Jobless insurance programs extended

LANSING – Federal unemployment insurance programs that were set to expire on March 13, 2021, have been extended under the COVID-19 stimulus package approved by Congress and signed into law by President Joe Biden.

"Individuals with claims of any type should continue to certify as usual," said a statement from the Michigan Department of Labor and Economic Opportunity. "Most claimants will not experience a gap in benefits as long as they remain eligible and continue to certify."

Unemployment provisions under the federal American Rescue Plan extend the benefits from March 13 – Sept. 4, 2021.

Included in the package are lengthened benefits for Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (for self-employed); Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation, which provides additional weeks of benefits to those who exhaust their regular state benefits; Pandemic Unemployment Compensation, which provides all unemployed recipients with an additional \$300 per week; and Mixed Earners Unemployment Compensation, which provides an additional \$100 per week to claimants on some benefits programs who have self-employment income of at least \$5,000.

"Continuation of these federal benefit programs will provide some financial breathing room to Michigan workers as we continue to fight the effects of COVID-19," said Liza Estlund Olson, acting director of the Unemployment Insurance Agency. "Because this legislation extends the current federal programs, we expect to be able to implement the changes without a delay in payments."

Our infrastructure grades kinda stink

With COVID-19 soaking up so much attention, it's easy to forget that Gov. Gretchen Whitmer won her office in 2018 pledging to "fix the damn roads."

A new report by the American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE) brought up bubbles of that memory March 13, as they released a quadrennial report that listed the grades of each state when it comes to the state of our infrastructure.

Michigan's grade: D+. The entire United States did a bit better: C-. It was the first time in 20 years that the nation received a grade higher than a D.

To develop the grade, the ASCE takes a look at 17 key infrastructure areas including aviation, bridges, dams, drinking water, energy, hazardous waste, inland waterways, levees, ports, public parks, rail, roads, schools, solid waste, stormwater, transit, and wastewater. They then assigned a grade ranging from A-F.

Dems in Congress eased pension problem with needed fix: they threw money at it

WASHINGTON, D.C. – For two decades, when it comes to finding a plan to fix the ailing, woefully underfunded multi-employer pension system in the U.S., Congress has done what Congress usually does. Nothing.

It took the extraordinary COVID-influenced \$1.9 trillion dollar relief package passed by the slim Democratic majorities in the House and Senate on March 10 to fix the multiemployer pen-

sion system. And since it was a straight money bill that was adopted by Congress – there wasn't any compromise with reluctant Republican lawmakers.

Within that relief package Dems simply threw \$86 billion at the pension problem, and presto, fixed a system that has been – or would be – shortchanging pensioners who had counted on that money to fund their retirement, but were seeing reduced payouts or the prospect of reduced payouts through no fault

of their own.

Among the nation's labor unions, the Teamsters easily had the most number of failing pension plans and members losing promised benefits. But there are numerous other multiemployer union pension plans, including many individual plans among the building trades, that are relieved to finally get the federal relief.

"I couldn't be more pleased by the House's vote to pass this COVID relief package containing a pension fix after years of tire-

less work by members, retirees and union officials," said International Brotherhood of Teamsters President James Hoffa. "Members decided that pension reform should be the union's top priority heading into the 2020 election. They then worked hard to elect President Biden and other lawmakers who would get that done. Now we see the results of that effort. It's promises made, promises kept."

More room to stay and play readied for Firekeepers Hotel II

BATTLE CREEK – The "Tower II Development" at the Firekeepers Casino Hotel is currently hosting about 150 building trades workers, putting their skills to work to build an eight-story,

second hotel tower at the site.

When their work is complete, the Nottawaseppi Huron Band of the Potawatomi will have an additional 203 guest rooms, complementing the property's existing eight-story, 242-room hotel. Earlier this month, building trades

workers were toiling all over the building, with some floors more complete than others.

Clark Construction Co. is managing the project, which began with a groundbreaking in June 2019. "We're about 80 (Continued on Page 2)

Amazon's new union-busting tactic: 'resignation bonuses'

Amazon is taking part in a huge union-busting campaign to stop employees at the Bessemer, Ala. warehouse from voting for a union.

The historic vote is seen as key to unions establishing a foothold in the South, where a union hasn't won a major organizing

drive in decades. According to the *Payday Report*, workers throughout the plant received emails offering them bonuses if they quit. The email offers people who have worked two peak seasons \$2,000 to quit and \$3,000 if they worked three peak seasons. While this is not a new practice at Amazon,

they sometimes use this plan to lower staffing following a busy season like Christmas, the timing is suspect, especially since the company waited until eight weeks after the holiday season to offer the checks.

Off-season on Mackinac Island, electricians get to work

MACKINAC ISLAND – With a permanent population of 492 people, this 3.7-square-mile summertime tourist magnet in Lake Huron has been quiet and sequestered this past winter, as usual.

But for the first time in about three decades, a cadre of building trades union electricians have been on the job during the offseason on the island, putting their skills to work refurbishing and remodeling the Grand Hotel and Mission Pointe Resort.

Biden stresses his support for unions, PRO Act

In late February, President Joe Biden released an extraordinary statement in support of the right of American workers to form and join a union, in light of the ongoing unionization drive by Amazon warehouse workers in Bessemer, Ala.

As we pointed out in our last issue, labor historian Erik Loomis called Biden's remarks "arguably the most pro-union public statement by a president in support of unions in the entirety of American history."

On March 9, the president doubled down on his pledge to be "the most pro-union president" (Continued on Page 4)

A year later, COVID is still plaguing U.S. construction

The nation's construction industry would love to quit you, COVID-19.

But one year after the pandemic struck, U.S. construction firms are experiencing soaring materials costs, widespread supply-chain problems, and continuing project deferrals and cancellations, according to a survey released March 11 by the Association

of General Contractors of America.

The AGC released the results of the survey after collecting responses from 1,489 construction contractors across the nation from Feb. 19 to March 4.

"The survey results make it clear that the construction industry faces a variety of challenges that threaten to leave many firms and workers behind, even as some parts of the economy are recovering or even thriving," said Ken Simonson, the association's chief economist. "The pandemic has left the supply chain for a range of key construction components in tatters and undermined demand for a host of private-sector projects."

Simonson said that an overwhelming 93 percent of the survey's respondents report the pandemic has driven up their costs. Four out of five are spending more on personal protective equipment, sanitizers, and other health-related expenses. More than half say that projects are taking longer than before the pandemic.

Some other highlights from the survey:

•Costs and delayed deliveries of materials, parts, and supplies are vexing many contractors. Nearly 85 percent report those costs have increased over the past year. In addition, nearly three-fourths of the firms are currently experiencing project delays and disruptions, mainly due to shortages of materials. (Continued on Page 4)

Bravo, Rescue Plan

On March 10, without a single Republican vote, Congress passed a sweeping \$1.9 trillion relief and recovery package that will provide crucial support to millions of working families; dramatically reduce the race, gender, and income inequalities that were exacerbated by the crisis; and create the conditions for a truly robust recovery once the virus is under control and people are able to resume normal economic activity.

Crucially, the American Rescue Plan extends key pandemic unemployment insurance (UI) provisions, which are essential to aid those workers hardest hit by the crisis. These include Pandemic Unemployment Assistance, which provides benefits to many groups of workers who fall through the cracks of our regular UI system, like gig workers; Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation, which boosts weekly benefits by \$300; and Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation, which extends unemployment benefits by an additional 25 weeks.

The implementation of these provisions in this pandemic has been uneven, slow, and problematic due to our failure to invest in or modernize state UI offices over the last several decades. Nonetheless, these expansions to our UI system are crucial lifelines for tens of millions of U.S. families and have showed the promise of what UI should be in future recessions. The package also exempts the first \$10,200 in UI benefits received in 2020 from taxation, sparing tens of millions of families who relied on UI throughout the pandemic an unexpected large income tax bill.

Another enormously important aspect of the bill is the inclusion of \$350 billion in aid to state and local governments. This is a huge departure from mistakes made in the aftermath of the Great Recession, when the lack of sufficient aid to state and local governments led to spending cuts that delayed recovery by over four years. The package wisely includes prohibitions against states using this aid to cut taxes instead of making needed investments and providing crucial services.

The bill also temporarily expands the child tax credit to \$3,000 per child (\$3,600 per child under age 6). Crucially, the benefit would be fully refundable, meaning children's benefits will not be held hostage to their parents being able to find work. The benefit is phased out for higher earners, while families eligible for the full credit would get payments of \$250 per child (\$300 per child under 6) per month from July through the end of the year. This is a long-overdue investment in America's future. It will make an enormous dent in child poverty, and Congress and the White House should move quickly to make the credit permanent.

We are disappointed that the provisions to raise the minimum wage to \$15 by 2025 were stripped out. This is an enormous missed opportunity to help ensure not just a strong recovery, but also an equitable one. A \$15 minimum wage, phased in gradually by 2025, would increase the earnings of 32 million low-wage workers – a majority of whom are essential or front-line workers – by a total of \$108 billion dollars. It would lift up to 3.7 million people – including an estimated 1.3 million children – out of poverty, and disproportionately benefit women of all races, and Black and Hispanic men.

The bill has many other important provisions, including stimulus checks, rental and food assistance, money for vaccine distribution, an expansion of Affordable Care Act subsidies, money to reopen schools, and more. Some concerns have been raised that this package might be "too large," but those concerns are misplaced. This bill gets the economics right – it is at the scale that is needed. It is also likely to spread fiscal relief over time in a way that will support the recovery.

Crucially, however, some relief provisions in the current bill will need to be extended beyond their current, arbitrary end dates. The UI provisions, for example, are set to expire the first week of September, less than six months from today. Even in the best-case scenario, the unemployment rate will be elevated in September and expanded UI provisions will still be necessary.

The passage of the American Rescue Plan is a moment of great progress in U.S. economic policy. It is not perfect, but it is an enormous departure from the profound mistakes of prior downturns, when Congress's refusal to provide sufficient relief and recovery measures caused needless suffering for millions, exacerbated racial inequality, and delayed recoveries by years. To ensure fiscal support is sustained in the future, a second package of public investments, some financed by progressive revenue measures and including strong labor protections for workers, must be the next step.

Liking the Line 5 tunnel

Editor's note: the proposed Line 5 tunnel underneath the Straits of Mackinac would be a \$500 million project to move the existing Line 5 petroleum pipeline out of the water.

I'm concerned by the misinformation, exaggeration and just plain lies that have become commonplace in the Line 5 debate, and feel environmental movements – such as the one to shut down Line 5 – continue to ignore the voices of working men and women. That's where I fit in.

I'm a proud member of the Laborers' International Union of North America, or LIUNA. As union laborers, we work on the construction and maintenance of energy systems, including work on pipelines, nuclear power plants, solar farms, wind turbines, and other jobs critical to the energy industry.

Environmentalist opponents are waging guerrilla warfare on a project-by-project basis, killing jobs and opportunities, and creating division as they move toward extremism without solutions. Many are opposed to all natural gas extraction. They are opposed to increasing domestic oil production, to dams that harness energy from water and nuclear power.

Environmentalists are opposing wind farms because too many birds will be killed by the turbines. They oppose solar farms because their construction will cover some wildlife habitat. They don't care about rising energy costs, or how many jobs they kill. Currently, Michigan's renewable resources provide only 8 percent of its electricity net generation. That share will and should grow. But there is no scenario, no possibility in which renewable energy grows fast enough to replace oil and gas in the short term.

Given the massive investment and commitment LIUNA puts toward training, safety and renewable energy, it is insulting that many in the environmental movement have forgotten their purpose and have instead chosen to use high-profile energy projects such as the proposed tunnel project to agitate their base at the expense of workers' livelihoods. This is not a battle between those who want to protect the environment and those who want to create good green jobs.

My point is this: we can believe in protecting the planet and the people on it. We can be for good jobs, for green jobs and for taking care of workers. It's time to acknowledge the energy challenges we face. We need to build the infrastructure for renewable energy sources. We must expand domestic oil production and power our nation's economy with thousands of good union jobs. Michigan wins when we protect the Great Lakes. The Great Lakes Tunnel is a \$500 million modern infrastructure project that will safeguard our precious natural resources, including fish and wildlife, while permitting Line 5 to continue powering Michigan's economy by securing the jobs our families need. It's a vital Michigan asset over the long term, and it's going to be entirely paid for by Enbridge, the company that operates Line 5. In Michigan, we love our lakes, guard our paychecks, and work hard at our jobs. The proposed Great Lakes Tunnel protects all three.

percent complete," said Chad Webster, senior project manager for Clark. "With all the challenges we've had with COVID over the past year, we've done great, we're pleased with the progress."

Seven stories of hotel room space will sit above a ground level that will feature gaming, the build-out of replacement space for the property's signature Nibi restaurant, and a bar. Mechanical works are in the basement.

Located at I-94 at 11 Mile Rd., FireKeepers opened its first hotel space to the public on Dec. 12, 2012. The site also includes an indoor pool, exercise facility, a full-service restaurant and business center. A functional multi-purpose event center is capable of seating up to 2,000 guests as a concert venue, or it can accommodate banquets, corporate meetings, trade shows, and other events.

The new hotel tower will include 14 suites, plus the transformed hotel lobby area.

"We are proud to capitalize on our outstanding business performance in recent years and invest in a second hotel tower with many exciting complementary offerings," said Jamie Stuck, chairperson of the Nottawaseppi Huron Band of the Potawatomi, the owners of the Firekeepers property. "This expansion represents our continuing efforts to build a solid foundation for the next seven generations of tribal members."

Webster said they were fortunate that they ordered materials for the project in advance of the pandemic, so faults in that supply chain never caused any major issues. He said it was the same for the construction workforce.

"For the most part, we've had enough tradespeople when we have needed them," he said. "And they're doing fine, we're seeing top-notch work."

equipment or parts. Nine out of ten firms that are incurring such delays cite backlogs and shutdowns at domestic producers, such as factories, mills, and fabricators. Half of the firms also blame backlogs or shutdowns at foreign producers.

• More than three-fourths of the firms report having projects canceled or postponed in the past year, including more than one out of five with a 2021 project that has been canceled or postponed. Conversely, one-fifth of respondents say they have won new projects or add-ons to existing projects as a result of the pandemic, usually in medical-related construction.

• There is encouraging news from the survey. In a sign that the pandemic has had very different effects on construction firms, about one-third of firms say business matches or exceeds

year-ago levels, while another third say it will take more than six months to reach that mark, and one-fifth say they don't know. Respondents in the Northeast are the most pessimistic about the industry's outlook, followed by firms in the South. Firms from the Midwest are split along the same lines as the full survey, while respondents in the West are more optimistic, on balance.

• Despite these differences in experience to date and the near-term outlook, contractors from all regions, project types, and firm sizes are almost equally bullish about their hiring expectations over the next 12 months. Across nearly all subgroups, roughly three out of five respondents expect to add employees over the coming 12 months. Only 10 to 15 percent of firms in any category expect to reduce their headcount.


• While 69 percent of respondents say they have not achieved cost savings resulting from the pandemic, 31 percent have – from reduced office expenses, travel and equipment usage.

Nearly half (46 percent) of firms reported that they had seen no change in employee head count from a year ago, while another 20 percent said they added workers. Just over one third said they had a reduced head count from a year ago.

• Those employers who did reduce their employee base over the past year said the reason was because projects have been postponed or canceled (65 percent) or there were fewer projects to bid on (45 percent). Another 37 percent said some employees have quit or refused to work because of illness, exposure concerns or family responsibilities.

You and your health . . .

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YOU MAY BE ASKING,

"should I take a COVID-19 vaccination?" As of April 5th, anyone age 16 and above is eligible for the shot. The personal health stakes are too high to not be informed, so let's examine facts.

More than 355 million doses of COVID-19 vaccines have gone into American arms as of mid-March. Early on, the city of Detroit became a national model for getting efficient and safe vaccination sites up and running.

Reports of temporary, mild side effects such as soreness at the injection site and fatigue are fairly common, though not a cause for concern. In fact these reactions signal that the vaccine is kicking the immune system into gear. No reported side effects have been permanent, and severe side effects, such as allergic reactions, have been extremely rare.

Oh, and there's no needle big enough to inject a microchip – that's pure science fiction.

What's going on?

But there are a number of other claims circulating about the vaccines' safety. Some of the more far out claims – such as the vaccine injecting you with a microchip; causing infertility; or changing your DNA – are best answered by explaining how the vaccines really work.

The vaccines available at this time – Pfizer, Moderna, and Johnson & Johnson (J&J) contain different ingredients, but they essentially do the same job. When the vaccine is shot into your arm, picture it delivering a recipe to the cells in your body.

The cells use this recipe to produce their own spike proteins – those protruding crowns sticking out of a coronavirus. These spikes are harmless because they aren't an actual, whole coronavirus. What they do is trigger the body's defense system to produce antibodies, which will be ready and able to kill the real coronavirus should your body encounter it.

The COVID-19 Vaccines: what they are and what they are not

The vaccine can't change DNA or impact other body systems such as fertility, because the vaccine's "recipe" is targeted to one thing only: get the body producing anti-bodies against the coronavirus.

Cut through the noise, and you'll find the vaccines are safe. Doing your part by getting it shows that you care about yourself and those around you. That sounds similar to a core principle of the labor movement – solidarity.

Rushed or researched?

The lighting speed with which the COVID-19 vaccines came to market created suspicions that safety corners were cut. But a closer look at the process reveals no shortcuts. Vaccine research began with other disease outbreaks, such as SARS, MERS and Zika, that occurred long before COVID-19. Once a vaccine specific to COVID-19 was developed, its effectiveness was based on data gathered from large clinical trials.

J&J - one effective shot

The Johnson & Johnson (J&J) vaccine requires just one shot, making it easier and quicker to get large numbers of people protected. But there's been criticism of the J&J shot because it is slightly less effective in preventing COVID-19 than the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines.

The data that really count, how-

ever, show that all three vaccines are 100% effective at preventing the worst outcomes of COVID-19. No one died of COVID-19 and no one became sick enough to require hospitalization among the trial participants receiving any of the vaccines.

An objection to the J&J vaccine has arisen among some U.S. Catholic bishops who claim the J&J vaccine is "morally compromised" because it is produced with cell lines derived from generations-old fetal tissue.

But the Vatican has clearly stated that the vaccines can protect against the "grave danger" of COVID-19 and taken in good conscience as part of the moral "duty to protect one's own health [as well as] the duty to pursue the common good."

Better off with it, definitely

If you're thinking of chancing you'll survive COVID-19 rather than take the vaccine, think again. The percentage of COVID deaths seems small, but it translates to a large real number – 535,000 lives lost as of mid-March. This is a tragedy of major proportions, and so too are the long-term effects of COVID-19 on its survivors. Brain fog, breathing problems, and joint pain are commonly reported, even among COVID-19 survivors who were never hospitalized.

More seriously, nearly a quarter of those hospitalized with COVID-19 developed cardiac complications, a contributing factor in about 40 percent of COVID-19-related deaths.

Most recently, as variants of the virus threaten to create new surges, our best hope is to stay ahead of the spread. Vaccines offer a safe and reliable way out of the chaos COVID-19 has created in our lives and society at large.

The Detroit Free Press building

HISTORY IN THE MAKING

DETROIT FREE PRESS building architect Albert Kahn incorporated windows, and lots of them, to help eliminate extraneous for newspaper workers. Completed in 1925 and shown here shortly afterward, the Detroit building has a unique 14-story center tower over a six-story base.

Following a \$110 million union-built renovation that wrapped up late last year, the building's restored features include terrazzo floors and original cast-iron framing surrounding the elevators, and new studio-size- to three-bedroom apartments. The "new" building will also have a seventh-floor rooftop pool and sundeck. Below ground is a fully automated parking deck.

Most daily newspapers around the world are a feeble, degraded version of the once-powerful position they held in society. Their demise began long before the rise of the internet, with profits and circulation falling across the nation beginning in the 1980s.

It wasn't always this way, of course. For a while in the 1960s, the *Detroit Free Press* actually published two editions a day. In 1978, the Sunday *Free Press* had a circulation of 820,139, and at the time it entered into a Joint Operating Agreement with *The Detroit News* in 1989, the combined papers offered the nation's fourth largest Sunday paper.

Anyone with a computer or smart phone knows what happened next. The traditional news industry that put ink on paper entered into an ongoing death spiral, with papers lucky enough to stay in business moving their platforms online, as they maybe continue with a print edition.

Just as hard copies of their papers were mostly no longer wanted, so it was with both of the historic, separate headquarters of both *The Detroit News* and *Free Press*, which sat down the street from each other on Lafayette Avenue in Detroit. Luckily, both buildings have been gloriously restored and repurposed by Bedrock Real Estate.

The former *Free Press* building's renovation was completed last year. "For more than seven decades, 321 W. Lafayette Blvd. housed one of the most iconic, widely distributed newspapers in the country," Bedrock said. "The *Detroit Free Press* occupied the 14-story, 302,000-square-foot building until it moved out in 1998. The Albert Kahn building, completed in 1925, has been renovated for mixed use, with ground-level retail spaces and office spaces on the second and third levels. Above the office and retail spaces are more than 100 residential units."

The *Detroit Free Press* was founded in 1831, six years before Michigan became a state. According to *Historic Detroit's* Dan Austin, the paper has had no less than 15 homes since it was established, with No. 13 being the most impressive, on Lafayette between Washington and Cass avenues.

Construction began in 1924 and was completed in 1925. The building was designed by Albert Kahn, who was somewhat more noted for his industrial plant designs, but who also designed numerous office buildings. But the *Free Press* building certainly had some industrial elements, with foundations in place to hold steady the building's presses.

Carrying through with Kahn's design was general contractor Crowell and Little Construction Co. of Cleveland. The building's foundations, installed by contractor Spencer, White and Prentice, consisted of 73 "shallow caissons belled out in firm clay," said a July 1924 article in *Contractors and Engineers Monthly*. "The work also involved the installation of foundations for a large number of presses and other special machinery."

The six-story building, with a 14-story tower, was commissioned by *Free Press* owner E.D. Stair and cost \$6 million (about \$90 million in today's dollars).

Encased in limestone, the building included carvings by New York sculptor Ulysses Ricci, including two imposing statues of the goddesses of Commerce and Communication who guard the front doors. "An arch with owls, snakes and, oddly, pelicans and seahorses is above

them," Austin wrote.

Ricci also carved eight reliefs, an eclectic and incongruous group of bedfellows: Benjamin Franklin, for his work with the printing press; Governor and Sen. Lewis Cass; Gov. Austin Blair; Monroe, Mich., native Gen. George Custer; former University of Michigan President James Angell; and journalists Horace Greeley, Charles Dana and George Goodale. There also are sculptures of transportation: a plane, a ship, a train and a truck – but no cars... in Michigan.

"The paper moved into this building because it had outgrown its old location at 131 W. Lafayette, the now-demolished Transportation Building," Austin wrote. "Everything that went into creating the paper was carried out under its roof, from the mailers being stuffed into papers to ads being sold to the gigantic printing presses that were housed in the building's basement. The presses rumbled under its walls until new ones were installed in a building on the Detroit waterfront in 1979."

Free Press owner Stair had Kahn design it with extra floors, including the signature, striking tower eight stories above the base, so he could act as a landlord and make money leasing office space to other businesses. The building also housed at one point a flower shop and restaurant. But producing and printing newspapers was always the building's bread and butter.

"This impressive piece of urban architecture holds a commanding place at the foot of Washington Boulevard," wrote Eric Hill and John Gallagher in their *American Institute of Architects - Detroit* guide to the city's architecture. "Unlike his earlier *Detroit News* building, Kahn's *Free Press* building used a steel frame for a more efficiently constructed 14-story tower for commercial tenants. The then-fashionable stepped

massing of the central tower and flanking six-story wings were finished in limestone to create an appropriate monumental feel."

By 1998, low profit margins and reduced staffing made it increasingly difficult to justify the use of such a large building, which by that time was also in need of a great deal of maintenance. Like so many downtown Detroit buildings, it sat empty for two decades until billionaire developer Dan Gilbert's Bedrock company bought it in 2016 and renovated it, completing work on the former *Free Press* building last year.

Bedrock renamed it "The Press/321," and the building includes 105 residential units as well as office, restaurant and retail space. Bedrock's overall investment was around \$110 million.

The ground floor is dedicated to retail, with the second and third housing offices. The fourth through 14th floors are residential, with apartments ranging from studio to three-bedroom apartments and rents starting at \$995 a month.

The former *Detroit Free Press* building doesn't exactly tower over nearby structures," said Deturbex, "but still retains a certain dignity that more modern buildings had lost. The *Free Press* Building is a monument to the roaring 20's. From the arch over the entrance to vaulted ceilings inside, the building is chock full of intricate, detailed stonework. The center tower is flanked on both sides by six-story wings, each with a light well offering daylight to most corners of the building."

Said Gilbert said upon the building's reopening: "We own a lot of buildings downtown, but to have something that's been sitting vacant since 1998 that was such a notable building downtown and bring it back to something of this level and the fact of the mixed-used component, makes it really unique."

Dems in Congress eased pension problem with needed fix: they threw money at it

"Butch Lewis Act," which Congress had been using as a negotiating point in solving the pension crisis, was incorporated into the overall American Rescue Plan. The Teamsters said more than 50 of its pension plans – including its largest, the quickly failing Central States Pension Fund that covers about 400,000 pensioners – will be eligible for assistance at the outset of the bill's enactment, with more of the union's plans becoming eligible in 2022.

Under the measure, money to assist eligible plans would come directly from the U.S. Treasury Department in the form of grants which would not need to be repaid. Plan participants would receive 100 percent of their earned pension benefits.

Although there are 1,400 U.S. multiemployer pension plans that are financially healthy, roughly 180 other struggling multiemployer funds covering a variety of industries were in danger of defaulting on pension promises. Plans fail for a variety of reasons: declining union membership and declining hours contributed to the plans; contributing employers going out of business; demographics, with the retirement onslaught of Baby Boomers; and ill-timed investment losses, especially during the Great Recession a decade ago, are the major reasons. The Pension Benefit Guaranty Corp. (PBGC) which is supposed to backstop failing pension plans, was itself slated to run out of money in a few years.

"The American Rescue Plan is historic legislation that provides direct financial relief to millions of struggling working families, funds state and municipal authorities so they can continue to provide critical public services and expands vaccination efforts across the nation," said IBEW General President Lonnie Stephenson. "I thank members of the U.S. Senate for their support of this crucial bill. Congress kicked this problem down the road for years, increasing the difficulty and the cost of solving it and putting millions of retirees at risk through no fault of their own. I am proud that President Biden made this one of his first priorities."

Said Laborers International Union General President Terry O'Sullivan: "The multiemployer pension relief provisions in the bill come at a time when some funds are on the brink of insolvency and will fail without financial assistance. The plight of these funds has been worsened by the COVID-19 pandemic and the resulting economic devastation. Provisions in this relief bill will provide necessary federal assistance and ensure that millions of retirees – including thousands of LIUNA retirees – and beneficiaries will still receive their full pensions and be able to retire in dignity after a lifetime of hard work."

The \$86 billion that will refund the pensions – an improvement from the \$65 billion offered in the Butch Lewis Act – is only part of the bill. Pension insurance premiums will also be raised to help ensure the PBGC does not become insolvent.

"This does allow a narrow subset of troubled plans to avoid having to make the painful move of reducing benefits for already retired participants," said David Brenner, national director of multiemployer consulting at Segal Consulting. "It also provides the option for plans that have made that move to possibly reverse that decision."

Pension experts say the new law is very much a case of throwing money at a problem, but doesn't provide much plan guidance for the future. But that's going to be OK with pensioners who agreed to have a portion of their life savings contribute to a pension plan – and then had their retirements upended by reduced payments.

"The legislation provides extensive assistance to pension plans that were suffering long before the COVID-19 pandemic and ensures that many retirees will receive their full benefits," said Bradley Kafka, a labor lawyer writing for the National Law Review. "However, it does not freeze accruals, curtail the practices that led to the pension plans' current underfunding problems, or otherwise provide guidance as to how the plans will function financially in 30 years when the special financial assistance ends."

Frank Johnson, writing for the labor law firm Miller Johnson, said the law "provides for direct payments to be made by the U.S. Treasury to restore all benefits, including previously implemented benefit cuts, for the plans in the worst financial shape. As a result, retirees who participate in funds like the Central States Pension Fund have gone from wondering how they were going to survive on pensions that were scheduled to be reduced to as little as \$12,000 per year to knowing that they will now receive their full pensions, which in some cases are \$50,000 per year or more."

Biden stresses support for unions, PRO Act

"you've ever seen," by urging Congress to support the Protect the Right to Organize (PRO) Act, which would grease the skids for union organizing in a manner not seen since the passage of the National Labor Relations Act in the 1930s.

Following are Biden's comments:

"I strongly encourage the House to pass the Protecting the Right to Organize (PRO) Act of 2021, which would dramatically enhance the power of workers to organize and collectively bargain for better wages, benefits, and working conditions."

"As America works to recover from the devastating challenges of deadly pandemic, an economic crisis, and reckoning on race that reveals deep disparities, we need to summon a new wave of worker power to create an economy that works for everyone. We owe it not only to those who have put in a lifetime of work, but to the next generation of workers who have only known an America of rising inequality and shrinking opportunity. All of us deserve to enjoy America's promise in full – and our nation's leaders have a responsibility to deliver it."

"That starts with rebuilding unions. The middle class built this country, and unions built the middle class. Unions give workers a stronger voice to increase wages, improve the quality of jobs and protect job security, protect against racial and all other forms of discrimination and sexual harassment, and protect workers' health, safety, and benefits in the workplace. Unions lift up workers, both union and non-union. They are critical to strengthening our economic competitiveness."

"But, after generations of sweat and sacrifice, fighting hard to earn the wages and benefits that built and sustained the American middle class, unions are under siege. Nearly 60 million Americans would join a union if they get a chance, but too many employers and states prevent them from doing so through anti-union attacks. They know that without unions, they can run the table on workers – union and non-union alike."

"We should all remember that the National Labor Relations Act didn't just say that we shouldn't hamstring unions or merely tolerate them. It said that we should encourage unions. The PRO Act would take critical steps to help restore this intent."

"I urge Congress to send the PRO Act to my desk so we can seize the opportunity to build a future that reflects working people's courage and ambition, and offers not only good jobs with a real choice to join a union – but the dignity, equity, shared prosperity and common purpose the hardworking people who built this country and make it run deserve."

before House debate began. But he didn't say how workers and their allies would accomplish that goal, other than to imply PRO Act political foes would face trouble at the polls, and would change their minds now.

Trumka warned: "In an era of extreme polarization, nearly two-thirds of Americans – 65 percent – approve of labor unions, so it's not surprising workers would form unions if they were given the chance. That's 60 million people knocking on our doors. The PRO Act would let them in."

The Pro Act would also undo a big right-wing win in the Supreme Court, the *Janus* decision several years ago that made every state and local government worker in the U.S. a potential "free rider," able to use union services and protections without paying one cent for them. Similarly, the Pro Act would supersede and toss out statewide right-to-work laws, like Michigan's.

The Pro Act would also outlaw closed-door anti-union management harangue meetings and make it easier to organize and win elections. It would increase employer fines to \$50,000 per labor law-breaking offense, and \$100,000 for repeat offenders.

The legislation would also mandate first-contract arbitration if the two sides can't agree and legalize simplified, union-friendly, card-check recognition during organizing drives, among other pro-worker measures. And among many other provisions, it would force union-busters to disclose their activities, clients, and how much they got paid.

"We are engaged in a great act of patriotism for our country," House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., said during the later debate. "The middle class is the core of our democracy and the middle class has a union label on it."

House speeches fell along predictable lines. Democrats laid out the economic and moral case to restore labor law to its National Labor Relations Act roots, as Rep. Andy Levin, D-Mich., a longtime union organizer and former AFL-CIO Deputy Organizing Director, put it. "What we're talking about is whether workers are free to come together and form a union," Levin said. "Let's get back to the basic concept that they're free to do so – and not have the person who has the most power in the world over them, their boss, interfere."

Republicans raised old anti-worker canards, preaching about "union bosses," and "thugs," "radical legislation" and calling it socialist. Unions "make companies less efficient and less competitive," Rep. Robert Good, R-Va., charged, without offering evidence.

Said Rep. Mark Pocan (D-Wis.), a union painter: "As a small business owner and union member for 30 years, I know how important it is that every worker has a union. Giving workers a voice in their workplace and negotiating for good family-supporting wages and worker safety is crucial to a family's ability to thrive."

Goals in sight, AFL-CIO joins campaign to formally end the filibuster

WASHINGTON (PAI)—Faced with the prospect that a Republican Senate filibuster could kill the best chance in decades to rewrite labor law in favor of workers, the AFL-CIO formally joined a growing coalition of groups campaigning to end that legislative tactic.

With the tactic, a 60-vote supermajority is needed to pass legislation in the Senate.

In a March 11 statement, "Senate rules cannot be used to block a Workers First Agenda," the labor federation's Executive Council said its agenda "is too big and too important to fit through the loophole" in Senate rules. The rules did let the slim Senate Democratic majority pass Democratic President Joe Biden's \$1.9 trillion economic stimulus bill, which Biden signed on March 10, because it dealt with taxes and spending. The 50-49 vote was on party lines.

But the filibuster ban didn't let through an increase in the federal minimum wage, which would need 60 votes – in a 50-50 Senate – to win. So would the Protect The Right To Organize (Pro) Act, labor's No. 1 legislative priority, and the centerpiece of its agenda.

"The Workers First Agenda – investment, democracy and economic justice – is the agenda Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris ran on. It is the agenda working people fought for. It is the agenda our nation voted for. It...cannot be delayed or denied."







If you are filing for Social Security Disability you will need to file for your Local 98 Disability Pension at the same time in order to make sure you get all of your pension checks. Social Security normally takes at least a year and sometimes a lot longer. If you file for your Local 98 Disability Pension at the same time, when you receive your award from Social Security, we will be able to pay you all the retro money owed. If you are less than a year from retirement, we suggest you set up a meeting with Jon DeRoo prior to your retirement date.

DUES PAYMENTS: YOUR DUES PAYMENTS ARE DUE PRIOR TO THE FIRST OF THE MONTH. The books will close at the end of the business day on the last day of the month. Payments made on the 1st of the month are considered late for that month. There will be no exception, once the books are closed it cannot be undone. Members will receive a text message dues reminder prior to the end of the month. READY TO WORK: SMANCA Detroit and Local 80 are in progress of developing a mobile smart app which will allow access to the Ready to Work program from your smart phone. The app is in development for both Apple and Android systems; once it is completed (est. early November) an announcement will be emailed, hard mailed and shared with you at your union meetings as well as published in the Bldg. Trades newspaper.

In compliment, for the 2020 Ready to Work stipend requirement you will only need to download the app on your smart phone, review and confirm your contact information (email, mailing address, employer, list of your accomplished training).

When you download the app and review your contact information, the program will inform SMANCA Detroit of your interaction and this part of the stipend requirement will be completed. There will be no custom Ready to Work modules required for the 2020 stipend.

In the meanwhile of receiving notice the Ready to Work app is available, it is important to make sure you have all other stipend requirements completed, these are still the same: • Current MUST Drug Test • Current MUST 18 Safety Modules • OSHA 30 • Current FACPR certification. Deadline for stipend requirements is March 31, 2021.

For members who do not have a smart phone, contact Support 248-649-5450 and accommodations will be made for you.

BENEFICIARY REMINDER: Please remember to designate or update your beneficiary choice on all of your Local 80 and international benefits. The law requires that in the event of an untimely death your benefits go to your spouse first and if there is no spouse to your children UNLESS you designate otherwise in writing with each specific benefit. Depending on your classification you could have benefits due to your heirs from Local 80 pension, insurance, annuity and from international and SASMI. Each individual benefit needs to have a designated beneficiary unless you want it to go to your spouse or children. As always seek the advice of an attorney.

ADDRESS CHANGES: If you have a new address please make sure to let the hall know. We will take care of your account with the union hall which includes the tradesman paper. You will need to call Benesys at 800-400-7710 and update your address with them as well, that is not done through the hall.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH and DISMEMBERMENT INSURANCE FROM OUR INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION: Members who have their dues paid in advance (prior to the month of the accident) are eligible for accidental death and dismemberment benefits up to \$7,500. This benefit comes as a dues paying member of SMART International.

WEEKEND WORK ASSIGNMENTS: Saturday and Sunday work assignments. Please remember that when performing work on a Saturday or Sunday the steward must report it to the hall, give each members name and obtain a form for signatures. Each member must sign the form along with the number of hours they worked. The completed form must be sent back to the hall by the end of the day on the following Monday. Weekend work assignments must be called or emailed into the hall **prior to 3:00 pm on Friday.**

WORK ASSIGNMENTS: Everyone must obtain a work assignment prior to starting work. If you fail to do so you could be written up on charges.

LAY-OFFS: All members must report to the Union Hall immediately upon lay-off, even if you only work one day. These are the By-Law rules for the Out-of-Work List. Your name will be removed from the list 14 days after receiving an assignment. It is very important to report to the union hall immediately after your layoff. Members get confused because the S.U.B. Fund allows you a period of up to seven days to apply for S.U.B. benefits after lay-off.

LAY-OFF SLIPS/TERMINATION NOTICES: Lay off slips must accompany all applications for sub pay. Without lay off slips you cannot collect sub pay. It is the member's responsibility to make sure they get one from the contractor when laid off. Your application cannot be submitted without one. It is the contractor's responsibility to issue one in accordance with our contract.

S.U.B. BENEFITS: Report to the hall promptly upon layoff. You must complete a S.U.B. Application within seven (7) days from your layoff date or you will forfeit S.U.B. benefits. Lay-off slips must accompany the application to be eligible. Proof of UIA benefit payments must be submitted within 21 days of when you were paid in order to receive S.U.B. benefits. Do not submit your sub applications directly to the fund office. Your application must be signed by the hall or you will not collect benefits.

OUT-OF-WORK LIST: You must be on the out-of-work list to collect S.U.B. benefits or SASMI. Members must re-register bi-annually: March 1-20 and Sept. 1-20 If you fail to re-register you will be removed from the list.

SHORT WORK WEEK SUB PAY: If you work 16 hours or less in a week or have a short work week due to weather you may collect sub for that week but only if it is at the **beginning or the end of a layoff.** You may NOT collect if you are not laid off. You must complete a sub application at the hall, provide a pay stub for that week and the hall will submit it to the fund office. If you are not laid off and it is due to weather the company MUST provide written documentation that it was weather related.

Fishing Michigan? Explore your options

In Michigan, we are lucky to have 11,000 inland lakes to enjoy. Whether we fish, swim or boat – we have plenty of options.

With that being said, we can easily slip into our familiar routines and keep to the lakes we know – going to the same lake, at the same spot and using the same gear.

This is very tempting, and admittedly I often do that. With the everyday demands of life – working full time, managing a household and balancing my family's activities – squeezing in a quick afternoon of ice fishing often can be done only at my usual lakes.

Venturing out to new places can feel like a gamble.

I often read on ice-fishing social media groups, "I live in Houghton in Houghton County, is it worth the three-hour drive to the Bays de Noc in Delta County?" Of course, the answer

is "yes!" But to go all that way and not catch fish can be disheartening and discourage the angler the next time they want to branch out to new ice-fishing spots.

To fish a new lake, there are a few options an angler can try.

The first approach is to reach out to friends who live out of town and meet them at their favorite lake. There are multiple benefits to this approach.

Putting this idea to work, obviously, you get to visit friends you may not have seen in a while. Additionally, they will know the lake already – where the deep spots are, where the structure is and places on the lake to avoid (e.g. inlets and outlets where the ice may be thinner). Maybe they know which bait works best (wigglers versus waxworms).

My husband and I have good friends who live in Alger County, and we recently went to Au Train Lake. I ended up catching a nice 25-inch northern pike off a tip-up and numerous yellow

perch (on the small side but still fun to catch).

The second approach to finding new hard water to test is to see if there is a guiding service available for hire. This works very well if you are planning a big trip on a lake you've always wanted to fish, or if you have a short amount of time to explore the body of water. It's the guide's job to know the lake and to provide you with a great fishing experience.

My husband and I recently did this on Lake Gogebic in Ontonagon and Gogebic counties. I've long wanted to ice fish for the infamous "jumbo perch" on Lake Gogebic, but we were limited on the amount of time we had to go over there to fish.

The guide we hired knew exactly where to go, and which bait and techniques to use. We had such a good time, caught the jumbo perch we wanted, and I would certainly go back there.

The third approach is to venture out on your own. This has

the most prep work involved but can pay off in dividends in the end. Here are some tips that can increase your chance of a successful angling trip on a new waterbody.

If you don't have a specific lake in mind, first think about how far you are willing to drive and which types of fish you want to target. The answers to those two questions should narrow your choices to a more manageable level.

There are many ways to get information on a specific lake:

- The Michigan Department of Natural Resources fish stocking database (Google: "Michigan fish stocking database") includes information on fish the DNR has stocked dating back to 1979. Anglers can search by county, waterbody and species.

- The DNR weekly fishing report (Google: Michigan DNR weekly fishing report) provides fishing conditions for numerous bodies of water across the state.

- Inland lake maps that provide depth contours and habitat characteristics are an essential component in learning about a lake. The DNR makes many lake maps available to the public.

- Contact your local DNR fisheries biologists and ask them for lakes to target and winter access.

- Contact local bait shops. They can provide valuable information on area lakes.

- Online forums and social media groups are often a bit secretive about providing details on good fishing locations, but they can be really good sources to ask about current local ice conditions.

- Once you pick the lake, make sure to have a plan for the day. Tell someone where you are going and when you expect to be back home. It's always recommended to bring another fishing partner with you, especially when going to a new lake.

- Safety should always be the number one priority, so bring along a rope and ice picks in case you or someone in your party falls through the ice. Having a winter

emergency pack that includes a change of warm, dry clothes is important too. Find more safety tips at Michigan.gov/IceSafety.

Make sure all your gear is in working condition. The last thing you want is for your auger to not run once you get to the lake. I also bring multiple tip-ups and fishing poles. Prepare for worst-case scenarios with your gear. With use over time, something will eventually break, and it's usually not in the comfort of your home when it does.

Before heading to the lake, be sure to stop at the local bait shop you called earlier for any supplies or bait you may need. Even on the lake you always go to, try a new location, bait or time of day.


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
