Union picks placed on workforce panel

LANSING-Gov. Gretchen Whitmer on May 29 signed an executive order creating the Michigan Workforce Development Board - with some welcome construction labor union representation.

"Here in Michigan, the birthplace of the middle class, we must all work together to ensure paths to opportunity for everyone. This board will be vital in continuing our efforts to grow both our workforce and our economy," said Whitmer. "This group of leaders will be instrumental in bringing together efforts and partners from key industries to expand our workforce, economy and educational attainment efforts."

Included on the list of 20: Michigan Building and Construction Trades Council President Steve Claywell, Operating Engineers Local 324 Labor Management Education Committee Executive Director Lee Graham, and Upper Peninsula Construction Council Executive Director Tony Retaskie (member of IBEW Local 906).

They are joined with a group of religious, academic, government and business leaders for terms up to four years including Detroit Mayor Mike Duggan, Consumers Energy CEO Patti Poppe, and Central Michigan University President Robert Davies. A federal law requires the governor to abolish previous, similar panels and establish a new state workforce development board.

"Preparing the state's workforce for jobs of the future and making sure that Michigan wins on talent will be incredibly important as we work to recover from the COVID-19 pandemic We look forward to working with these key industry, labor and community leaders, utilizing their diverse perspectives as we build a stronger Michigan together," said Jeff Donofrio, director of the state Department of Labor and Economic Opportunity.

Whitmer taps IBEW's **Egan for COVID post**

The project, which began in January, is expected to employ about 90 tradespeople this year during the course of the project. 'Sobering' construction downturn does a number on the industry By Marty Mylcahy Jobless, spending

U.S. construction spending and employment numbers in Michigan and the rest of the nation are going to improve. They have to, eventually. But the nearterm employment and spending statistics are brutal.

Never in the nation's history has the construction industry seen a six week stretch where 81 percent of activity in the building trades simply stopped, as it did in Michigan, with total construction hours worked between March 1 and May 4 dropping 69 percent.

Michigan's construction industry has been one of the hardest-hit by the COVID-19 crisis, but we're not alone in our misery. Some newer employment and spending numbers in the U.S. construction industry have been released, and they tell a tale of woe across the nation.

U.S. construction spending plunged 2.9 percent in April to \$1.35 trillion, according to Census Bureau figures released June 1, as governmental agencies and project owners shut down ongoing work and canceled projects that were about to break ground, according to an analysis by the Associated General Contractors of America.

AGC officials warned that further steep declines are "inevitable" for public projects unless the federal government acts quickly to invest in needed infrastructure and shore up crumbling state and local budgets.

"Bad though these numbers are, construction spending appears sure to shrink further," said Ken Simonson, the association's chief economist. "In our latest survey, 40 percent of contractors report that an upcoming project has been canceled. But this is a great time to undertake needed infrastructure projects, with more availability of labor, lower materials costs and recordlow borrowing costs for many public agencies."

The AGC report said that 10 out of 12 public and 10 out of 11

and CEO Patrick L. Anderson last month. "States are quickly becoming one of the largest sources of household income in the country. The scale and magnitude of these benefits is changing the way Americans view work during this coronavirus depression."

AEG estimates show that some states are now pumping nearly \$1 billion in weekly payments into their economies through their unemployment insurance programs - "a staggering total that dwarfs the weekly payrolls of many private sector businesses," AEG said. These benefits include a state payment, as well as a \$600 weekly federal supplement under the federal CARES act.

That \$600 jobless worker supplement, adopted in Congress as part of the first worker relief package after the coronavirus closures devastated the economy, is said to be a major holdup among Republicans in Congress to passing a second stimulus package. They see it as a disincentive for laid-off workers to go back to their jobs, with some earning more to stay at home than to go back to work. That supplement expires next month.

"There's broad agreement within the Senate GOP conference that the \$600-a-week federal enhancement of state unemployment benefits – a core element of the \$2.2. trillion CARES Act – is too generous and provides a disincentive (Continued on Page 3)

"But the current COVID-19 pandemic is unlike anything the industry has experienced in generations. There was no warning, and rather than a tapering off of markets from economic troubles or even natural or man-made difast, leaving a heretofore healthy industry in chaos."

The contractor list is typically fairly consistent from year to year, but next year's roster will have revenue numbers that will include the full impact of the COVID-19 crisis on revenues, and it's likely to be a bit scrambled.

OSHA won't act for workers

On May 18, the AFL-CIO filed a petition for a writ of mandamus in the U.S. Court of Appeals to compel the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) to issue an emergency temporary standard (ETS) protecting U.S. workers against the

The petition demonstrates that thousands of workers have been infected on the job through exposure to infected patients, co-workers and unscreened members of the public. As the economy reopens and people return to work, person-to-person contact will increase and health experts predict the already shocking number of infections and deaths among workers will rise.

"It's truly a sad day in America when working people must sue the organization tasked with protecting our health and safety,' said AFL-CIO President Richard Trumka. "But we've been left no choice. Millions are infected and more than 100,000 have died, so it's beyond urgent that action is taken to protect workers who risk our lives daily to respond to this public health emergency. If the Trump administration refuses to act, we must compel them to."

Even with overwhelming evidence that additional protection is needed, Secretary of Labor Eugene Scalia has been unwilling to fulfill the duties Congress entrusted him with. In response to a letter from Trumka demanding OSHA action, Scalia stated on April 30 that a mandatory standard specifically addressing the grave risk posed by the virus was not necessary.

'OSHA was intended to be that vehicle to protect workers, yet it is not. The dozens of OSHA complaints across the country we have filed have been met by silence as the Trump administration refuses to do its job to enforce a safe workplace standard,' said American Federation of Teachers President Randi Weingarten "And this has had a huge effect: Our members are getting sick and dying – we have lost more than 160 members including public employees, health care workers and educators to COVID-19, many of which could have been prevented if they had been provided the proper protections. Health care and other essential workers can't simply rely on their union buying them PPE, as we have done, or the gratitude of strangers. This action is needed to get the Trump administration to do its job."

Corporate raider rigs the rules

Monty Bennett was just another faceless right-wing millionaire on the long list of high-dollar donors to Donald Trump -

until he suddenly surfaced in April nation's biggest bagger of government cash in the emer-

gency Paycheck Protection Program.

Bennett got \$76 million from this fund meant to help small businesses keep people employed in today's pandemic shutdown of the economy. But there's nothing mom-and-popish about Monty's business.

Operating through a maze of tightly interwoven financial trusts and corporate subsidiaries, Bennett runs a sprawling, Dallasbased conglomerate named Ashford Inc. that owns and operates 130 hotels and luxury re-

sorts all across the country, including the Marriott Beverly Hills and the Ritz-Carlton in the Virgin Islands

How does a multibillion-dollar empire get such payments while legitimate small businesses are shut out? The old-fashioned way: By paying lobbyists and lawmakers to rig the rules to let corporate thieves raid the treasury.

A major donor to Trump and GOP congress critters, Bennett pressured them to punch a special interest loophole in the program, decreeing that while a big business cannot apply for payments, each "unit" of a big business can.

So... gotcha! In early April, before most of America's Main Street enterprises even knew relief was available, Ashford's squad of manipu-

In addition to stiffing small businesses, Bennett balked at the requirement that the bulk of taxpayer dollars be used to maintain the paychecks of Ashford's hotel employees. Instead, he loudly insisted that government aid should be available to bolster corporate owners - i.e., him.



But the city has another major claim to fame - in the person of Ransom E. Olds – who put a singular mark on the city's landscape by developing not one, but two major factory sites. And in so doing he helped create a pathway to the middle class for tens of thousands of mid-Michigan workers during the course of the 20th Century who worked in the factories he founded. He was also no small player in the state's rich automotive history.

It's "notable," writes Ben Wojdyla of *Jalopnik*, "that Henry Ford, genius of mass production and ardent anti-Semitic founder of Ford Motor Co., didn't actually invent the assembly line, despite often being credited as such. The honor for this innovation instead rests on one of the giants of the era, Ransom Eli Olds.

'Ransom is one of the forgotten masters of the early century, the man most credited with bringing mass-production to Detroit and largely establishing the auto industry. The Oldsmobile Curved Dash was, for a time during the nineteen-ought's, the best-selling car in America and is considered the first mass-produced vehicle in history."

Born in Geneva, Ohio, Olds grew up the son of a blacksmith, and he began tinkering with gasoline engines in the 1890s after moving to Lansing. In 1895 Ransom and his father opened the Olds Gasoline Engine Works where they experimented, and by 1896 had built their first gasoline-powered automobile.

'The spark of auto innovation ignited here in the 1890's," says the Greater Lansing Michigan Convention & Visitors Bureau. "P.F. Olds founded a prosperous machine shop here on River Street, repairing and building steam and gasoline engines. His was one of many Lansing manufacturing plants that produced small engines, carriages, windmills and other equipment used by farmers and businesses. His son, Ransom, had bigger ideas. He put engines in carriages, creating his first successful 'horseless carriage' in 1896. A year later, the Olds Motor Vehicle Co. became Michigan's first operating automobile company."

Ransom E. Olds started the Olds Motor Vehicle Co. in 1897, starting with the assembly of four cars. The company was purchased by a copper and lumber magnate, Samuel Smith, in 1899, and renamed the Olds Moover the Olds name.

Ransom Olds didn't go far to build his new REO plant, which was erected on 16.5 acres at 2100 S. Washington St. It was and is in an area called REO Town, built south of downtown

"Shortly after he left the Olds Motor Works," said Historic Structures, "Olds announced the formation of the Reo struction of a factory, (Building No. 2) and office, (Building No. 1) on land which he had purchased previously in connection with his peat business. Within a year, the plant and office structures were completed, and as Reo's business increased, he expanded the size of his original plant by adding an additional story."

REO was one of the top four ands in the United States in 1907, but faded later due to competition from industry giants Ford and GM. The company added a truck line in 1910, but still

In 1915, Olds relinquished the title of REO's general manager to his protégé, and eight years later he ended his tenure as the company's presidency, retaining the position of chairman

Gradually, Olds withdrew from active management, "and the firm confined itself largely to the manufacture of quality medium-priced cars and trucks on a relatively small scale," says Historic Structures. In the 1930s REO's automobile production ceased with the 1936 Flying Cloud, and the firm concentrated on its line of trucks before it was eventually merged with several other truck manufacturers. The company stayed in business producing trucks during World War II.

Ransom Olds died in 1950. After the company was sold in 1954 and later merged, the final Diamond Reo Trucks, Inc. filed for bankruptcy and closed the **REO Town works in 1975.**

construction downturn is likely to intensify in future months because, in many states, April is normally the first month of significant highway spending following winter shutdowns.

"In addition, public educational construction dropped by 2.3 percent from March to April, while public spending on transportation infrastructure slipped by 1.4 percent. All public categories are at risk of further declines unless the federal government fills some of the holes that have opened in state and local government budgets."

On a year-to-date basis through four months of 2020, total U.S. construction starts were 8 percent lower than the same period in 2019, reported Dodge Data and Analytics.

"The April starts data is definitely sobering, but also very much expected," said Richard Branch, chief economist for Dodge Data & Analytics. "The near shuttering of the economy during April had a significant negative effect on the construction industry, leading to delays in both ongoing projects as well as those about to break ground. Even though parts of the country are beginning to reopen, and

some areas that had paused construction are now restarting, it will be a very long road back to normalcy for the construction industry. Continued fear of a resurgence in the virus will lead to a continued reduction in economic activity over the coming months, affecting construction projects across the country. The economic and construction recoveries will remain sluggish until a vaccine or viable treatment becomes available.'

Two days after the latest construction spending figures were released, more updated, unhappy employment numbers came out.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics reported that construction employment declined in more than nine out of 10 metro areas from March to April, a time when industry employment typically increases in most locations.

New York City, the AGC reported, lost the largest number of construction jobs for the month: 75,900 jobs, or 49 percent of the March total. There were also extremely large construction job losses in the Seattle-Bellevue-Everett, Wash. area, 44,200 jobs or 41 percent. "Today's employment report shows how few areas were left unscathed by April's unprecedented job losses," said Ken Simonson, the association's chief economist. "Sadly, our latest survey shows project cancellations are escalating, making further job losses inevitable unless there is funding for widespread new projects."

States paying 'staggering' jobless benefits, but the demand rate is falling

for returning to work," said The Hill on June 4. "But many Republican senators, including members of the leadership, now say the federal government should continue to enhance state unemployment benefits or provide a generous back-to-work bonus of \$450 per week for laid-off workers who return to their jobs."

Multiple states have crushing unemployment as a share of their overall workforce as of May 16, the highest being Nevada (24.9 percent), Michigan (22.9 percent), Hawaii (20.6 percent) and New York (19.2 percent).

Michigan had 57,714 new jobless claims for the week ending May 23, according to U.S. Labor Department data released May 28, still one of the highest claim rates in the nation. Michigan's Unemployment Insurance Agency still has long and frustrating waiting periods for claims that have been endured by jobless claimants, who have overwhelmed the state with claims during the pandemic shut-

Michigan cut employment compensation weeks for jobless workers from 26 weeks to 20 weeks - the stingiest in the nation – under legislation adopted by Republican legislators during the Rick Snyder Administration. But one of Gov. Gretcher Whitmer's executive orders in March temporarily extended that benefit to 26 weeks, in line with the rest of the states. The AEG estimates that Michigan is sending out about \$840 million in jobless benefits per week.

The Anderson Economic Group estimates that the current average weekly unemployment insurance check is nearly \$1,000 per claimant, consisting of \$370 in state payments (Michigan's max is \$362/week) plus the additional \$600 from the federal government. With 20 million unemployed Americans, and more than 17 million among the "insured unemployed," total weekly payments to workers are roughly \$16.7 billion.

Some good news: in the week ending May 30, the Labor Department reported seasonally adjusted initial U.S. jobless claims was 1.9 million, a decrease of 249,000 from the previous week's revised level. And, fewer jobless benefit applications have been filed each week for eight straight weeks through the end of May. Also, the unemployment rate dropped 1.4 percent on June 5 compared to the month prior.

But that 1.9 million figure is still more than double the precoronavirus record of 695,000 claims set in October 1982.

poultry processing plants. Congressional Democrats fault President Trump and his regime for delaying action against the virus, not providing needed protective gear for front-line essential workers, and shuffling blame for the virus off on China and responsibility for battling it off on the nation's governors and mayors.

And, as lawmakers learned, OSHA has been more interested in guidance that gets workers out of the way of catching the virus, and the virus out of workplaces, not catching and prosecuting "bad apple" employers that refuse to protect employees.

So as a result, when Sweatt cked a panel member's question about what she would do at, say, a pork production plant where there's a virus outbreak, she recommended having the plant follow federal distancing recommendations.

But she also told Subcommittee Chair Rep. Alva Adams, D-N.C., that "we have 58 compliance inspections going" at meat and poultry processing plants nation-

But those probes could each take six months before OSHA decides plant owners didn't protect workers from the virus and thus violated the law's "general duty clause" ordering firms to protect workers against job health and safety hazards, Sweatt said.

That didn't satisfy Adams, or other panel Democrats. "If you were a worker, would you feel safer if there was an enforceable (OSHA) standard" forcing firms to protect employees against the virus "or would you feel safer if the firm showed it made a goodfaith effort to follow the rules?" Adams asked.

"The agency is doing everything it can to provide guidance" to firms, Sweatt replied. "I suggest you act proactively," Levin told Sweatt. "Look at the worst sectors and act."



Brothers and Sisters, Your officers and myself are in hope this letter find you and your family well. The Governor has now extended the stay at home order until June 15, even though the CDC and our affiliated Governmental agencies have seen the epidemic peak in Michigan it still has a chance for a resurgence.

If I may say briefly on the recent topic of the public execution in our streets of another black American, George Floyd, by law enforcement officers. This triggered protests, riots, looting and social unrest thought our country these last few weeks. No, I never meet Mr. Floyd but I can tell you no human should go out like that for a supposed fake \$20 bill, to beg for his life on a U.S. street and then be terminated.

Yes, we all know these three police officers do not reflect all officers in our nation, and no we do not condone the retaliation of murdering policemen or looting, but again no one reads a history book and learns from it. I certainly hope his family finds some peace and that his death does not become another sticky note in in American history. We your 98 officers have asked President Rufus Hamilton to address this nightmare and it will be posted as soon as he gets his thoughts wrapped around this tragedy.

At this time, your officers are working together on gathering information on updates to the historic changes, to unemployment, we have secured grant money for our hall and our training center as have many locals have done across the country.

Our goal is to have our 1st Union meeting July 9. It may not look like a normal meeting but we will do our best to supply you with current information and allow you to regain some sense of normality. I still would not recommend any one with a possible compromised immune system or older members to to attend.

Facebook posts: younger members are still attempting to contact the hall on this medium. This may come as a shock to some of you, if you need help on anything job-related, (training) safety conditions, insurance questions, Benesys issues or unemployment problems, please use your cell phone and call any of your officers. We do not police the Facebook page, we cannot help you nor can I dispatch an agent to a job we have zero knowledge of if you do not notify us directly.

The job site return to work guidelines are published on the Mi. Department of Labor and Economic opportunity web site for the State of Michigan. Please take some time to review these before returning to work.

Due to our compliance with Mayor Duggan's STEP program, we have been given access to free Covi-19 testing to all Local 98 members at the old State Fair Grounds on Woodward and 8 mile in Detroit. Prior to going you must call for an appointment at 313-230-0505. No Dr. note is needed, they will ask you for a code and ours is 289488PL. This is free and zero copay.

Many of you are trusting your contractor to report you back to work, they are forgetting to do so, when you return to a job call the hall or any officer to report your status.

Due to many large volumes of calls we now are looking for organized men and women, travelers and retirees so Friday the 29th of May, sub pay was cut, your agents have gone thru the list multiple times and the calls are ranging from 6-7 days, 40

hours to 70. Our auto plants as well as construction sites are starting their work up again. There are many changes now for entrance to these facilities. If you are asked to do any pre-hire safety of any type prior to entering the plant on your own time, that is not going to be acceptable, you must be reimbursed for your time.

You will be asked medical questions on your health and your immediate family contacts. You will have your temperature taken before work. The use of 4-10s may be used at first. Shifts may be staggered for a while, watch the start times, as overtime may apply. You will no longer be allowed to leave the plant or job sites, this means going out for lunch or cashing a check and then return, they will not let you come back the same day.

You will need to pack food and water for the hours the plant is working, pack a big lunch this is the new normal. The 6' rule "when possible" must be adhered too and face masks will be supplied to you as you enter the jobs. Don't be the guy who refuses to wear a mask and the PPE provided, you have no right to endanger your partner, the owner may have you removed for non-compliance.

If you are not supplied any PPE or feel the job is not addressing these issues you have the right to call your agent and leave the job. We have established an anonymous safety hotline call in number for our locals 98, 636 members and our Contractors to investigate any lack of protection or wrong doing by the owners we all work for, the number is 313-340-7339.

This is a chance for the whole building trades to fight for a sanitary job site, no one person needs to be the only one bitching of poor conditions of Porta Jon's and a clean place for lunch. All of you need to talk as one voice and help yourselves on this issue.

As you know wage allocation is upon us and it has been allocated until a meeting can be held to ratify by the membership. All wage rates and allocation have been posted to our web page, weather it is temporary or becomes permanent, none of us wants to move money to a check than pull it back for some unforeseen run on a fund. Once we have an official meeting you can than have a vote to approve final allocation.

Until further notice only E-Board meetings are getting under way. If you need to contact or see the board please call V.P. Jim Cools at 734-307-9841. Union meetings and Retiree meetings are still cancelled. The Union Hall and our Training Center have been shut down to all unnecessary foot traffic, that does not mean the officers cannot be reached or center can't be used.

Apprentices, our training center is reopening this week to classes pay attention to any emails and calls to you.

I am getting complaints from agents that 18 Apprentices won't return calls. If you are working and haven't reported in, the computer didn't register you or you can't work due to some reason, I would hate to replace you due to fact you are too busy to return a call.

In the meantime, any pertinent information can be found on our new web page, yes 98 has a web page (not Facebook). Your officers can individually report on upcoming work in their areas or issues and a whole list of information is now available to you under the member only section.

The new out of work list available to access there as well, just follow the instructions on the top of the web page. Please be patient as we are working out the bugs on the system.

401K Withdrawal: The recently enacted CARES Act allows the 401k Plan to adopt a special in-service distribution for participants who are diagnosed with COVID-19, whose spouse or child is diagnosed with COVID -19, or who are experiencing economic hardship as a result of the pandemic.

This distribution can be up to \$100k, is not subject to the ordinary 10% excise tax, and the income tax from the distribution can be spread out over a 3-year period. Individuals receiving such a distribution may also repay the distribution over 3-year period, in which case they will not be subject to income tax on what they repay.

Unlike other hardships, this particular distribution only requires that the member self-certify the need. The Fund is not required to independently corroborate the participant's certification with medical documentation or other types of documentation. The distribution is a onetime event only and must be taken in 2020. This program applies to only the employer contribution 401k and will begin April 20th, 2020. You will receive an official notice in the mail soon.

Sub-Pay: The board of trustees voted to temporarily raise the maximum sub pay credit from \$130 to \$260 from March 23rd until the end of April. To file for sub-pay, fill out a sub-pay form. You can find a form on the members only section of the website under the "forms" tab on the lefthand side, or you can call the Union office and we'll mail or email you some. Mail or fax the completed form along with verification that you received an unemployment payment to TIC. If you prefer to email the forms, please email them to Cami at cburris@ua174.org and she will submit them to TIC.



Depending on your classification you could have benefits due to your heirs from Local 80 pension, insurance, annuity and from international and SASMI. Each individual benefit needs to have a designated beneficiary unless you want it to go to your spouse or children. As always seek the advice of an attorney.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH and DISMEMBERMENT INSURANCE FROM OUR INTERNATIONALASSOCIATION: Members who have their dues paid in advance (prior to the month of the accident) are eligible for accidental death and dismemberment benefits up to \$7,500. This benefit comes as a dues paying member of SMART International.

WEEKEND WORK ASSIGNMENTS: Saturday and Sunday work assignments. Please remember that when performing work on a Saturday or Sunday the steward must report it to the hall, give each members name and obtain a form for signatures. Each member must sign the form along with the number of hours they worked. The completed form must be sent back to by hall by the end of the day on the following Monday. Weekend work assignments must be called or emailed into the hall prior to 3:00 pm on Friday.

WORK ASSIGNMENTS: Everyone must obtain a work assignment prior to starting work. If you fail to do so you could be written

LAY-OFFS: All members must report to the Union Hall immediately upon lay-off, even if you only work one day. These are the By-Law rules for the Out-of-Work List. Your name will be removed from the list 14 days after receiving an assignment. It is very important to report to the union hall immediately after your layoff. Members get confused because the S.U.B. Fund allows you a period of up to seven

days to apply for S.U.B. benefits after lay-off. LAY-OFF SLIPS/TERMINATION NOTICES: Lay off slips must accompany all applications for sub pay. Without lay off slips you cannot collect sub pay. It is the member's responsibility to make sure they get one from the contractor when laid off. Your application cannot be submitted without one. It is the contractor's responsibility to issue one in accordance with our contract.

S.U.B. BENEFITS: Report to the hall promptly upon layoff. You must complete a S.U.B. Application within seven days from your layoff date or you will forfeit S.U.B. benefits. Lay-off slips must accompany the application to be eligible. Proof of UIA benefit payments must be submitted within 21 days of when you were paid in order to receive SUB benefits. Do not submit your sub applications directly to the fund office. Your application must be signed by the hall or you will not collect benefits.

OUT-OF-WORK LIST: You must be on the out-of-work list to collect S.U.B. benefits or SASMI. Members must re-register bi-annually: March 1 through March 20 and September 1 through September 20. If you fail to re-register you will be removed from the list.

SHORT WORK WEEK SUB PAY: If you work 16 hours or less in a week or have a short work week due to weather you may collect sub for that week but only if it is at the **beginning or the end of a** layoff. You may NOT collect if you are not laid off. You must complete a sub application at the hall, provide a pay stub for that week and the hall will submit it to the fund office. If you are not laid off and it is due to weather the company MUST provide written documentation that it was weather related.



Members please note that if you cannot access the MUST site to complete your safety mods you need to contact Laura or Lee Ann at the Union Hall. With the amount of upcoming in-town work, all current Journeymen and Apprentices should ensure they have 18 safety mods completed and drug test should be current.

***The NMA addendum for most of the upcoming projects states: 1) Prior to, but within (30) days of referral for employment to the project site, all craft persons will: A) Attend a Project Specific Orientation facilitated by the Contractor at mutually agreed upon times and locations; B) Before being admitted to the job site, all contractors and subcontractor employees having active involvement in job site construction activity, must be current and maintain a current MUST or equivalent status regarding the Substance Abuse Program. Prior to the start of work on the project the employee must provide confirmation of negative results to a MUST Substance Abuse Test or equivalent test within the last 30 days.

MEMBER ASSISTANCE: Local 292 is now partnering with Ulliance, an employee assistance program designed to assist active members and their eligible family members who may be struggling with emotional, domestic or substance abuse issues, as well as legal and financial referrals. If you and/or a family member feel this may benefit you, contact Ulliance at 1-800-448-8326 or www. LifeAdvisorEAP.com for completely confidential assistance. Ulliance is available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Services are of no cost to active members and their dependents.

SUBSTANTIATION REQUEST: Many members have been receiving Substantiation Request letters from the Local 292 Benefit Fund office. IRS regulations require that every use of the Benny Card be substantiated or validated as an eligible covered expense under the Plan. This validation is required by the IRS, the Fund cannot make exceptions. It is the member's responsibility to ensure all requested documentation be returned to the Fund office in a timely manner. By not responding to the Substantiation Request letter, your Benny Card may be suspended until all requested documentation has been received. If you have any questions, contact BeneSys at 248.641.4992 or the Union Hall.

DUES: Membership dues are required to be **paid in advance of** the month for which they are due. The union hall is not open on Saturday or Sunday, therefore, if you pay dues on either of those days, it will not be processed until Monday. If you are on suspension warning, your dues are 60 days late. To avoid suspension, dues must be paid online or at the union hall by 4:00 p.m. on the last business day of the month. OUT OF WORK: If you become laid off, you **must** complete an Out of Work List Registration /SUB form. SUB forms are available at the Union Hall and also through all shop stewards. This is the only way your name will be added to the Out of Work List.

Pension reform on back-burner in Congress

(Continued from Page 1) this premier event brings together hundreds of members from around the country to hear from

federal policymakers about legislative and regulatory issues that will affect their businesses. Multiemployer pension re-

form was scheduled to be one of the most important topics of discussion at the conference. While we can't meet in person, we've put together what we hope is the next best thing: a comprehensive overview of where reform efforts currently stand and the prospects for making real progress in

Efforts to convince Congress to move forward with alternative plan designs, including a new "hybrid" or composite option for plans, have stalled while federal policymakers struggle to find solutions that both address failing pension plans and strengthen the overall multiemployer pension

(Editor's note: Composite plans can be voluntarily instituted by a union-employer group, and they combine features of a traditional pension plan with 401k-style contributions. They would be offered alongside a union's traditional pension plan. Some building trades unions support the concept, others don't).

This failure to act threatens to undermine the multiemployer pension system and exacerbates the uncertainty for both the participants in these plans and the signatory employers who contribute to them. The CEA continues to remind Congress and the administration that while only about 10 percent of plans in the multiemployer system face insolvency, the overall system and its contributing employers are under stress – even more so in the wake of COVID-19-related work restric-

Many plans face significant unfunded liabilities and are subject to the same long-term risks that have driven other plans to insolvency. While we recognize and share the concerns about the effect of this crisis on plan participants, Congress and the administration need to understand that the system depends first and foremost on the viability of the contributing employer. Despite years of ever-increasing contributions, companies are subject to withdrawal liability that is frequently higher than the value of their company.

Owners cannot sell their businesses; the risks are too great to pass along to their children or other heirs; and the liabilities hinder the ability to transfer ownership to employees and the formation of an Employee Stock Ownership Plan, ESOP. Just staying in business is a challenge as employers face growing scrutiny from lenders and tighter credit

markets.

Again, we expect these problems will only increase in a postcoronavirus world. These liabilities are also a growing threat to companies' obtaining credit on reasonable terms. The unfunded liabilities create a barrier to new employers that want to enter the system and, worse, serve as an impetus for current employers to leave the plan, further destabilizing individual plans and the system overall. At the same time, policymakers need to recognize that active workers have seen decreases in their future benefits even in the face of increased contributions to their plans.

Is there a solution on the horizon? We are pleased that a proposal issued late last year by Sens. Chuck Grassley, R-Iowa, and Lamar Alexander, R-Tenn who chair the Senate committees with jurisdiction over multi-employer pension issues - has generated productive bipartisan discussions this year.

While many aspects of the proposal concern stakeholders, the CEA has held that it is a blueprint to initiate bipartisan discussions, not an ending point. The good news is that composite plans are part of the proposal. It is our job to educate people on both sides of the aisle in both houses that composites are necessary to modernize the multiemployer system and can be implemented in a way that would allow broader segments of plans to use composite plans.

A key problem Congress faces is how to pay for the estimated \$4 billion in annual costs to allow failing plans to partition liabilities in order to remain solvent. Some have suggested that the "system" should bear most of or all this cost.

The CEA stresses that construction industry employers and active workers have already made significant sacrifices to cover unfunded liabilities in their own plans and cannot also be expected to fully finance the rescue of failing plans through premium increases. Extreme increases would weaken the financial health of individual employers and the plans.

It doesn't make sense to bankrupt remaining plans to pay for the benefits promised by failed plans. Additionally, the CEA points out that Congress

has raised the PBGC premium rate for multiemployer plans over time and that the Multiemployer Pension Reform Act (MPRA) doubled its rate in 2015 and included automatic increases for inflation.

Since, ultimately, the employer shoulders premium increases, construction employers argue that any increases must be phased in over a reasonable time period and that Congress should ensure that all other tools are fully deployed before considering increasing premiums.

This includes fully implementing the MPRA reforms for failing plans, providing government funding to pay for proposals to partition and authorizing composite plans.

Beyond figuring out how to pay for multiemployer pension reforms, policy recommendations under discussion would significantly affect the multiemployer system. This includes a proposal to mandate a maximum rate of return – the plan "discount rate" – that plans can assume. Severe and sudden changes to the funding rules will have grave and unintended consequences.

Even a modest change in investment assumptions can dramatically alter funding status. As previously stated, Congress must maintain a delicate balance to keep employers participating in the plans. Changes must be modest and phased in because mandating lower investment assumptions would raise actuarial liabilities, driving an inordinate number of plans to critical status and causing dramatically increased employer contributions.

Changes that financially weaken employers weaken the system and would put more multiemployer plans at risk of insolvency

Sharing space with urban wildlife

The term wildlife might conjure up thoughts of large, exotic mammals in faraway places. Or perhaps some of the larger mammals we have in Michigan, such as a moose or a black bear, may come to mind.

But wildlife isn't just the big, iconic animals we tend to think of – it includes smaller species like bumblebees and butterflies. Chances are, you have had firsthand experience with a wild animal no matter where you live.

Wildlife is all around us. We all share the same habitat and are connected as different parts of the same ecosystem.

Each species plays an important role in the ecosystem and contributes to keeping our environment healthy.

Wildlife improves our shared ecosystem in a vast range of ways, providing countless benefits for humans.

For example, some species of birds and bats eat a variety of insects that would otherwise cause significant crop damage. Bats also pollinate flowers that provide fruits that we eat, like bananas.

Snakes, coyotes, hawks and owls all prey on smaller mammals, some of which people frequently view as pests, like mice and rats. Wildlife like turkey vultures could be considered a sort of clean-up crew as they scavenge and consume unsightly roadkill.

Because wild animals of all sizes can be found throughout Michigan, they provide benefit to whatever habitat they live in, from forests and wetlands to farmlands and cities.

Living with our wild neighbors

Amazingly, many species have adapted and figured out how to survive in human-altered landscapes. Wild animals have been able to find a way to meet their needs even within our inner cities. Whether we intend to or not. people have changed the available habitat – we have created new

When habitat changes are not enough.

There are always those situations where, no matter what you do, you cannot seem to discourage an animal from your area. Especially when it is one of Michigan's well-adapted species like coyotes, deer, turkeys and geese, which seem to thrive in urban areas.

These animals may be wellsuited for living in manmade habitats and hard to deter.

This is especially true of a species like coyotes, which are territorial and may be less keen on leaving "their" space to go elsewhere. Not only are coyotes found everywhere in Michigan, but they have healthy populations, so there probably are not many unoccupied territories left to choose from.

If you live in a more rural area where outdoor recreation activities like hunting and trapping are ior. Fortunately, there are some ful about how your actions or allowed, you can remedy some of

these issues during the open season for the species causing the headache.

"Hunting and trapping seasons give landowners options for mitigating issues with wildlife, while still preserving them on the landscape," said Adam Bump, the DNR's furbearer specialist. "There are also some species that can be taken year-round."

Bump says that coyotes, raccoons, woodchucks (groundhogs) and skunks can be killed at any time by landowners or their designees employing otherwise lawful methods if these animals are doing, or about to do, damage to private property.

Information on hunting in Michigan can be found at Michigan.gov/Hunting. Species that have open trapping seasons and associated regulations can be found at Michigan.gov/Trapping.

What about urban areas where hunting is not an option?

"The DNR issues permits to businesses that can provide wildlife removal services for certain species," said Casey Reitz, wildlife permit specialist with the DNR. "This helps give landowners an option for dealing with unwanted wildlife on their property, particularly in those areas where hunting is not allowed.

"Permittees use a variety of methods for removal that are safe in an urban or residential setting. They can help landowners with

removal of species like coyote, fox, muskrats, opossums, squirrels, woodchucks and skunks, to name a few."

The DNR also works closely with federal agencies to offer options for handling issues with Canada geese, a species protected by both federal and state laws, in urban areas. Specially permitted nuisance control companies can be hired to assist landowners with goose control programs. The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Wildlife Services also offers removal assistance. such as nest destruction and relocation permits.

Aggressive animals.

In those instances where there is an aggressive wild animal, particularly animals such as geese, swans, turkeys, deer and bears, landowners should get in touch with the nearest DNR Customer Service Center to let the local DNR staff know about the issue. As each situation is unique, staff will first assess the problem and then determine the appropriate action based on the species and location.

Landowners can contact one of the nuisance wildlife control permittees for assistance with removal of species such as coyotes, fox, raccoons, opossums and skunks.
