," says Copper Country, "work began on the Victoria hydroelectric development. In January 1931, the facility was placed in commercial operation to provide electricity for the area's copper mining and forest products industries." The works represented the first industrial-grade effort at the site to extract copper – which had been a known quality in the Keweenaw area since prehistoric times. A cache of tools found buried at the site and scientific dating indicate there were copper mining efforts there about 9,500 years ago. Prior to the appearance of Europeans, when native people were the area's sole inhabitants, a massive piece of float copper at the site, the Ontonagon Boulder, "was known to the Chippewa who considered it a gift from the Great Manitou," says a history prepared by the Northern Michigan University **Beaumier Heritage Center. Copper mining operations** at the site took place on and off beginning in the 1770s. Victoria, today basically a ghost town, became "a pilgrimage site for many European explorers to the region and it inspired the earliest (non-pre-historic) mining venture in Michigan." "Victoria Dam is located in Rockland, MI on the west branch of the Ontonagon River," says UP Travel. "This section of West Branch Ontonagon River was once the home of the famous Ontonagon Boulder (a copper boulder now housed in the Smithsonian that weighs almost two tons) and a tall,

"A dam and basin now cover both landmarks and only an overflow channel, one that is rarely flowing, remains. Viewing the drop is easy, as it flows down from the opposite bank facing an access point. The dam is quite a wonder to see in person, especially considering its remote location and how much extra effort would have been required to get building materials to the site."

The Cushin Mine opened at the site in 1849, it was later renamed the Forest Hill Mine, and then reorganized as the Victoria Mining Co. The fortunes of the town of Victoria ebbed and flowed with the movement of copper prices. Copper made a comeback in the 1870s, and together with a local sawmill there were jobs available and a number of residences, shops, and other business sprang up. In 1906, a self-taught engineer and geologist named Charles Havelock Taylor developed a system that required no electricity and no moving parts. Once set up, it provided a perpetual source of compressed air power at Victoria. 'Taylor's approach was ingeniously simple," wrote Andy Boyd in The Engines of our Ingenuity. "He began by excavating a cavern well below a river's surface. At the Victoria Mine in Michigan's Upper Peninsula, for example, the cavern was 18 feet wide, 20 feet high, and the length of a football field. By properly channeling water in from above a nearby dam, and out below it, air became trapped in the cavern and rose in pressure. "All that was needed were sealed pipes taking compressed air to the mining equipment. A safety valve led from the cavern to the surface that spewed like a geyser if pressure grew too high." Says the Ontonogan Chamber of Commerce: "The success of the Victoria Mine in the early 1900s was largely due to the invention of the Taylor Hydraulic Air Compressor, which used the power of the Ontonagon River to run pneumatic power to the mine."

1099 reform takes a step forward in state Senate

(particularly) in the construction industry, who are not paying their fair share of taxes," said one of the bill's sponsors, state Sen. Darrin Camilleri (D-Trenton). "If you are an employee who works 40 hours-plus per week, you're an employee. You're not an independent contractor."

For a worker to be considered an independent contractor, and receive a tax form 1099, under the legislation's "ABC Test" that worker must meet all four criteria: (1) Be paid for the work; (2) Be free from control of an employer; (3) Must do jobs outside of the payer's core business; and (4) Must be "customarily engaged" in an occupation or business they established independently.

The Michigan Chamber of Commerce complained that the legislation would "severely restrict how businesses can use independent contractors, while requiring new wage disclosure rules and imposing harsh penalties for wage and hour violations - including the possibility of criminal charges and jail time in certain cases.

Chamber Vice President of Business Advocacy Wendy Block said the state already follows the Biden Administration's "Economic Realities Test" which refers to a set of factors used to determine whether a worker is an employee or an independent contractor under the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA). The test, which was formalized in a rule issued by the U.S. Department of Labor in 2024, aims to clarify the distinction between these two worker classifications. (The Trump Administration had previously announced that it will no longer enforce the Biden-era rule on independent contractors; see related story in this edition).

Under the state legislation, employers could face a five-year, \$10,000 felony for the first found incident of not paying wages and fringe benefits worth \$1,000 through \$19,000 due to misclassification, or the employer might need to pay a fine equal to three times those wage and benefits spending on which is greater. Multiple guilty infractions will result in the employer receiving a minimum 10-year, \$15,000 felony.

"I think we can agree the state maybe needs to do a better job of trying to find these fly-by-night entities and to root out that problem," Block told the news service MIRS. "But under the bills, you're talking about throwing business leaders in prison for upwards of 20 years, making that a felony, and it isn't even clear who would be guilty of these violations. Is it the payroll department? Is it the CEO? Is it the manager?"

State independent contractor laws may or may not align categorically with the federal labor standard rules - the ABC Test is one area where state laws are more stringent than federal laws.

The future of the state legislation is murky, to say the least: Dems hold a slim one-seat majority in the full Senate, and Republicans - who have never looked kindly upon independent contractor reform - hold the majority in the state House.


"The vast majority of business owners are good actors here in the state of Michigan, but there are bad actors who basically use loopholes within the law to take advantage of workers," said the legislation's co-sponsor Kevin Hertel (D-St. Clair Shores). The Taylor air compressor ran for the last time in 1951.

The compressed air power at the site was frosting on the cake, but the real power came from the plant's hydroelectric works.

According to the Historic American Engineering Record, the original "reinforced, multiple-arch buttressed dam was never a very common type in the United States, and it was particularly uncommon in the eastern half of the country. Very few dams of this type were built after 1930. Victoria Dam was the best, largest example of the multiple-arch dam in Michigan." It was replaced in 1995.

The hydroelectric system continues to produce power today, with modern equipment.

According to *Electricity* Generation Insight, the plant creates 12 megawatts of power, developed evenly by two generators operating at 300 rpm spun by water falling a maximum of 215 feet.

A 10-foot diameter penstock, or pipeline, channels water from the bottom of the dam to spin the turbine. The Insight group says the plant is ranked No. 6 in power production among 51 hydroelectric power plants in Michigan.

The plant is operated remotely by its owner, the Upper Peninsula Power Co.



Plumbing Law Changes: Starting March 20, 2025, anyone performing plumbing work in Michigan must either be registered and in good standing with the State as a plumbing apprentice or hold a current journeyman or master plumbing license. The new legislation also establishes a ratio of one journeyman for every two apprentices, with significant This is excellent news for our industry and presents a great opportunity to expand our market share in West Michigan. Make sure that your license or apprentice registration is up to date with the State. If your license has expired or you need to register as an apprentice, you must contact the State Licensing Division at 517-241-9316.

Earned Sick Time Act (ESTA): Beginning on March 1, 2025 contractors will contribute 1/30 of your base wage for every hour worked into a Sick Fund on your behalf. Solxsys will set up and administer a fund for each individual member. Starting June 1, 2025 members will be able to fill out a form and request reimbursement for time missed. 

This is a 250-mw site which will require a substantial number of JIWs from our hall to complete.

Master Electric has begun their work on phase 2 at Bangor Schools

Countyline Power has ongoing work at the Mt. Pleasant Water Treatment facility and Harrisville Pumpstations. Countyline Power has also been recently awarded a high voltage termination project at Michigan Sugar in Bay City.

Clements Electric's Clements Electric has work at Mersen USA. They have also recently been awarded a maintenance contract at Mersen. Trades, Midwest Steel improve training frame

(Continued from Page 1)

"I'm personally blown away with everyone who dived in to help on this project," said Dave VanHolstyn, a program manager and board member of MUSAR, "and I can't emphasize how appreciative we are. We're always looking for ways to improve training for first responders, and what this group has done will provide everyone with a more realistic training experience."

Dave Rutledge, an Iron Workers Local 25 member employed as business development manager at Midwest Steel, was approached by leaders at the Local 25 Training Center about donating steel to improve and connect the towers. "We at Midwest Steel are always looking to help out the community," Rutledge said. "And this looked like an opportunity to do that. It was a great partnership involving Midwest Steel, the iron workers and operating engineers that made this happen."

The team worked on the most visible aspect of the MUSAR training site: a pair of 40-foot-tall steel training frames that have been in use at the Local 324 Training Center for more than a decade. One was a stair tower from the shuttered Ford-Wixom plant, the other came from GM's Pontiac Truck plant.

This project, undertaken with Local 324 equipment operators and Local 25 apprentices, resulted in the towers being connected with a 40-foot steel catwalk at the top to allow the training first responders to observe and participate in operations from above. Two platforms were also added to give the responders a loftier place to watch and participate.

"Connecting the structures has been a long-term vision for MU-SAR," said Van Holstyn, adding that the top bridge allows for valuable "free hanging space" for rope rescue practice and other drills and makes it convenient for participants to move from one tower to another. "And the platforms are super beneficial; a huge thing for us," he said.

"There was a lot of material needed to do the job and I asked Midwest Steel ownership to donate it, and they were happy to" Rutledge said. "We finished the stairs, set the gratings, and buttoned everything up to make sure it's a safe structure for them.'

First responders have come from all over Michigan, and across the country, to utilize the dedicated MUSAR training area at the Local 324 site. It has dedicated space for all manner of urban search and rescue training - including trench rescue, an obstacle course for K-9 unit dogs, building collapse, confined space training and fire/burning rescue.

Bob Vellmure, Dave Putnam, Ron Phillips, and Matt Cooper of Midwest Steel supervised the Local 25 apprentices who worked on the project, including Justin Anderson, Trevor Brown, Mason McCoy and Landen Mirasolo.

"Midwest Steel was proud to help on this project, and (company President/CEO) Tom Broad was happy to have Midwest Steel involved," said Sarah Schafer, marketing manager for Midwest Steel. "This is a great story of public service - we want firefighters and other first responders to be prepared save lives."

Operating Engineers 324 Labor-Management Education Committee Executive Director Lee Graham said Local 324 "is incredibly proud of our longstanding partnership with Michigan Urban Search and Rescue (MUSAR)," said "This partnership has spanned two decades. Collaborating with Midwest Steel and Ironworkers Local 25 to install this new bridge is just the latest example of the strong relationships we've built with our labor, contractor, and first-responder partners. MUSAR and its partners utilize this specialized area for joint training in critical emergency response scenarios - such as high-angle rope rescue, building collapse, and trench rescue - because we understand how essential it is to train together and be prepared when disaster strikes. "We're also working to expand both the scope and scale of our training facilities, because we recognize how vital this work is to public safety."

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
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Outdoors Turtles: Give 'em a brake

As spring transitions to summer and the warm temperatures roll in, Michiganders weary of winter excitedly begin adventuring across the state. It's a time of renewal and reinvigoration for many.

But as you head out, be on the lookout for turtles, which are also on the move this time of year.

Late spring and early summer are times when turtles are moving en masse across the landscape. The females are actively looking for nesting sites, and males also just kind of wander this time of year, moving between the lakes, ponds and streams they call home.

This overland movement often involves crossing roads, which unfortunately results in noticeable levels of turtle mortality throughout the state. That roadkill can be high enough to affect local populations and likely is the cause of the largest direct loss of adult turtles by humans.

"I receive calls every year from people in my area about dead turtles on the roads and have few answers for them," said Scott Heintzelman, fisheries biologist and Central Lake Michigan Unit manager for the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. "It is particularly sad to see or hear about turtles that have been intentionally hit on the road."

Turtles don't begin mating and laying eggs until age 8-10 and have extremely low natural mortality as adults. If not crushed by a car tire, they can and often do live for many decades.

Their low mortality as adults and ability to lay eggs annually for 20-50 years is necessary to overcome the extremely high mortality rate of juveniles and losses of turtle eggs.

With turtles, almost all the natural predation (what we might call "the circle of life") is concentrated on the eggs and baby turtles, which are easy targets and tasty morsels for Michigan's

racoon, opossum and skunk populations. A floating baby turtle is also irresistible to bass or wading birds like great blue herons.

As a result, the conservation

of these animals really hinges on the protection and survival of the adults, who have already survived the gauntlet of predator threats as juveniles themselves.

MDNR photos The interesting thing about turtles is not that they can live for 50-100 years in the wild, it is

produce for that long to maintain stable populations. In fact, the margin on adult turtle populations is so slim that a 6 percent annual mortality for adults is often enough to threaten sustainability and push local populations toward local extinction.

Let that sink in for a second. That means that in a population of 100 adult turtles, if six or more are lost every year, that population could decline and eventually disappear.

Comparatively, while popular Michigan game species like walleye or white-tailed deer can easily withstand sustained annual adult mortalities of 35 percent and 40 percent respectively, turtle sustainability is threatened by very small increases above that 6 percent threshold.

"Turtles face many threats, but perhaps the most preventable is direct mortality from vehicle strikes," said Jennifer Kleitch, the DNR's endangered species specialist. "Michigan is home to 10 native species of turtles, three being listed as threatened and one being of special concern. Everyone can do their part in helping conserve these rare reptiles by following some simple steps."

Michigan's native turtle species are:

•Wood turtle (Glyptemys insculpta) – state-threatened.

•Spotted turtle (Clemmys guttata) – state-threatened.

•Eastern box turtle (Terrapene Carolina) - state-threatened. •Blanding's turtle (Emydoi-

dea blandingii) – special concern. •Common map turtle (Graptemys geographica).

•Common musk turtle (Sternotherus odoratus).

•Common snapping turtle (Chelydra serpentina).

•Painted turtle (Chrysemys picta).

•Red-eared slider (Trachemys scripta subspecies elegans). •Spiny soft-shell turtle (Apalone spinifera).

Because adult survival is so important for turtles, anything the public can do to help reduce roadkill during spring and summer months can greatly benefit local populations.

The public can help by taking the following small steps:

When you see a turtle in the road while driving, slow down and try to avoid hitting it, if it is possible to do so safely. However, 2008)

do not veer to avoid hitting turtles.

Be aware near bridge crossings and stretches of road near lakes, streams and wetlands, where turtles are likely to be.

Don't attempt to hit or run over turtles on purpose. Not only is it harmful to the turtle and the local turtle population, it's also dangerous for you, your passengers and other vehicles on the road

If you choose to help a turtle cross the road (and you can do so safely), place the turtle across the road in the direction it was heading. Otherwise, the turtle may attempt to cross the road again to get to its desired location once vou leave.

When you find a turtle, don't pick it up and take it home. When an adult turtle is taken from its home range, that affects its local population in the same way as if it had died. All its potential future offspring are taken out of the ecosystem, too.

Except when they are in the middle of the road or other location where they're in immediate danger, turtles are exactly where they should be and do not need to be moved or helped by people.

Report turtle sightings on MIHerpAtlas.org to help scientists measure changes or trends in their populations.

There's not much the DNR, the Michigan Department of Transportation, county road commissions or other agencies and groups can do to keep these slow-moving animals from wandering onto roadways, but as professional natural resource managers, we can do our best to share their story and highlight this annual threat to turtle populations.

"Maybe the suggestions provided and sharing some insight as to what makes these animals so special might save a few turtles this spring and summer," Heintzelman said

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
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
