UIA getting up to speed on claims

LANSING - The Michigan Unemployment Agency is crawling out of its hole and catching up on claims.

The news service MIRS reported July 24 that the agency has caught up on jobless benefit claims filed before June 1. That's after the agency announced on July 6 it had met its July 4 goal "to make a determination on all currently eligible, certifying unpaid claims that were filed before May 1."

The great disruption to the state's economy caused by the COVID-19 pandemic led to about 2.1 million in unemployment claims from March 15 through July, with more than \$15 billion in benefits paid to more than 2 million workers. Michigan's maximum unemployment benefit is \$362 per week, and jobless workers received an additional \$600 weekly federal unemployment benefit that ended July 25 under the original federal CARES Act.

The Unemployment Agency said 97.2 percent of potentially eligible, certifying claimants have received or are approved for benefits. Of the remaining unpaid claimants, most are flagged for potential impostor fraud. The UIA said last month that less than 34,000 unpaid claims had yet to be resolved and were being held for additional identity verification while about 15,000 unpaid claims are held pending adjudication for other reasons.

"The UIA remains committed to quickly processing claims. While there is only small percentage of eligible workers ho have yet to be paid, we know that is no consolation to the thousands of claimants who are frustrated, desperate and owed the benefits they were promised," said UIA Director Steve Gray, who had previously apologized for the UIA's slow response to the rush of claims, which was unprecedented. "We will not rest until the claims backlog is eliminated and all eligible Michigan workers get every single dollar they are entitled

Ouch: COVID leaves state in deep rut

Despite the relative strength of the state's construction industry, Michigan ranks third among the states for "fiscal shock" caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Of course, the entire nation has experienced some effect from the pandemic, which has closed schools and businesses, generally disrupted our way of life and caused the infection of nearly 2.4 million Americans and claimed more than 153,000 lives.

But some states have been hit harder than others by the pandemic – and Michigan is among them.

"Due to the abrupt shutdown of their economies, states were left with a sudden shock to their revenue streams as withholding tax from employers was not collected, sales tax revenue fell as spending decreased, and other taxes and receipts were flat or negative in growth," said the report, issued in July by the Council of State Governments.

Michigan received the lowest score in four of five categories, including "revenue shortfall," "Medicaid increase," "economic risk," and "pension reliance on financial market returns."

Trades put a charge in DTE's Blue Water Energy Center

EAST CHINA TWP. – In a weird, turbulent year, Michigan's largest ongoing construction project is proceeding safely, on schedule, and with a lot of quality work.

Under Kiewit Engineering (MI) Co., the project's engineering, construction, and procurement manager, progress on

building the Blue Water Energy Center was approaching 40 percent completion in early July, with 1 million man-hours worked.

Significant work on DTE Energy's natural gas-fueled, combined-cycle power plant began with pilings in October 2018. The plant is being erected on the grounds of the utility's existing Belle River Power Plant in St. Clair County.

"There's a lot to be done, but so far everybody here has stuck with it, buckled down and is doing a lot of hard work, and we have managed to minimize the COVID impact," said Kiewit Project Manager Casey Williams. "It looks like we're set to hit a lot of important milestones in the next six months."

For now, Michigan is an island in a swamp created by COVID-19

"COVID-19 crushes construction starts in most metro areas during first-half 2020," reads the headline of the quarterly report on the status of U.S. construction from Dodge Data and Analytics.

That headline is both accurate and inadequate – because it's also impossible to encapsulate in a few words the incredible rollercoaster that the U.S. construction industry has been riding before and after the pandemic started shutting down many jobsites in March. And this year Michigan has had a lower low - and a higher high – than just about any other state. And right now we're riding pretty high, but again, it's a roller coaster.

The latest numbers from Dodge paint an overall gloomy picture for construction, reflecting prospects for the greater economy. Michigan has been one of the few bright spots on the map for construction activity after the six-week COVID-related construction shutdown ended in the state, reducing construction activity by as much as 81 percent and likely creating a lot of pentup demand. While the heightened activity isn't likely to last in Michigan, it has been stronger than expected.

"The full force of the pandemic bore down on U.S. con-

struction starts in April as economic activity virtually shut down and local restrictions on construction took effect," Dodge said on July 22. "Construction resumed in some areas in May allowing starts to post a mild gain (Continued on Page 3)

Labor gags on GOP's relief bill

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Organized labor really, really doesn't like the Republican Senate's plan to support the nation's workers and sustain the U.S. economy during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.) on July 28 unveiled the GOP's \$1 trillion relief plan for the U.S. economy. Labor leaders panned it for being too late to keep federal jobless benefits flowing without interruption, while offering a paltrier benefit package than the Democrats' plan and zero help for budgets of

'Inequality grows and wages stagnate'

U.S. labor law needs to start working for workers, study says

U.S. labor law, much of which was adopted in the 1930s and updated in the 1940s, is badly skewered against workers and many aspects – especially union election procedures - are desperately in need of reform.

A new report for the laborbacked Economic Policy Institute (EPI) describes how employers "routinely threaten, intimidate, and harass workers to stop them from exercising their right to collective bargaining."

The report, issued July 23, calls on Congress to reform federal labor laws, including by passing and enacting the Protecting the Right to Organize (PRO) Act and extending labor rights to

farmworkers, domestic workers, and independent contractors who are currently excluded from federal union rights.

"Protecting the right to collective bargaining is key to solving the crisis of economic inequality," said Gordon Lafer, professor at the University of Oregon's Labor Education and Research Center and co-author of the report. "When workers have the ability to bargain collectively with their employers, the division of corporate profits is more equally shared between employees, management, and shareholders. When workers can't exercise this right as is often the case - inequality grows and wages stagnate.'

The report details common employer tactics that often turn overwhelming support for unions at the outset of a campaign into a "no" vote just weeks later, includ-

WASHINGTON (PAI) -Building trades workers who toil on constructing energy facilities believe their jobs building oil and natural gas pipelines last longer and give them higher pay than jobs building wind farms and solar panel arrays, a new survey of 1,619 workers and accompanying analysis shows.

Trades Unions commissioned Construction Job Quality Across U.S. Energy Industries, and posted it at www.nabtu.org. It reports gas and oil pipeline construction jobs "are one of the biggest opportunities for our members to maintain their position in the middle class," NABTU President Sean McGarvey says.

The oil and gas jobs are especially valuable economically to North America's Building workers in the trades, the study

says. That's not the case with wind and solar, though, McGarvey adds.

"We have to make sure" the wind and solar project construction jobs "are middle-class family-sustaining jobs, and right now, they're not," McGarvey told the July 17 telephone press conference on the studies. "What makes these good jobs is the training and the money, which our members gain through registered apprenticeships, and the opportu-

He added: "Energy construction workers find better wages and benefits in oil and gas than in the renewable sector, with longer construction times. They also find once projects are built, solar and wind projects need far less

We have liftoff... space launch site picked in U.P.

MARQUETTE – Michigan may be jumping into the modern-day space industry. In an era when private space travel is becoming increasingly common, the Michigan Aerospace Manufacturers Association on July 23 announced that a vertical rocket space launch site has been chosen on land just north of the city. Several months ago the group announced that Oscoda-Wurtsmith Airport outside of Oscoda in the Lower Peninsula was chosen as the top candidate for a horizontal spaceport.

Conducted by spaceport consultants BRPH and Kimley-Horn, the site-selection process has been a year-long effort. Sites were ranked based on several factors, including existing commercial and public infrastructure, geographic and terrestrial mapping, living standards and workforce development. Operations in the U.P. are expected to begin by early 2025. The site selections follow the state Legislature's June 2019 appropriation of \$2 million to assess the feasibility of developing one or more low-orbit launch sites in Michigan.

'Michigan has a real opportunity to support a space-based ecosystem," said

Trump vs. workers

Donald Trump campaigned as an insurgent outside of the political establishment who would restore the long-neglected working class. That was a lie. As president, he's turned his back on working people, governing instead as a lackey for billionaires, CEOs, and corporations. Even during a public health and economic crisis, Trump has left working people in the dust.

Consider his signature tax law, sold as a benefit to working people. More than 60 percent of its benefits have gone to people in the top 20 percent of the income ladder. In 2018, for the first time in American history, billionaires paid a lower tax rate than the

Trump said every worker would get a \$4,000 raise, but nothing trickled down. Instead, corporations spent their tax savings buying back shares of their own stock, boosting executive bonuses and doing nothing for workers. To make matters worse, some of the richest corporations are paying nothing in federal income taxes, despite making billions in profits.

Meanwhile, Trump's corporate lobbyists and industry shills have systematically dismantled worker protections - rolling back child labor protections, undoing worker safeguards from exposure to cancerous radiation, gutting measures that shield workers from wage theft, and eliminating overtime for 8 million

Trump has even asked the Supreme Court to take away the health insurance of 23 million American workers by invalidating the Affordable Care Act – in the middle of a global health crisis, no less! If Trump gets his way, protections for people with preexisting conditions will be eliminated.

Oh, and remember his promise to rein in drug prices so working people can afford the meds they need? Well, forget it. Remdesivir, a drug to reduce the severity of COVID-19, from pharma giant Gilead, was developed with \$70 million of taxpayer funding, yet Trump is letting the company charge \$3,000 per treatment. And he is omitting pricing protections from federal contracts to develop drugs for Covid-19 – making it likely that life-saving treatments and vaccines will be out of reach for

Donald Trump doesn't give a fig for working-class Americans. He even wants to end the extra unemployment benefits that countless Americans are depending on to get through this crisis. So whose side is Trump really on?

Well, here's a clue: Tucked away on page 203 of the COVID stimulus package backed by Trump, is an obscure provision that delivers a whopping \$135 billion in tax breaks to millionaire real estate developers and hedge fund managers. One real estate tycoon who stands to profit handsomely from the provision is none other than the president's son-in-law and senior adviser, Jared

In total, the cash secretly spent on tax cuts for millionaires in the COVID-19 package is more than three times as much money as was included for emergency housing and food relief.

Kushner isn't the only Trump insider getting paid off during the pandemic. Forty lobbyists with ties to Donald Trump have helped clients secure more than \$10 billion in federal COVID aid. And if Trump succeeds in getting the Supreme Court to repeal the Affordable Care Act, the richest 0.1 percent of Americans will get an average additional tax cut of \$198,000 each per year.

Donald Trump is no working-class champion. He's a corporate con man – the culmination of a rigged-for-the-rich system that's shafting working Americans at every turn.

down at the plant beginning in March due to the COVID-19 crisis, Williams said the "commitment and hard work" by site subcontractors and building trades union workers, as well as strict safety protocols, is keeping the project on the original schedule of completion for the spring of

The Blue Water Energy Center, says DTE Energy, is expected to be the most fuel-efficient power plant in Michigan. It will run on natural gas and use combined-cycle technology that captures waste heat to produce additional electricity. The plant will emit 70 percent less carbon dioxide and will be 40 percent more efficient than the three coal-fired plants DTE plans to retire by 2022 - including the St. Clair Power Plant that's directly west of the new combined cycle plant.

In 2017 "DTE first announced a broad sustainability initiative to reduce carbon emissions by more than 80 percent and do it in a way that maintains affordability and reliability for our customers," said Gerry Anderson, then chairman and CEO, DTE Energy. "In fact, we're already doing it. Since 2009 we have driven investments of more than \$2.5 billion in renewable energy with more investments coming. But as we continue to retire coal-fired power plants - all of them by 2040 - we need to complement wind farms and solar arrays with high reliability assets. As we Michiganders know well, the wind doesn't always blow, and the sun doesn't always shine in our beautiful state.

"And that's why we need natural gas-fueled plants like the Blue Water Energy Center. When it begins operations in 2022, it will represent our single largest step in reducing carbon emissions to date.'

Williams said there's a lot going on at the site of the combined-cycle plant, which is cordoned off from the existing plant by a fence and separate entrances.

He said earlier this month that the building trades and their employers are continuing to build

out the combustion turbine and heat recovery steam generator systems. They're building a new switchyard and transmission line to connect to the grid. All the major electrical enclosures have been set, and electricians are pulling wire and performing terminations. The site's administration building is also going up -

among a myriad of other tasks. The combined cycle plant technology and hardware are "fairly new to Michigan," Williams said, and the plant has required the importation and setting of some extremely heavy equipment, with the main hardware manufactured by General Electric. "There are some heavy, long and awkward pieces that we had to figure out how to get to the site, and fortunately, we have passed that process," Williams

said. The equipment, including an 800,000-pound generator, was brought in via an existing on-site rail spur, plus boat and truck. The rail link in particular, helped avoid the closure of local roads and the movement of existing power

Another challenge was working with the soil at the site. The new plant is being erected on former brownfield land that was used as a disposal site for dirt. Ground conditions necessitated the driving of 1,600 W-shaped piles, 160 feet deep. Fortunately, Williams said during the construction of the foundations there was "very little underground" expected or found which is not always the case when building on the grounds of older power plants.

DTE Energy said the 1,150

MW Blue Water Energy Center will provide power for 850,000 homes. The facility's technology will provide more flexibility, allowing the utility to start the plant up in less than an hour to meet the needs of the grid – about 50 times faster than a coal-fired plant.

From an environmental standpoint, the natural gas-fired plant will emit 70 percent less carbon dioxide, 99 percent less nitrous and sulfur, and use 99 percent less water than a coal-

According to GE, a combined-cycle plant uses a gas turbine to burn fuel, and the turbine compresses air and mixes it with fuel that is heated to a very high temperature. The hot air-fuel mixture moves through the gas turbine blades, making them spin. The fast-spinning turbine drives a generator that converts a portion of the spinning energy into

Then, a heat recovery steam generator (HRSG) captures exhaust heat from the gas turbine that would otherwise escape through the exhaust stack. The HRSG creates steam from the gas turbine exhaust heat and delivers it to the steam turbine, which delivers additional electricity.

Always looming in the background at the plant - and in every corner of society - is the COVID-19 pandemic. Williams said Kiewit and DTE developed protocols to approach and plan the work to create a safe environment, as well as require the use of face masks, employ social distancing and enhanced hygiene. The project will peak in the next month or so with about 650 tradespeople on site.

"I've been impressed with the Michigan building trades,' Williams said. "Together with DTE we have tried to cherry-pick best practices in dealing with COVID, and we have set a 'nobody gets hurt atmosphere.' From the first meeting with the business agents and workers, they have really embraced the

billions of dollars of their own cash reserves.

But hold your nose, for it gets much stinkier.

The bailout was intended to keep hospital workers on the job. Yet the wealthiest chains have hit nurses, janitors, and other cruand asserted cial frontline staffers with layoffs, pay cuts, and deadly shortages of protective gear.

For example, HCA, the \$36billion a-year health care behemoth that's wallowing in profits, snatched a billion-dollar taxpayer bailout for itself, then demanded hospital staffers accept wage freezes and the elimination of company pension payments... or have thousands of jobs eliminated.

However, in a public show of compassion, HCA's chief executive Samuel Hazen donated money despite sitting on tens of two months of his \$1.4 million

salary to an employee support fund. Magnanimous? Deceptive is more like it.

The trick is that a CEO's "salary" is a miniscule part of total pay. Hazen's annual bonus, stock payouts, and other compensation will raise his actual pay to almost \$27 million.

So his donation is less than 1 percent of his pay, and he almost certainly will write that off his income taxes. That means we taxpayers – including the nurses and others he's knocking down - not only underwrite his fat takehome pay, but we also subsidize his face-saving philanthropic gimmick.

What we have here is a raging virus of executive suite greed doing deeper damage to our society than COVID-19 ever could.






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BUILDING MICHIGAN: AC Spark Plugs HISTORY IN THE MAKING By Marty Mulcahy

At the turn of the last century, the budding automobile industry was producing cars that were comprised of about 1,500 parts.

Of course, some of those components were more important than others in the operation of a vehicle. Spark plugs, for example, were indispensable to the operation of an internal combustion engine – and the essential nature of those metal and ceramic objects helped employ tens of thousands of workers in Flint over the course of the last century.

Flint is known as the birthplace of General Motors, but it was also home to the AC Spark Plug Co., manufacturer of spark plugs and a whole line of other automotive components – and when needed, war materiel.

"AC Spark Plug has been referred to as 'one of the most iconic auto parts names in history,' and is a big part of Flint's and General Motors' past," wrote Cheryl Dennison for MyCityMag. "The manufacturing facility underwent many name changes over the years, originally called Champion Ignition after its founder, Albert Champion (hence 'AC'). GM purchased it in 1909 and in 1922, it became AC Spark Plug Company." (The competing Champion Spark Plug brand, which Albert had been involved in starting, had previously been trademarked and its owners de-

manded control of the name). Credit for the invention of the first spark plug goes to American Edmond Burger, who built such a device in 1839. But Burger didn't get a patent on his spark plug, and the internal combustion engine was barely in developmental stages at the time.

"So documented history points to Sir Oliver Lodge of England, whose sons parlayed the "Lodge Igniter" into a profitable company founded in 1903," says E3's History-Making Spark *Plugs.* "The next year, Albert Champion, a world renowned bicycle and motorcycle racer who made extra cash by handcrafting spark plugs and selling them to friends, moved from France to Flint, Michigan and founded **Champion Ignition Co. Investor** drama left Champion jobless, but he soon found himself appointed president of the AC Spark Plug Co. formed with backing from **Buick Motor Co.**"

The AC Spark Plug Co. was founded in Flint on Oct. 26, 1908 by Champion and William C. **Durant, who founded General** Motors Corp. the same year. Originally, Champion was located in a Buick building. In 1909, AC Spark Plug became a division of the General Motors Co. and the company started working out of a new factory.

"A.H. Goss, secretary of the Buick Motor Co.of Flint," said a local publication in February 1909, "has announced that work has begun upon a factory building for the Champion Ignition Co. at Harriet Street and Industrial Avenue. The building will be uniform in appearance with those of the Buick concern and the Weston-Mott Co. The concern is affiliated with the Buick Co. and will manufacture all kinds of electrical equipment, especially electrical ignition devices. A large number of men will be employed."

The Industrial Avenue plant

as originally built was a tiny 33,000 square feet. A second building was added at the site in 1915, adding 18,000 square feet, and in 1918 more buildings were constructed, creating 88,000 square feet.

AC Spark Plug got more room in 1925 when it acquired new space to manufacture goods in the former J. Dallas Dort auto plant, where car production halted in 1924.

'The Flint factories extended from Dort Highway, along Robert T. Longway Blvd. to Center Rd., and the operations survived many highs and lows," said My CityMag. "In its heyday, AC employed as many as 14,000 workers."

The name of the division is AC Spark Plug, but it is obvious... that it made more than spark plugs," said AC Spark Plug Division of GMC in World War Two. "In 1919 AC Spark Plug added speedometers to its product line. In 1925 it added air cleaners, and in 1926 oil filters and gas filters started coming off its assembly lines. These were followed in 1927 by mechanical fuel pumps, ammeters, oil and temperature gauges, and tachometers. In 1928 the division began the manufacture of complete instrument panels and crankcase breathers. Fast forward to 1975 and past many other new products, and AC Spark Plug Division began producing the catalytic converters that were installed on all General Motors passenger cars and some light trucks. New products were introduced during its entire life cycle."

During World War II the plants manufactured a dizzying array of other products to help win the war, including Sperry Automatic Pilots, bombsights, torpedo directors, flaming arrestors, switches, bearings, and **Browning 50-caliber machine** guns, just to name a few.

AC Spark Plugs not only ignited the engines of GM vehicles, they rode along with aviatrix Amelia Earhart. The company's engineers helped NASA develop the inertial guidance systems for the entire Apollo program, with AC igniter

AC Spark Plug's division was merged with GM's United Delco division in 1974, forming AC-Delco. GM demolished its original Industrial Avenue facility in 1975, with operations moving to the seven plants that made up the Dort Highway works. Last known as Flint Delphi East, the factories continued to produce numerous automotive components. In 2006, AC Spark Plug closed its doors and in 2013, Flint Delphi East (Plant 43) ceased operations and relocated the bulk of its work to Mexico.

Champion earned a place in the Automotive Hall of Fame in 1977 having "ignited the automotive industry with his innovative products," the Hall said. Further, the Hall said "Champion's spark plugs were designed to shield the center electrode from grounding against metal and were more resilient against moisture and engine heat. His products became wildly successful...."

In August Champion's contributions to the auto industry and the community was enshrined, with the unveiling of a life-size bronze statue in downtown Flint.

Champion enjoyed racing, especially motorcycyles, and he won his first event, the 160-mile Paris-Roubaix event in 1899.

"But Flint's not a cycling city," wrote Peter Joffre Nye for Velo News. "The statue has to do with Champion's contributions to the automotive industry. You've seen his name on Champion spark plugs and his initials in General Motors' AC Delco division. His products even powered Charles Lindbergh's Spirit of St. Louis flight across the Atlantic and into history. Yeah, amazing guy."

Albert Champion, only 49, died Oct. 27, 1927 of a heart attack just five months after Lindbergh's flight.

(Continued from Page 1) over the month. Advances con-

tinued in June. However, the damage to commercial and multifamily construction during the first half of the year was palpable." Dodge added: "The COVID-19 pandemic and resulting recession have wreaked havoc on U.S. building markets."

Dodge said during the course of the first half of the year, compared to the same period in 2019, among the top $10 \, \hat{\text{U}}$.S. metro areas, commercial and multifamily construction starts slid 21 percent and only one metro area (Phoenix-Mesa-Scottsdale, Ariz.) posted an increase (+82 percent).

In the same time period, among the second-tier (ranked 11-20 by population) metro areas, commercial and multifamily starts plummeted 25 percent, Dodge said, "with just one metro area posting an increase." That one metro area would be the 20thranked Detroit metro area, which saw commercial buildings and multifamily housing starts jump a nation-leading 96 percent vs. the same time period in 2019.

Remarkably, every other top-20 major metropolitan area in the nation was negative in the commercial and multifamily construction sector, with the worst being the Nashville, Tenn. area dropping 45 percent and the Washington D.C. area falling 42 percent.

Separately, the Associated General Contractors of America reports a similar scenario in the area of U.S. construction employment, and as they reported a month prior, several Michigan metropolitan areas are continuing to be strong employers of building trades workers.

The AGC reported its analysis of Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) numbers on July 29 and found that construction employment decreased in 225, or 62 percent, out of 358 U.S. metro areas

between June 2019 and June 2020, despite widespread increases from May to June. In contrast, before COVID-19 hit, construction employment had increased in 61 percent of U.S. metro areas in February 2020 vs. February

"It's troubling to see construction employment lagging year-ago levels in most locations, in spite of a strong rebound in May and June," said Ken Simonson, the association's chief economist. "Those gains were not enough to erase the huge losses in March and April. Many indicators since the employment data were collected in mid-June suggest construction employment will soon decline, or stagnate at best, in much of the country.'

In Michigan, areas outside of Detroit, fortunately, also continue to be an outlier in construction employment compared to the rest of the nation, landing four "metropolitan" areas among the top 10 in the U.S. for putting building trades workers to work.

Monroe was tops in the nation among geographical "metropolitan" jurisdictions in the U.S., for employment gains from May to June 2020, up 31 percent. "Detroit- Dearborn- Livonia" and "Warren- Troy- Farmington Hills" were among the regional designations tied at No. 2 (both up 24 percent during that month. Bay City was No. 10 on the list, and Ann Arbor and Saginaw were among those tied at No. 15. Not far behind tied at No. 34 were Niles/ Benton Harbor, Flint and Lansing, all up 12 percent for the month.

Michigan construction this vear has been boosted by an outage at the Fermi II Nuclear Power Plant near Monroe, major automotive projects for Fiat-Chrysler in the Detroit area, a new power plant in St. Clair County, a new hospital and power plant in the Lansing area, among other major projects around the state. They were all ongoing when COVID hit.

"The COVID-19 pandemic and recession have devastated most local construction markets," said Richard Branch, chief economist for Dodge Data & Analytics. "Across the board, building projects have been halted or delayed with virtually no sector immune from damage. Construction starts have begun to increase from their April lows and there is cautious optimism that as the year progresses construction markets around the country will begin a modest recovery.

'However, the recent acceleration of COVID-19 cases in the South and West as well as the upcoming expiration of expanded unemployment insurance benefits (from the CARES Act) puts the recovery at significant risk and could undermine the construction sector's ability to grow.'

Labor gags on GOP's pandemic relief bill

financially devastated states. It also introduces a solution in need of a problem, in the form of the elimination of workers' ability to take COVID-related legal action against employers.

The Democratic House adopted a \$3 trillion "HEROES" plan on May 15 that would have extended the \$600 per week federal jobless compensation (vs. \$200 per week offered by the GOP) and offered significant financial help to states, among other benefits.

"For months," said AFL-CIO President Rich Trumka, "Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell has been dragging his feet, refusing to acknowledge America's public health and economic crises. More than 150,000 Americans have died from COVID-19, and millions of working people have lost their livelihoods because of the pandemic.

"And after weeks of being on vacation, McConnell unveiled a weak piece of legislation that cuts unemployment benefits, fails to make the necessary investments in our vital public services and our infrastructure, and fails to create an emergency temporary standard to protect front-line workers.

'The labor movement has been saying since May that passing the HEROES Act isn't a choice, it's a necessity. With the future of America hanging in the balance, the stakes could not be higher."

Economist Heidi Shierholz of the labor-backed Economic Policy Institute said on July 30 that the GOP's \$400 cut in benefits "is not just cruel, it's terrible economics. These benefits are supporting a huge amount of spending by people who would otherwise have to cut back dramatically. The spending made possible by the \$400 that the Senate wants to cut is supporting 3.4 million jobs. If you cut the \$400, you cut those jobs.'

Shierholz the last week of July "was the 19th week in a row that unemployment claims have been more than twice the worst week of the Great Recession.'

McConnell released the plan knowing he did not have the full support of the Republican caucus in the Senate – a number of whom have said the initial \$1 trillion relief package adopted months ago was sufficient. McConnell said he hopes that in the next two weeks the Senate will be able to get the next coronavirus relief bill to the House.

'Republicans have put forward a framework that would do huge amounts of good for huge numbers of American families," McConnell said. "If Democrats ever come to the table, we'll be able to bridge our differences and make a law.'

Many Republicans and chambers of commerce have argued that an extension of the \$600 per week benefit is a deterrent to workers returning to work. That's not necessarily so, said the Wall Street Journal on July 29. "Many economists who have studied the benefits say they so far don't see evidence in labor market data that the payments are affecting the rate at which people are returning to work during the pandemic," the article said.

Also included in the GOP bill, said EPI President Thea Lee, is a provision that grants "legal immunity to employers who fail to protect their workers, a blatant example of Senate Republicans exploiting the coronavirus crisis to forward a long-standing agenda aimed at shielding corporations from legal liability. To be clear, removing legal accountability from businesses would jeopardize the health and safety of workers and consumers and threaten the economic recovery."

McConnell said the legal immunity provision is a must have in the final legislation, and is a response to an "epidemic" of COVIDrelated lawsuits by American workers, but Politico reported on July 27 that "data suggests that coronavirus-related litigation isn't very contagious." *Politico* said of the 3,727 coronavirus-related cases that have been filed since March, just 185, or less than 5 percent, "fall into the personal injury category that McConnell describes – plaintiffs claiming fear of exposure, potential exposure or exposure to Covid-19, according to an analysis by the American Association for Justice."

LA Times business columnist Matt Rosendale wrote, "in plain English, the Republicans are proposing to eviscerate almost all workplace protections at the moment when the threat to workers' health may be its highest in a century."

mi.us/avapplication 401K Withdrawal: The recently enacted CARES Act allows the 401k Plan to adopt a special in-service distribution for participants who are diagnosed with COVID-19, whose spouse or child is diagnosed with COVID -19, or who are experiencing economic hardship as a result of the pandemic. This distribution can be up to \$100k, is not subject to the ordinary 10% excise tax, and the income tax from the distribution can be spread out over a 3year period.

Individuals receiving such a distribution may also repay the distribution over 3-year period, in which case they will not be subject to income tax on what they repay. Unlike other hardships, this particular distribution only requires that the member self-certify the need. The Fund is not required to independently corroborate the participant's certification with medical documentation or other types of documentation. The distribution is a one-time event only and must be taken

in 2020. This program applies to only the employer contribution 401k and will begin April 20th, 2020. You will receive an official notice in the mail soon.

Sub-Pay: The board of trustees voted to temporarily raise the maximum sub pay credit from \$130 to \$260 from March 23rd until the end of April. To file for sub-pay, fill out a sub-pay form. You can find a form on the members only section of the website under the "forms" tab on the left hand side, or you can call the Union office and we'll mail or email you some. We have liftoff... space launch site picked in U.P.

first-rate human talent, Michigan can be one of the leaders in the space industry."

The site north of Marquette is on a three-mile stretch of undeveloped land along Lake Superior. Vertical rocket launches would lift payloads like satellites into low-earth orbit, where they could be parked in an area above the Northern Hemisphere that's less crowded than sites that are closer to the Equator.

"I'm pleased the Marquette area has been chosen as a vertical space launch site and appreciate the comprehensive and thoughtful process that led to the selection," said Rep. Sara Cambensy, who represents Michigan's 109th District in the region. "This will help bring a new industry to the U.P. and to our state that will provide good-paying jobs to our residents."

Said state Sen. Ed McBroom, who represents the region's 38th District: "This announcement is a true win for the people of the U.P. We are very pleased that the U.P.'s many attributes were recognized through the vetting process. The vertical spaceport could bring quality job prospects to the region and highlight Michigan as a center for excellence and innovation."

In February, the MAMA group picked the under-used Oscoda-Wurtsmith Airport to handle the "horizontal launches," so-called because they involve the use of big jets to haul satellites into the sky, where they would be released and launched into a low orbit.

The former Wurtsmith Air Force Base was closed in 1993 after decades of hosting a squadron of B-52 bombers. The airport received the highest ranking because of its runway infrastructure, business capacity, operational strength and safety track record. Licensing through the Federal Aviation Administration has begun for that site with operations projected to begin in late 2023 or early 2024.

An analysis to build a command and control center somewhere in Michigan is currently being conducted with an expected completion date of November 2020. Construction-related expenditures were not disclosed by the group.

The choice of Michigan as a site for space travel makes sense, MAMA says, when you consider the extensive presence of the automotive industry in the state and the increasing use of satellite-guided, autonomous vehicles. Combined with the local engineering talent and the safety component of launching rockets over Lake Superior, means "Michigan is uniquely positioned to take advantage of integrated space resources working collaboratively to serve industries like autonomous technology, automotive, communications, medical, education and first responders," Brown said.

Citing Brown, the *Detroit Free Press* reported that as much as \$1.2 billion should be secured for the entire project, thanks to interest from several equity firms, and that fundraising would begin after a feasibility process has been completed.

I believe I must constantly reiterate the dangers of this disease to all of us as tradesmen. We have seen small mistakes that can evolve into serious situations or missed time, there is no set pattern as it has gone from a killer of the old and weak to now having no concern to age, health, race, or creed. Please take caution and watch out for each other.

The COVID virus is here and it's nasty let's act accordingly

I certainly do not have all the answers and I do believe the dismal daily news reports of the awful affects of this pandemic. Thanks to the current arrogant people in power, who ignore scientific facts to gain some sort of power, I can only see more economic downturns ahead. Many Americans are led to believe this virus is a hoax or will burn itself out in a short time. Either theory couldn't be further from the truth.

The coronavirus has evolved from striking the old and sick to now having no concern of race, creed, or age. On the jobsite, if one contractor's representative or a worker believes this to be a hoax, they can sicken or kill many people. Perhaps it will take the sickness or death of a friend or family member before the doubters understand the severity of this real-world event.

I believe we must constantly reiterate to our trades people of the dangers of COVID-19 and point out mistakes that have been recently allowed to happen on our job sites, putting workers in danger. Maybe each week we can hold the job site talks at our sites between our general contractors our own contractors and tradespeople – in a safer manner. Too often our tradespeople are being asked to congregate during such meetings, and then sign off on daily job site talk sheets – using the same pens and handling the same paperwork other have touched.

For example, on one large project we have the blessing of upper management to address this issue by having our members call out their names and having one person write down the person's name as having attending the meeting.

Currently some contractors, in an effort to provide water to the trades people on site, have multiple Igloo coolers filled with ice and water bottles floating in them touched by all other crafts – creating a petri dish for germs. These are just some examples of potentially sickening mistakes that are being repeated on jobsites across Michigan, and these practices must end.

Plus we all know examples of times when our fellow tradespeople or contractors are simply not wearing masks or not wearing them properly, nor are they maintaining the proper social distancing. We know from the occasional project shutdown, to workers being sent home to quarantine, to having our temperatures taken to the forms we have to sign to gain access to jobsites every daythat this virus is real and a constant threat both to our health and livelihoods. The governor has already shut down construction activity in Michigan earlier this year in an effort to slow the spread of the virus – if we continue to see lapses in vigilance in halting its spread it can happen again.

As one of my members has told me, "if we look insane beating the drum of caution and telling everyone the sky is falling, just by saving one life no matter what the cost - that should be good enough for anyone.'

last \$600 weekly federal unemployment check for the 13.18 million people – farm workers, household help, actors, musicians, freelancers, "gig economy" workers and so-called "independent contractors" among them. After then, they get zip.

And since those workers aren't part of the regular staterun jobless benefits system, that effectively means no income at

Those workers and their families "bought the groceries and paid the rent" with those checks, AFL-CIO Policy Director and chief economist Bill Spriggs said in a roundtable zoom discussion with reporters in early July. "Remove them, and it will be a catastrophe.'

Those \$600 checks also top off the states' jobless benefits, and in many cases – especially in GOP-run and Sunbelt states – it's a big "top." At least 17.189 million people get those top-off checks, too, the latest Labor Department report shows.

The House rode to the rescue, or so it thought, by passing the \$3 trillion Health and Economic Recovery Omnibus **Emergency Solutions (Heroes)** Act, HR6800, months ago. One key provision would extend those checks through January

But McConnell deepsixed HR6800 and Trump's Office of Management and Budget demands he veto it. OMB alleges the bill "is more concerned with delivering on long-standing and partisan ideological wish lists" than fighting the virus.

Failure to pass the Heroes Act as is would make the curtailment of income only one of the problems facing most Americans. Homelessness, even more rapid spread of the coronavirus, an end to countless essential social services and skyrocketing bills for everything from water to electricity and gas are among the potential catastrophes that could hit millions.

In addition, the collapse of state economies, closure of hospitals, shuttering of public school systems, a chaotic November election that that has nothing in common with what one should see in a democracy and more could become part of the new reality in America if HR6800 is not enacted.

Data shows economy tanked by one-third in second quarter of year

WASHINGTON (PAI) - The economy tanked in the second quarter of 2020, from April through June, government data shows, as U.S. gross domestic product – the sum total of all goods and services – declined by 32.9 percent at an annual rate.

And it could have been worse, even the Commerce Department's Bureau of Economic Analysis, which released those numbers, says. Federal checks to workers, both the \$1,200 check when the crash began, and \$600 weekly jobless aid on top of state unemployment benefits, propped the economy up, BEA explained.

Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., wants to knock that prop out, cutting the \$600 to \$200. Half of his ruling Republicans want to reduce it to zero. Succeeding in those aims would only make things much worse.

How much worse? For comparison, BEA's historical statistics add that in the worst year of the Great Depression, 1932, the economy shrank by 12.9 percent.

The day before BEA's release, the AFL-CIO used the gloomy outlook to once again lobby for the House-passed Heroes Act (HR6800). It would extend the federal \$600 weekly jobless aid checks, now sent to at least 30 million unemployed workers through January 31. They're scheduled to end July 31.

"After months of sitting on his hands, McConnell has finally released a proposal for COVID-19 relief. The package is called the Heals Act, but unfortunately this poorly named bill will heal nothing and will only hurt working people and our families," federation President Richard Trumka said. McConnell's "relief package...is \$2 trillion short and 73 days

late. The bill drastically reduces the \$600 in weekly unemployment benefits that thousands of America's families are relying on right now." The fed provided a toll-free number to call senators: 866-832-1560. "And during a time when millions of working people are without

a job, health care or retirement security, the package also includes a bill from" Utah Republican "Sen. Mitt Romney that fast-tracks Social Security and Medicare cuts," Trumka warned. The 2020 BEA statistics reflect the mass closures needed to

combat "community spread" of the coronavirus - closures also re-

flected in continual increases in jobless claims from unemployed

The Bureau of Labor Statistics provides those numbers, and it reported that in the week ending July 25, 1,205,871 people applied for regular state-provided jobless benefits and another 829,697 sought federal-only \$600 weekly unemployment aid. Since the pandemiccaused crash began on March 13, an official total of 30,202,498 work-

ers have sought jobless benefits, combining both types, BLS added. Add in jobless people who can't claim benefits, have had them denied, who are still waiting for their first checks due to creaky state jobless systems, plus the seven million unemployed before the coronavirus crash began, and the total rises above 50 million.

The \$600 checks are especially vital to "gig economy" workers, farm workers, home health care workers, so-called "independent contractors" and other workers the regular state-run jobless benefits system doesn't cover. They also lessened the impact of the April-June crash, BEA's

statement said. It explained that a key part of the economy, personal income, rose, on an annual basis, only because "government transfer receipts"— i.e. the initial \$1,200 checks after the crash began and the \$600 weekly benefits since then – "more than accounted for" declines due to lost jobs.

"GDP collapsed faster in the second quarter of 2020 than it has in any other recorded quarter of U.S. history. Congress needs to restore the extra \$600 in unemployment insurance and provide largescale, flexible aid to state and local governments," the Economic Policy Institute tweeted.

We are in a historic economic crisis with no end in sight – now is not the time to slash additional unemployment benefits by \$400 a week," Sen. Kamala Harris, D-Calif., tweeted in reply.



Benefits to utilizing the app include: instant access to EOB's, a virtual ID card on your phone, information on deductibles, explanations of coverage and other helpful tips related to your Health Care coverage. EOB's can be downloaded to smart phones or computers and used to substantiate WEX receipt requests.

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

DUES PAYMENTS: YOUR DUES PAYMENTS ARE DUE PRIOR TO THE FIRST OF THE MONTH. The books will close at the end of the business day on the last day of the month. Payments made on the 1st of the month are considered late for that month. There will be no exception, once the books are closed it cannot be undone. Members will receive a text message dues reminder prior to the end of the month. If you are not receiving our text messaging please call the hall. REMINDER: We ONLY take Visa, Master Card & Discover and do not accept American Express.

BENEFICIARY REMINDER: Please remember to designate or update your beneficiary choice on all of your Local 80 and international benefits. The law requires that in the event of an untimely death your benefits go to your spouse first and if there is no spouse to your children UNLESS you designate otherwise in writing with each specific benefit. Depending on your classification you could have benefits due to your heirs from Local 80 pension, insurance, annuity and from international and SASMI. Each individual benefit needs to have a designated beneficiary unless you want it to go to your spouse or children. As always seek the advice of an attorney.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH and DISMEMBERMENT INSURANCE FROM OUR INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION: Members who have their dues paid in advance (prior to the month of the accident) are eligible for accidental death and dismemberment benefits up to \$7,500. This benefit comes as a dues paying member of SMART International.

WEEKEND WORK ASSIGNMENTS: Saturday and Sunday work assignments. Please remember that when performing work on a Saturday or Sunday the steward must report it to the hall, give each members name and obtain a form for signatures. Each member must sign the form along with the number of hours they worked. The completed form must be sent back to by hall by the end of the day on the following Monday. Weekend work assignments must be called or emailed into the hall prior to 3:00 pm on Friday.

LAY-OFFS: All members must report to the Union Hall immediately upon lay-off, even if you only work one day. These are the By-Law rules for the Out-of-Work List. Your name will be removed from the list 14 days after receiving an assignment. It is very important to report to the union hall immediately after your layoff. Members get confused because the S.U.B. Fund allows you a period of up to seven to apply for S.U.B. benefits after lay-off.

LAY-OFF SLIPS/TERMINATION NOTICES: Lay off slips must accompany all applications for sub pay. Without lay off slips you cannot collect sub pay. It is the member's responsibility to make sure they get one from the contractor when laid off. Your application cannot be submitted without one. It is the contractor's responsibility to issue one in accordance with our contract.

S.U.B. BENEFITS: Report to the hall promptly upon layoff. You must complete a S.U.B. Application within seven days from your layoff date or you will forfeit S.U.B. benefits. Lay-off slips must accompany the application to be eligible. Proof of UIA benefit payments must be submitted within 21 days of when you were paid in order to receive SUB benefits. Do not submit your sub applications directly to the fund office. Your application must be signed by the hall or you will not collect benefits.

OUT-OF-WORK LIST: You must be on the out-of-work list to collect S.U.B. benefits or SASMI. Members must re-register bi-annually: March 1 through March 20 and September 1 through September 20. If you fail to re-register you will be removed from the list.

SHORT WORK WEEK SUB PAY: If you work 16 hours or less in a week or have a short work week due to weather you may collect sub for that week but only if it is at the **beginning or the end of a** layoff. You may NOT collect if you are not laid off. You must complete a sub application at the hall, provide a pay stub for that week and the hall will submit it to the fund office. If you are not laid off and it is due to weather the company MUST provide written documentation that it was weather related.

MEMBERS ASSISTANCE PROGRAM: If you are experiencing problems in your family, marriage or relationships, stress or emotional difficulties, grief or loss issues or problems with alcohol and drug use please contact our assistance program. Ulliance is there to help you with your needs. They can also help you with legal issues, financial concerns, elder care referrals and child care resources. 

Members please note that if you cannot access the MUST site to complete your safety mods you need to contact Laura or Lee Ann at the Union Hall. With the amount of upcoming in-town work, all current Journeymen and Apprentices should ensure they have 18 safety mods completed and drug test should be current.

The NMA addendum for most of the upcoming projects states: 1) Prior to, but within 30 days of referral for employment to the project site, all craft persons will: A) Attend a Project Specific Orientation facilitated by the Contractor at mutually agreed upon times and locations; B) Before being admitted to the job site, all contractors and subcontractor employees having active involvement in job site construction activity, must be current and maintain a current MUST or equivalent status regarding the Substance Abuse Program. Prior to the start of work on the project the employee must provide confirmation of negative results to a MUST Substance Abuse Test or equivalent test within the last 30 days.

MEMBER ASSISTANCE: Local 292 is now partnering with Ulliance, an employee assistance program designed to assist active members and their eligible family members who may be struggling with emotional, domestic or substance abuse issues, as well as legal and financial referrals. SUBSTANTIATION REQUEST: Many members have been receiving Substantiation Request letters from the Local 292 Benefit Fund office. IRS regulations require that every use of the Benny Card be substantiated or validated as an eligible covered expense under the Plan. This validation is required by the IRS, the Fund cannot make exceptions. It is the member's responsibility to ensure all requested documentation be returned to the Fund office in a timely manner. By not responding to the Substantiation Request letter, your Benny Card may be suspended until all requested documentation has been received. If you have any questions, contact BeneSys at 248.641.4992 or the Union Hall.

DUES: Membership dues are required to be **paid in advance of** the month for which they are due. The union hall is not open on Saturday or Sunday, therefore, if you pay dues on either of those days, it will not be processed until Monday. 

U.S. labor law needs to start working for workers, study says

(Continued from Page 1) employees that there's a good chance they will lose their jobs if they vote to unionize.

A 2019 EPI report showed that employers collectively spend \$340 million per year on "union avoidance" consultants who teach them how to exploit weaknesses in federal labor law to effectively scare workers out of exercising their legal right to collective bargaining.

Last month's report comes a month after the International Trade Union Confederation ranked the U.S. among the worst countries in the world for (not) supporting workers' rights, putting the U.S. on par with nations like Jordan, Uruguay and Haiti for "systemic violations" of worker rights.

"The Global Rights Index exposes a breakdown in the social contract that governments and employers have with working people," the confederation said. "There's a trend to restrict working rights through violations of collective bargaining, withholding the right to strike and excluding workers from unions."

The Protecting the Right to Organize (PRO) Act that passed the U.S. House in February is one of the most significant bills since the 1930s that would bolster workers' ability to organize. The PRO Act – adopted with nearly universal Democratic support – would amend U.S. labor law to tilt the scales back to giving workers more power during disputes at work, adding penalties for companies that retaliate against workers seeking to organize, and introduce the ability to collectively bargaining to workers who don't enjoy that right.

Michigan is one of 27 states with right-to-work laws, and the PRO Act would weaken those laws and end the ability of workers to enjoy union representation without paying dues. But the PRO Act isn't going anywhere in the Republican-led Senate, and President Trump would almost certainly veto it, anyway – which brings the importance of getting the right candidates into office during the November election for those who support a stronger U.S. labor movement.

"The importance of unions has been even further heightened by both the COVID-19 pandemic and the national protests around racial justice. In recent months, thousands of nonunion workers have been left without personal protective equipment, hazard pay, and access to sick leave," said Lola Loustaunau, research fellow at the University of Oregon's Labor Education and Research Center and co-author

of the report. "Unionization has helped bring living wages to once low-wage jobs in industries such as health care and is a key tool for closing racial wage gaps. Congress must ensure workers have a meaningful right to organize and bargain collectively.'

ganize - which is supposedly enshrined in the National Labor Relations Act of 1935 – has been effectively cancelled out by a combination of legal and illegal employer intimidation tactics.

The EPI focused on the legal tactics - heavy-handed actions "that would be illegal in any election for public office but are regularly deployed by employers under the broken National Labor Relations Board's union election system," the report says.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics reported earlier this year that union membership continued its American workers want a union decades-long decline last year, in their workplace but very few down to 10.3 percent from 10.5

takes longer to build an oil and gas pipeline. That's important for construction workers, whose livelihood depends on moving from project to project, a process often punctuated by unemployment. When a project takes several years, workers can settle down to predictable schedules for themselves and their families, McGarvey said, and there is generally a variety of crafts involved.

The views on the comparative advantage of building the oil and gas lines parallel NABTU union leaders' skepticism about the Green New Deal, and particularly its goal of ending U.S. dependence on fossil fuels, thus making the nation carbon-neutral, within a few decades. The Green New Deal is a major bone of contention within organized labor.

Rank and file workers, speaking in focus groups involved in the surveys, backed McGarvey's observations up in quotes in the report.

"In refineries there's always new technology in production," one male union electrician said. "Wind you only have wind, solar you only have solar. There's not anything really new that you can do with it other than it just runs a cell, or it blows the wind turbine blades. But lots of different things in the petrochemical world change radically. And with those (radical changes) they have to do lots of upgrades."

The survey of 1,619 workers, union and non-union, before the coronavirus pandemic hit, found renewable energy project construction lasted from 3.5-15.5 months, with a median of six months – i.e. half the projects lasted longer and half were shorter. Oil and gas construction projects lasted from 4-20 months, with a 6.5-month median.

One sector, including building trades unions and the Mine Workers, opposes complete divorce from fossil fuels, especially from their use for electricity generation. Those unions' leaders recognize, however, that "carbon capture" is needed to prevent more emissions that cause global warming. They advocate pro-capture "clean coal" and similar projects.

They also point out that even with the goal of cutting carbon emissions, there will still be a long transition period, where traditional fuel plants, run on oil, coal and natural gas, will need to keep going until capacity in the non-carbon technologies catches up.

There's anecdotal evidence" that construction workers building oil and gas pipelines "make 50 percent more" than those building renewable energy projects, added Dr. Thomas Kriger, NABTU's education and research director. "But we need more research on that." He also noted the oil and gas lines involve a "bigger mix of construction crafts," represented by NABTU's 14 member unions, than the renewable energy projects involve.

Concrete walls gets their due as masons rehab TechTown building

DETROIT – The exterior of the home of "TechTown" is anything but high technology, but the mass of reinforced concrete in its walls has served its occupants well for the past 93 years.

The TechTown technology incubator, which serves as a home to more than 50 small businesses, has been in the five-story building since the group was incorporated as a nonprofit in 2004. That's the year the group established their headquarters in the landmark 1927 Albert Kahn-designed building on Burroughs Street just north of the Wayne State University campus, dubbed TechOne.

Masonry contractor Grunwell Cashero, as it has done on so many other historic Detroit buildings in recent years, has been rehabilitating the exterior of the building in recent months, in preparation for a paint job that's expected to freshen up the building's exterior. One the job last year and this year have been Bricklayers and Allied Craftworkers Local 2 foreman Jim Cusin and fourth year apprentice Josh Lloyd. Their task: patching, caulking and making repairs to exposed re-rod and spalled areas, leaving all four sides of the building ready for paint.

"This place was really well built," Cusin said, "it could probably stand up to a bomb. As we've gone over the building, we've removed a few chunks of material that looked like they might fall off, but overall the building and the walls are well-preserved and we've found them to be in pretty good shape."

Cusin and Lloyd are using a fiber reinforced mortar to make repairs on cracked and missing concrete. Cusin said the original builders used a "form-it and pourit" method of building the 140,000 square-foot structure, with one floor constructed atop the other.


The exterior walls of TechOne comprised of poured concrete and concrete block which was a style that, for better or worse, was adopted in the

Modern-style architectural era two decades later. It differs from a lot of 1920s-era buildings whose exteriors were made of limestone, granite or other quarried stone, whose use could help the architect offer differentiation and ornamentation on a building's facia. But Kahn's use of large windows effectively breaks up TechOne's monotony of concrete walls, leaving a building that has been pleasing to look at for nearly a century.

According to TechTown, which is part of Wayne State University's Research and Technology Park, the building's original use was as a service department for Pontiac. It later became the Chevrolet Creative Services building, where the original Corvette was designed on the third floor. Interior ramps allowed cars to be moved within the building.

Today, the owners offer a range of spaces for lease, including small offices, office suites and wet labs. TechTown calls itself "Detroit's Entrepreneurship Hub," where "we help tech startups and local businesses launch and grow."

The group lists a number of partners, such as Amazon Web Services, Apple, Bank of America, Beaumont Health, GM and IBM, to name a few.

In 2018, to offer paddling travelers more opportunities, the state first designated water trails eight waterways totaling 540-plus miles that flow through more than a dozen counties.

A water trail is a designated route on a navigable waterway such as a lake, river, canal or bay, which is designed and managed to create a positive outdoor recreation experience for the user. They feature well-developed

access points, often are near significant historical, environmental or cultural points of interest and often have nearby amenities like restaurants, hotels and campgrounds.

throughout the country, as interest in paddle sports and other water-based recreation continues to grow," said DNR Parks and Recreation Chief Ron Olson. "We are pleased to help advance these opportunities by recognizing model public water trails that set the standard for the future of Michigan's water trails program."

Paul Yauk, the DNR's state trails coordinator, said that Michigan is in a great position to work with partners to create a statewide water trails program that complements Michigan's broader trails system.

"Designating these rivers as official water trails shines an even brighter light on some incredible natural resources," Yauk said. "We fully expect that offering - and expanding - water trail opportunities in Michigan will encourage more outdoor recreation and healthier lifestyles, and also serve as regional destinations that will give a boost to local economies."

With more than 3,000 miles of Great Lakes shoreline and thousands of miles of rivers and streams, Michigan offers ample opportunity to traverse the state over the water – no matter the size or speed of your vessel.

While designated water trails are a relatively recent development, use of Michigan's waterways for transportation isn't new.

Historical headwaters. "Our harbor system along the Great Lakes is the first water trail system we've had in this state," said Jordan Byelich, waterways development program manager for the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. "In fact, going back hundreds of years, the Great Lakes served Native Americans and Europeans as a water trail system."

Native Americans first used Michigan's waterways for sustenance and trade, early European settlers used them to transport goods and timber, and water resources were the foundation of Michigan's earliest manufacturing and shipping industries.

These waterways also had a significant impact nationally. "The Great Lakes and a network of rivers opened the vast American heartland to a nation moving west. Inland waterways are a road map to much of the nation's history," explains a passage from the National Museum of American History's online exhibition On the Water: Stories from Maritime America.

'They guided the travels of Native Americans, explorers from Europe, and streams of newcomers who established businesses, towns, and cities. ... Inland waterways helped hold together the people and economy of the nation as it grew throughout the 1800s."

Today, while still important industrial transport. Michigan's waters often host more leisurely travelers. Michigan consistently ranks among the top three states in the nation for watercraft registrations and boat sales. Recreational boating has an economic impact of more than \$7 billion annually in Michigan, according to data from the National Marine Manufacturers Association.

Finding safe harbor. As boating became a popular pastime, the state set out to provide safe public access to the Great Lakes and inland waters of Michigan. In 1947, the state Legislature created the Michigan State Waterways Commission – a seven-member advisory board that works with the DNR on the use of dedicated funds, provided by boaters, for

maintenance of public harbors and boating access sites.

So began the state's Great Lakes Harbors Program. The Waterways Commission was granted authority and supporting funds to create a marine "highway" along the 3,000 miles of Great Lakes shoreline.

From 1947 to 1964, the commission developed the majority of Michigan's harbors of refuge, providing tens of thousands of boaters safe harbors and hospitality as they circumnavigate the state. In 1966, the commission became part of Michigan's Department of Conservation, the precursor to the DNR.

'Today, the number of safe harbors has grown as the Waterways Commission continues its mission to provide safe public access to the Great Lakes and inland waters of this state," reads the Michigan Harbors Guide.

'The program's goal is to locate harbors so that no boater will ever be more than 15 shoreline miles from safety.'

Boaters have paid for much of this harbor network through taxes on marine fuel purchases and boat registration fees. Under the Waterways Grant-In-Aid Program, local units of government are given grant funds for conthe acquisition, development and struction of facilities. Federal

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
